

Psalm 32

The Joy of Forgiveness Of David. A Maskil.

1 Happy are those whose transgression is forgiven, whose sin is covered.

2 Happy are those to whom the LORD imputes no iniquity,
and in whose spirit there is no deceit.

3 While I kept silence, my body wasted away through my groaning all day long.

4 For day and night your hand was heavy upon me;
my strength was dried up as by the heat of summer. Selah

5 Then I acknowledged my sin to you, and I did not hide my iniquity; I said, “I will confess
my transgressions to the LORD,” and you forgave the guilt of my sin. Selah

6 Therefore let all who are faithful offer prayer to you;
at a time of distress, the rush of mighty waters shall not reach them.

7 You are a hiding place for me; you preserve me from trouble;
you surround me with glad cries of deliverance. Selah

8 I will instruct you and teach you the way you should go; I will counsel you with my eye upon you.

9 Do not be like a horse or a mule, without understanding,

whose temper must be curbed with bit and bridle, else it will not stay near you.

10 Many are the torments of the wicked, but steadfast love surrounds those who trust in the LORD.

11 Be glad in the LORD and rejoice, O righteous, and shout for joy, all you upright in heart.

I was thinking this past week about happiness. Wondering what it takes to make someone happy and whether I am in control of the happiness of someone else or if they are somehow in control of mine. Pam and I taught our daughter that happiness is a choice that we get to make for ourselves. Sorry folks, but someone else cannot make you unhappy. They may do or say something to you that you may not like but whether you remain happy is up to you.

In Psalm 32 David speaks about happiness. Verses 1-2 gather four Old Testament words for sin. Each one of them provides a picture with an insight into what happiness looks like. The first word is transgression (pasa). The same word can be used for the rebellion of one treaty partner against another (check out 2 Kings 1:1), or of children against parents (Isaiah 1:2). According to this word happiness is a life no longer being lived in rebellion against God. The second word sin (hata) is a picture of missing a target. There is a great story in the book of Judges (20:16) that tells of seven hundred left-handed marksmen from Benjamin's tribe who could "could sling a stone at a hair, and not miss." In this picture, happiness is having your life headed in the right direction, toward a realization of what God's plan is for your life. The third word is iniquity (awon). It is sometimes translated as guilt, and it carries the picture of being bent over or twisted. I often think of someone who has a stomachache and is bent over holding his or her stomach in pain. Happiness here is being straightened out, able to stand upright and no longer in pain. The fourth word is deceit (remiyah) which has the sense of treachery or unreliability, like a car that has faulty brakes which is dangerous to drive. The picture of happiness carries an understanding of a person who is honest and straightforward.

The bottom line is this if your desire is to be happy: stop rebelling against God, get your life on track, straightened out and marked with honesty.

Prayer: Lord, we know that you desire good things for your children, that your wish for us is to live a life

marked with happiness. Forgive us our transgressions. Help us to walk the narrow way. Straighten out our life that we might become who you desire us to be. May we live lives marked by honesty and integrity. In Jesus name, Amen

WHAT DOES IT MEAN TO BE REFORMED?

How would you answer this question? It is one that I have been asked many, many times, and there are many approaches we could take. But today, I will address what the term means amid the descriptions of other denominations. Why do we call ourselves reformed, but not our Lutheran brethren? After all, don't we look to Martin Luther as the father of the Reformation so that Lutherans would be reformed, too?

Through the maze of history from the 16th-century Reformation, two main streams of protestant churches emerged under the leadership of two great theological leaders—Martin Luther and John Calvin. While both churches agreed on the core tenets of salvation, they did not agree on other issues like sacraments and church government.

Lutheranism spread throughout Germany, Poland, Scandinavia, and Henry VIII's England. Calvinism spread from Geneva into Germany, Holland, France, Scotland, and England. In the extensive discourse about the two movements, Calvinism became known as Reformed.

Calvin was French and had to flee his country to avoid being killed by the Catholic King of France—Francis I. He became the lead pastor of the French protestant refugee church in Geneva and had a remarkable career. Besides being the greatest theologian of the age and the author of the Institutes of the Christian Religion, he was a pastor, teacher, and civic leader. He preached 5 to 10 sermons a week, visited the sick, and helped reorganize the church and civil government in Geneva. Pastoral students came from across Europe to study with Calvin, returning to their own countries to share the gospel of Christ with their homelands. Many, many died as martyrs before the Gospel took hold and overcame the darkness of the Roman church. Here are a few of them:

1. French Reformed Churches bear the name Huguenot. You may remember them from your world history classes. There is only one Huguenot congregation in the United States which you may visit if you are ever in Charleston, South Carolina.
2. German Reformed churches are part of the Evangelical Reformed Church in Bavaria and North-western Germany. There is not a proper German Reformed denomination in America today.
3. Dutch Reformed Churches are those we are most familiar with; they are the origin of our denomination.
4. English Reformed Churches is a broader category and more challenging to cover quickly. Presbyterians, Reformed Anglicans, Reformed Baptists, Reformed Congregationalists, and Puritans have their roots in the English Reformation.

This is only the beginning of the list. There are more than 175 Reformed denominations world wide. Take a look at this Wikipedia page to get a good look at the Reformed Churches by region of the world. https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/List_of_Reformed_denominations#Others

There is great diversity among the Reformed denominations—mainly in the choice of church government, or in the confessions adhered to. Many denominations have also wandered far from Calvin's original theology. It is important to know how we are alike, and how we are different.

We are going to discuss the three major forms of church government in the Table Talk class on October 8. Grab a cookie and cup of coffee and join us!


Hello First Reformed Church,

For the last year, I have been mentoring a young man that I was connected with through Inspiration Hills. Recently, we have been reading through the book, "Finally Free" by Heath Lambert. Before you go look online and start becoming concerned, this book is about being free from the bondage of pornography and any other sin for that matter. The young man who I am mentoring does struggle with this and is close to finding true victory in this battle, just as I have. This book has been truly amazing and I have already read it for my Biblical Counseling class in Seminary, but having to reread it with a different mindset, a mentor's mindset and asking questions from the chapters to further the study I have discovered some amazing things that I want to share with you. This newsletter may bring some conviction and even some emotions, if that happens my door is always open, I would love to talk with you about whatever emotions that come up. When we sin, we tend to feel sorrowful, but what kind of sorrow do we feel when that happens? There is Godly sorrow and worldly sorrow. Now I know what you're thinking, "Well of course we want the Godly sorrow, I feel that because I am a Christian." You will be shocked to discover that while you may think that you have Godly sorrow of your sin, in reality, you actually feel worldly sorrow.

What are these two sorrows? These two sorrows come from 2 Corinthians 7:8-11. Worldly sorrow is genuine sorrow where one feels real sadness, but the sadness is a sadness that brews about losing out on the things of this world: money, job, wife, children, stuff, etc. These things are legit, but these are ultimately things of the world, even our wife and kids. Godly sorrow is concerned purely about their relationship with God. When we experience Godly sorrow, we are truly saddened that we have sinned against God and have temporally disrupted our relationship with God. We are concerned about God more than the things of this world. Godly sorrow produces life, where worldly sorrow produces death. Not physical but spiritual. When we have worldly sorrow, we may feel sorry for a little while, but no real change occurs. When we have Godly sorrow, we want to make a change, and not just a temporary change, but a change that lasts. How does this happen? First, it happens with prayer. We need to ask God not just for forgiveness and grace, but for transforming grace. God's word tells us, "Do not be conformed to this world, but be transformed by the renewal of your mind" (Romans 12:2, ESV). God wants us to be transformed, so let us ask God for that transforming grace to come into our lives, so that we can be made new.

Let me also make one thing clear, if you read this and discover that you are only experiencing worldly sorrow, this does not mean you are not a true Christian. It simply means that true change and transformation is going to be extremely difficult. We need to understand that God is not our magical genie that is going to snap his fingers and make everything right for us. There is effort and work on our part that needs to take place. Finally, brothers and sisters, if you are caught in the sin of pornography, drunkenness, adultery, gambling, gossiping, hating, idolatry, lying, there is hope for you. Let us remember that God does not want that life for us. He cares and loves us so much that He left His heavenly throne to come into the world as a human being, and took the most horrific death in human history, so that we could be forgiven. That the life we live is free from the bondage of sin and rich in His love and mercy that leads to eternal life. Believe in that brothers and sisters. Call out to Christ right now and ask for His forgiveness and transforming grace to be put upon you. You will not regret it, it will be hard, but you will not regret it in the long run.



From the library--


This month we are featuring three new books from our library.



The first one is for **Robert Whitlow fans, DOUBLE INDEMNITY**. "Matt and Elena Thompson present the picture of perfection. But their enviable life isn't all it seems. Their marriage is on the rocks, and financial disaster looms. Then Matt is killed in a hunting accident, and the questions and accusations begin to mount. Attorney Liz Acosta, newly arrived in the mountains of north Georgia after graduating from law school, plans to get some job experience on her resume before returning home to seek a position with a big-time firm. Drawn to philosophy, theology, and nature, intellectual pastor Conner Grantham isn't sure that shepherding a rural congregation is what he ultimately wants to do with his life. But, after he meets the brilliant and energetic Liz, he's finally beginning to feel more at home in north Georgia. While Liz and Connor spend more time with each other and discover just how compatible two people from wildly different backgrounds can be, they're also being drawn into the shadowy world of Matt and Elena Thompson. As the couple's marriage counselor, Connor finds himself in the middle of their explosive arguments. As Elena's attorney Liz is caught in the tailspin created by Matt's death. Together, Connor and Liz attempt to solve the mystery of what really happened to Matt. If his death is ruled an accident, then the double indemnity clause in his life insurance would go into effect, essentially doubling the payment. But as Liz sorts through the legal paperwork of who stands to gain an immense sum of money from Matt's death, Connor is accused of the unthinkable with much more at stake than millions of dollars."



Book #3 in the "**Prince Edward Island**" series **SUMMER IN THE SPOTLIGHT** by **Liz Johnson** is next: "Kelsey Ahern has performed at the Victory Playhouse on Prince Edward Island since she was seven. But when a hurricane destroys the building, it's not just her memories that are in jeopardy. Her future as a drama teacher is too. She teams up with Levi Ross, the facilities director at the high school, to produce a benefit show to raise money to rebuild the theater. Levi has a reputation for being able to fix anything, and Kelsey is sure there's more to the quiet man than meets the eye. When a popular weatherman arrives in town to cover the aftermath of the hurricane and takes an interest in Kelsey and her show, Levi realizes that the time has come to speak up—or lose the heart of the woman he longs for."



The last book is **DARK OF NIGHT** by **Colleen Coble**. If you read book #1 of the Annie Pedersen series, you will want to read this one to find out more about what happened to Annie's little sister over twenty years ago. "As if the last few months haven't been hard enough—complete with the threats on her life and the return of her first love, Jon—Annie has to figure out whether or not to believe a woman who claims to be her sister, Sarah, who was abducted twenty-four years ago at age five. Annie's eight-year-old daughter, Kylie, has plenty of questions about what's going on in her mother's life—but... (continued on the next page)

there are some stories Annie doesn't want uncovered. As Annie grapples with how to heal the gulf between her and her would-be sister and make room in her daughter's life for Jon, she's professionally distracted by the case of yet another missing hiker in Michigan's Upper Peninsula. A woman named Michelle Fraser has now been abducted, and though the woman's estranged husband is at the top of their suspect list, Annie and her colleagues will need to dig deeper to determine whether those recent mysteries are truly as unrelated as they seem."


Consistory Meeting Highlights

September 11, 2023



Meeting Minutes

- MMSA the transfer of Angela Kooiker (Van Tilburg) and sons to the First Reformed Church in Boyden, IA.
- MMSA Outreach Team's request to use parking lot for Harvest Festival/Trunk-or-Treat on October 31.
- After spending time discussing discernment around denominational connections. The consistory has decided that we need to prepare our congregation before we can ask them to vote about denominational affiliation. It was discovered that we are really not unified as a congregation in our theological understanding and faith beliefs. On September 11 the consistory decided that we needed to make a diligent effort to help our congregation understand our beliefs in regards to the Standards that were established by the Discernment Teams. Those standards are:
 1. Biblically teaching the inerrant word of God
 2. Consistency in teaching and beliefs
 3. Best teaching for spiritual care of the congregation
 4. Denominational decision must be long term
 5. Church government/polity to maintain our biblical standards
 6. Pastor/seminary education and standards

Dear Friends and Supporters,

This July marked 120 years since St. Paul's laid the cornerstone of the first School of Divinity building (July 28, 1903). The first divinity classes actually began in 1888 but the school's history goes back even further. In 1876, the school began with basic education

for a handful of freed slaves and their wives. As more people became Christians, there was a growing need for training pastors and so the School of Divinity was born.

Originally an Anglican school, eventually other churches began sending their students to St. Paul's including those from Methodist, Presbyterian, and Reformed traditions (and others). With that spirit of ecumenism, St. Paul's United Theological College continued growing.

Around the time of their centenary celebrations, the School of Business was started in recognition of the growing need for Christian higher education. In 2004 when we first came to St. Paul's, Rowland was part of a small team that pioneered the business degree (due to his Economics background) while also teaching students who were studying to be pastors.

In 2007, the government of Kenya granted St. Paul's a charter as a university and the name was officially changed from St. Paul's United Theological College to St. Paul's University.


Since being recognized as a university, many other degree programs have been added. Among them include counseling psychology and social work, whose students Jane teaches. As the Business program has grown, Rowland has shifted his focus back to the School of Theology where he teaches and organizes their weekly fellowship.

Last week, the entire St. Paul's community celebrated its rich history by holding a prayer walk around campus. It has been good to not only think about all the things that have been accomplished in the last 120 years but also about what God has in store going forward for both the School of Theology and the University as a whole.

The future of higher education in Kenya is uncertain as the number of students qualifying for admission is increasing but government funding for all of them is not. Recently, it was announced that 140,000 qualified for admission, but only 40,000 will be given full scholarships. Others will have to take out loans or pay full tuition. That will be very difficult given the current economic situation. Recently two Reformed Church of East Africa (RCEA) pastors, Daniel and Moses (see them in the picture above with us by the cornerstone) approached us for help with tuition as they desire to come to St. Paul's for their Bachelor of Divinity degree. As pastors in the RCEA, they receive a very small salary. Without sponsorship, their dream of further study is next to impossible. There is an RCA-SPU student scholarship fund for needy students, however, we need your support to ensure there is money for these scholarships. Operation Christmas Child



Nalaikh, Mongolia, is home to 40,000 people in the winter, but only around 30,000 each summer as herders head out to the countryside to care for their animals. A district of Ulaanbaatar located about an hour from

the capital city center, Nalaikh has two mosques and 15 churches. However, only one of them is focused on reaching the Kazakh minority group, which comprises 20 percent of the population.

"In Mongolia, Kazakh church is a very new concept," said Serik*, a Kazakh who was once a herder and today pastors Good News Church. "The main religion for Kazakh people is Islam, and it's quite challenging to be a Christian."

Family is everything in the Kazakh culture, and for those who make the decision to follow Christ, family ties can be strained. But God is using Operation Christmas Child shoebox gifts sent by Samaritan's Purse to open doors in Kazakh communities that were previously closed by tradition and other religious beliefs.

"Gifts are very nice and Kazakhs have a very good culture of exchanging gifts," said Pastor Serik, who has partnered with Operation Christmas Child for the past five years. "We've learned that everybody is happy receiving gifts and nobody has opposed us."

As his church delivers shoeboxes, he sees that each gift is much more than a collection of toys, school supplies, and personal care items.

"Shoebox gifts are indeed a Gospel opportunity," said Pastor Serik. He finds that gift-filled shoeboxes also warm parents' hearts and open up discussion with the church members who distribute them. And news spreads fast in the community! When one boy or girl receives a shoebox gift, others immediately take interest in the fun items inside and want to know why they were given.

Opening Doors for the Gospel

Thirty children recently gathered at Good News Church to hear the Gospel of Jesus Christ and receive gift boxes packed with care by loving individuals around the world.

Twins Medina* and Emina*, 11, dressed in their best for the special occasion. It was their first time back in a church since they were 5 years old.



Their dad is a truck driver and their mother works in a cafeteria to support the twin girls and their two siblings. Among all the exciting items in her shoebox gift, Medina especially enjoyed the notebook, because she loves to keep a journal. For Emina, her favorite thing was a pencil case, because it had the image of a teddy bear on it. The message that came with the gifts was even more intriguing. "It was interesting to hear how man was created," Emina said, excited about what she had learned about God, as well as the gift she had received.
