

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One of the best bits of advice I've ever gotten was "scrutinize the obvious." In other words, take a close look at the things we are so familiar with that we don't pay much attention to them anymore. We think we know what they are and why they are significant. Sometimes, though, we are wrong. Familiarity can breed unfamiliarity, which can breed contempt. This happened to me with

the word "gospel" awhile back.

I was listening to an audiobook a few years ago, and an interesting question was posed by the professor who was instructing a class full of pastors working on their doctoral degrees. The question was this: What is the gospel that Jesus preached? You would think that I would be able to answer that immediately, being a professional Christian and all. But I was stumped. Then the instructor went passage by passage in the Gospels.

Now after John was put in prison, Jesus came to Galilee, preaching the gospel of the kingdom of God, and saying, "The time is fulfilled, and the kingdom of God is at hand. Repent, and believe in the gospel." -Mark 1:14-15

And Jesus went about all Galilee, teaching in their synagogues, preaching the gospel of the kingdom, and healing all kinds of sickness and all kinds of disease among the people. Matt 4:23

And as you go, preach, saying, 'The kingdom of heaven is at hand.' Matt 10:7

I would also encourage you to look at Luke 8:1, Luke 9:1-2, Acts 1:3, and Acts 28:31.

The good news... the gospel that Jesus preached... concerned the Kingdom of God. Just to be clear, Jesus was not announcing the existence of the Kingdom. The Jews knew God was a king who had a kingdom. Jesus is announcing the present availability of the Kingdom as a place where human beings can dwell. It is available to anyone who would place their confidence in Jesus for every issue of life and death, and then would follow him and learn from him how to live.

Now, of course when we place our confidence in him for every issue of life and death, that includes the forgiveness of our sins and heaven when we die. But it includes much more than that. It includes God's goodness and power being brought to bear on every issue that concerns us, frightens us, threatens us, or vexes us. If I were to sum up the gospel that Jesus preached, I would say it this way:

There is an invisible Kingdom of complete sufficiency, peace, and power. You can enter it right now, where you are, and live in it. From that place you will progressively receive all of its benefits by placing all of your confidence for everything in Jesus, and learning from him how to live by interactively following him moment by moment.


It is certainly true that Jesus is concerned about the forgiveness of sins and where we will spend

eternity. Those are important issues! But they are not where you and I normally live our day-to-day lives. In the "sin management" versions of the gospel, sin is primarily something you need to be forgiven of so that there are no eternal repercussions. Thus the gospel has been reduced to something that's only relevant to you when you're getting close to dying. But sin does a lot more damage to you and to others than just rendering you guilty before Almighty God. And the gospel of the Kingdom is a gospel for living as well as dying. It's about transformation of human beings into Christlikeness starting here, right now. Anglican theologian NT Wright has said that we are so obsessed with getting people into heaven that we've forgotten all about getting heaven into people. I believe he's correct.

God's great plan for his people is to produce a people with a different sort of character from the worldlings. We are intended to be those who shine like lights in the midst of this "crooked and perverse generation." (Phil 2:15)

A major piece to this puzzle comes in the fact that **we do not change by simply trying harder**. We change by Spirit assisted training. Training is doing small things that you can do right now, which will eventually enable you to do big things that you can't do right now. The life of discipleship is a life of Spirit-assisted, grace empowered training which will enable us to become people who are genuinely possessed by love and genuinely do the right sorts of things more or less automatically most of the time because our hearts have been transformed from within. Trying is dying. Training is reigning.

In the coming months I am going to be offering opportunities for short-term training exercises. They might be aimed at your temper, or your tongue, or your impatience, or your lust, or your need to dominate and have your own way, or any number of issues that we commonly struggle with. The goal is for God to get into the places in your being where these habits lodge and to begin to root them out so that you can be progressively freed of them. This is the life of the disciple... the apprentice of Christ. You are cordially invited to enter into a life of training for discipleship.



Action Point

Do you suffer from cravings? My sweet tooth is a real thing. If there are sweets in the house, they don't last long. Confession time: I used to blame the girls for sneaking the sweets when in fact it was me who opened the chocolate chip bag.

I get so angry with myself when I lack the self-control to walk past the candy dish without sneaking a piece or two. Who am I kidding - there isn't anything IN the candy dish.

<u>Dictionary.com</u> defines craving as a powerful desire for something. I actually loved the synonyms just as much as the definition - a hunger, a longing, to desire, hankering.

God made us to crave. Think about it - a powerful desire for something (or Someone). Now I don't want to use God as an excuse to eat the chocolate bar currently in the freezer saved for s'mores, but I do think I was made to crave Him, to hunger for my Savior, to seek

after Him with the same passion I do for that Hershey's. (Seriously, I can hear it calling my name and it's only 8:00 AM!)

My sweet tooth craving can consume my thoughts, yet does my mind spend as much time on God?

I'll admit, just writing that overwhelms me. How can I focus on God? All. The. Time. There are so many other thoughts that crowd my day - finances, health, relationships. How can I always be craving God?

Maybe it's more about keeping things in perspective. God first, and then align that with the myriad of other thoughts that bombard us every day. For example, how can I use my finances to show God's love for others? Am I being a good steward with my finances? I'm going to trust God because right now I have only \$20 in the bank.

With relationships: God, help me to be a better wife when all I want to do right now is turn away. Or: how can I show the love of Jesus to a 13 year-old who only wants to roll her eyes at me and slam the door? How can I love on my nephews and nieces when I live so far away?

When Craig was diagnosed with his kidney disease, our faith grew exponentially, because health was the one area we couldn't control the outcome. But the Great Physician can (and does). We began to lean on and trust Him each time we left an appointment disappointed, and we cried tears of praise when his health began to turn around. Are we out of the woods? No, but we know Who is in control.

The Bible has so many verses, especially in Psalms about longing, hungering, craving God. "Just as a deer that craves streams of water, my whole behind craves you God." (Psalm 42:1) "For he satisfies the longing soul, and the hungry soul he fills with good things." (Psalm 107:9) Cravings are often seen as something negative calling, but what if we turn it around and see it for what it's meant to be - a powerful desire for Someone to be the center of our lives. What if instead of Hershey's calling me, I listen for the Savior's voice?

No doubt, it will be a much sweeter conversation. (And a lot less calories.)

tion collection. Following are the synopsis from three books that have been added.

The first is CAPTURED SECRETS by Carmen Peone. Ms Peone is a Native American and lives with her tribal husband on the Colville Confederated Indian Reservation in Washington state. "After her parents die in a horrific car accident, Sydney Moomaw is thrust into running their guest ranch in easternWashington. She soon discovers that her parents were keeping secrets. Why is the ranch in serious debt? Why did her parents allow the insurance to lapse? Why

didn't they tell her about it? And where are their wills? Sydney needs to figure out a way to save the ranch she loves before her sister sells it. Photographer Trey Hardy arrives at the ranch the same day Sydney's parents are killed. His working-vacation plans change when he decides to help Sydney save her ranch. But, his offers to help are met with resistance. Her stubbornness and independence are both maddening and alluring. Amid the tangle of finances, tension with her sister, and her own grief and anger, Sydney begins receiving threatening notes. They must be from her abusive ex-husband, but he's in jail. Isn't he? When a teenager appears at the ranch insisting she is Sydney's daughter, Sydney

finally realizes she's going to have to start trusting people to help her. Will Trey's plan work? Can they save her beloved ranch. Can she really have the life she's dreamed of?"

EVER CONSTANT by Tracie Peterson and Kimberley Woodhouse, Book #3 in the 'The Treasures of Nome' series, is next. "On the surface Whitney Powell is happy working with her sled dogs and welcoming the new additions to her family through her sisters' marriages and an upcoming birth. But her life is full

of complications, including an estranged father, that have her on the edge of losing control. Growing up, she was the strong sister, and she can't give that up now. When villagers in outlying areas come down with a horrible sickness, Dr. Peter Cameron turns to Whitney and her dogs for help navigating the deep snow, and they become close while ministering to the sick together. Peter has long recognized her finer qualities but is troubled by the emotions and secrets she keeps buried within. He wants to help but wonders if she is more of a risk than his heart can take. As

sickness spreads throughout Nome and another man courts Whitney, she and Peter will discover that sometimes it is only in weakness that you can find strength."

Last is book #2 of 'Regency Mysteries', MILL-STONE OF DOUBT by Erica Vetsch. "Caught in the explosion of the Hammersmith Mill in London, Bow Street runner (police officer) Daniel Swann rushes to help survivors only to find the mill owner dead from a gunshot—with no sign of the killer. While the owner's daughter Agatha Montgomery, mourns his death, she may be the only one. There are more than a few people with motive for murder. Unfortunately Daniel can't take this investigation slow and

steady because the clock is ticking until his mysterious patronage—and his job as a runner—come to an abrupt end. In his frustration, it seems to Daniel that, like his earthly father, his heavenly Father has abandoned him. Lady Juliette Thorndike is Agatha's bosom friend and has inside knowledge of the wealthy London ton (upper class), making her invaluable to Daniel. She should be in a perfect position to help with the case. But her trusted instructor in the art of spy craft orders her to stay out of the investigation. obeys—that is, until the murderer strikes again, and she is dropped into the middle of the deadly pursuit right along with the Bow Street runner. When Chelsea and I reflect over the last several months, it seems like a bit of a whirlwind! To label it as "a period of transition" would be a vast understatement. By God's grace, we were able to conclude our time as pastors of Fairview Reformed

Church in Fairview, IL, in a healthy and bittersweet way. While packing, holding garage sales, and saying goodbye to dear friends, we attempted to walk alongside our children as they prepared to let go of their home for the past five and a half years (really, the only home that they could remember!). The day after our last Sunday of preaching and leading worship and after a full few weeks of cleaning and packing, we shipped out on an itinerant journey throughout the Midwest.

Michigan. Iowa. South Dakota. Different homes, different churches, different places to drag in a few suitcases and lay our heads for a week or so. While that might sound exhausting (which it was, at times), it also allowed us to connect again with beloved family members and friends, as well as the chance to create new friendships and partnerships with congregations in each of those places.

We were given the chance to share the news about how God was calling us to glorify Jesus with a group of people in Germany who had been gathered in the city of Hannover from around the world (RELISH: the Reformed English Language International Service of Hannover). We talked with congregations and with individuals about how the vision wasn't to grow a big church with a big budget, but rather to care for and disciple the families and individuals that God brought to Hannover—and then to send them back out to South Korea or Ghana or India after a few weeks, months, or years—however long their stay in Germany—to continue loving Jesus Christ and following him faithfully. Finally, we entered the latest phase of our whirlwind transition as we boarded a plane on August 5 (Lorelei's 11th birthday) and flew to Hannover! This, too, is a temporary stop as we will be heading back to the United States toward



it gives us a chance to begin leading worship and working on relationships with Christ's people in Hannover. This first couple of weeks have also been focused on transforming the apartment we inherited from Gretchen Schoon Tanis (the founding pastor of REL-ISH and fellow RCA missionary) into our own home—thanks in no small part to the many one-time gifts we received from generous and beloved friends throughout the world.

Each Sunday morning for the past few weeks, we've walked into churches that have historically housed ethnically German congregations, and we've seen something beautiful: people gathered together by the Holy Spirit from all around the world to worship the Lord with us. The South Korean pianist has just finished graduate school to become an orchestral conductor. Before worship, I speak with a Tanzanian theology student and a Ghanaian group of family and friends. We are invited to supper later in the week by

people from Finland, the UK, India, and Germany. God has created a beautiful gathering of his people here—each with strengths and challenges, each with a first hello (thinking of the couple who worshiped with us for a single Sunday on their honeymoon), and with a final goodbye (thinking of the South Korean woman moving home after spending the better part of a decade worshiping with RELISH). God has brought each of these people together to join us for a season, to grow and to help others to grow in their faith in Jesus Christ, to create something beautiful that will last longer than any one person's involvement.

Even as we minister to these individuals from around the world, Chelsea, especially, is working to bless other local congregations as well. In her work with the World Communion of Reformed Churches (WCRC), Chelsea is supporting their work within the Caribbean and North American Area Council (CANAAC) region. Chelsea is working with executive committee staff to organize this year's General As-

Jaki and A Toothbrush

I can attest to the need to put toothbrushes in shoebox gifts—I shared one with nine other girls in a Guatemalan orphanage.

I've never met my birth mother. People at the orphanage told me that she brought me there when I was a few months old. At the orphanage in Guatemala, the caretakers provided for our basic needs. They taught us, fed us, and clothed us, but their limited resources meant that we ate a steady diet of rice and beans and wore whatever clothes were available, no matter what the size. Sometimes, the girls wore boy clothes because that's what the orphanage had on hand. I don't remember us having any combs or brushes.

We did have a toothbrush—one toothbrush for 10 girls. We shared it, like we shared everything else. That's why I was so excited when we each received our own Operation Christmas Child shoebox gift.

My favorite thing I received in my box was a toothbrush of my very own. I got a lot of use out of it. It was a prized possession. To this day when I pack shoebox

gifts, I don't just include one toothbrush—I pack at least four of them in each box! That way, the children can use them for a long time, or have enough of them to give to their friends or family members.

I also received a stuffed animal. I was 5 years old, so I loved to hug it. I was delighted to receive crayons and coloring books. When the girls and I colored, there was no white space left on the pieces of paper. We filled every available space with color.

We received our gifts in plastic containers, so we kept our larger gifts in them. The possessions we really cherished we kept underneath our mattresses. I didn't receive a photo in my shoebox, but some of the other girls did. They kept the photos underneath their mattresses so they could pull them out to look at them then tuck them away again for safekeeping. I always include a photo and a letter in the shoeboxes I pack because I remember how much the girls treasured them. Even if they couldn't read the writing, it meant something to them that they were from those who had given them the gifts.

I had heard about Jesus at the orphanage. When we had received our shoeboxes, we learned the song, "Jesus loves me." But it wasn't until later that I truly knew who He is and that Jesus really does love me. A year after I received my shoebox, I was adopted by a couple from the U.S. My parents took me to church and, within the year, I accepted Jesus as my Lord and Savior.

I still love the song, "Jesus loves me." I love to sing—I'm on the worship team at church. I'm also a nanny, so I get to teach the song to the kids. Many of the children are from my church, which has packed shoeboxes for many years—long before I became a part of the congregation and began sharing my story. "I remember how much a photo and a letter were treasured."

I get to help the children pack shoeboxes. I tell them that I received a shoebox gift and answer their questions about what to put in the boxes. I explain how important basic items like paper and pencils are to a child who doesn't have them. They're amazed that I had to share a toothbrush— they couldn't imagine having to share things like that. But they grasp at an early age what it is to give to others.

I hope that my story will make a difference in other children's lives—both those who pack shoeboxes and those who receive them. I'm so thankful that someone took the time to pack one for me.
