We've talked a little bit about the social relations of the Children of Light, but I want to focus on that specific subset of relationships that occur between disciples in both the local church and in their relations with believers from other churches, particularly those which have a different theological emphasis from our own tradition.

As I've mentioned several times before in several different contexts, social relations in the fallen world are marked by relational aggression. They are marked both by attack and withdrawal. We meet people and we size them up. Are they going to attack us? Maybe we better guard ourselves by withdrawing to a safe social distance. Or are they somehow weak or damaged, ugly or fat or trapped in sin, or in some other way vulnerable? Teenagers will tell you that's when the wolves begin to circle the weak person and start a coordinated set of social attacks.

But if the truth be told, human beings generally don't grow out of this behavior. We may get a little better at masking it in socially acceptable ways, but the heart of darkness still beats in our chest. We are frightened of being attacked. We derive both subtle pleasure and a subtle sense of safety by being the attacker, particularly if we are joined by other attackers. If we are the aggressors, then we are the strong ones. That means we're secure from the attacks of others, at least for the moment.

Men and women both do this, but in different ways. Men's aggression is traditionally more out loud and out in front. If a guy doesn't like you, usually he'll insult you, yell at you, get up in your face, and maybe pop you in the nose if he thinks you deserve it. Women tend to band together and ostracize and try to destroy the target's reputation behind the scenes and set that person outside of the bounds of what are thought to be "the good people." This leaves them exquisitely vulnerable to further attacks and damage by others. It's been remarked by more than one sociologist and psychologist that what we describe as woke cancel culture is really just the institutionalization of female patterns of social aggression.

Personally I prefer the male pattern. A broken nose will generally heal. A broken spirit rarely heals on its own, and frequently won't completely heal, even with competent help. The old nursery rhyme about sticks and stones vs. words is a cruel, inverted lie. It's the stinging rejection of the words, said by that person you love and esteem, who is supposed to love you in return, and whom you thought had your back, which you will remember on your deathbed.

This is why the Apostle James speaks such clear warnings about the tongue and the restless evil that dwells in it. In reality the tongue is just the delivery mechanism. It's the heart that provides the poisonous ammo for the tongue to fire at its chosen targets.

This behavior is present in the church. Some churches are utterly captivated by it. Needless to say, this is a tragic situation. The church is the only place on this planet that absolutely shouldn't be marked by this sort of behavior. The child of light doesn't attack. She doesn't withdraw from others. She stands still in love.

At this point it would be good to define love as the Bible uses the word. Love isn't about warm feelings. It's great to have warm feelings. They make things easier, but they aren't love and they aren't necessary for genuine love to be shown. So what is love? Love is a steady desire for the wellbeing of another person, as God defines that wellbeing, and a willingness to do whatever is within your power to assist in accomplishing that wellbeing. You should memorize that definition. It will help you immensely when it's time to make loving decisions.

That means the question we ask when we want to love someone is not, "What will make this person happy?" Even less is it, "What will make this person like me?" Both of those merely lead you to flattery, a sin of dishonesty which the Bible condemns. Love says, "God, what do you want to do in this person? How can I help?" Often genuine love means speaking an uncomfortable truth and sticking to it, even when the person doesn't receive it, pitches a fit, and tries to get other people to hate you out of retaliation. We do this, not because the

person is bugging us and this is a fun way to retaliate. We do it because we are concerned that the person's sinful patterns of behavior are hurting them and hurting others. The most dishonest thing we can do is flatter them to their face and then run them down behind their back. But I see that in church all the time. I've caught myself participating in it from time to time. I say that to my own shame.

These things should not be found among us at First Reformed. We need to ruthlessly eliminate them. Immediately. Start by simply speaking less, and considering if what you do say is absolutely necessary. That will head a lot of evil off at the pass.

For Christmas in 1990, my mom made me a cookbook containing many treasured recipes - Grandma's recipe for freezing corn, Aunt Janet's glorified rice, and some others she thought I'd like to try. It was written in her beautiful handwriting, and I loved it. Because she left blank pages, I added to it - the Steen Ballstand's BBQ recipe (thank you Lorraine), a winter salad from Kathy, and Glenda's cheesy potato hotdish.

There is a family tradition handed down from my Grandma Stark - when you first make a recipe, you write the date, probably the weather, maybe the

price of corn (LOL), just something to help you document the importance of that date. I read recipes where I was pregnant with baby #2 or that this was a casserole I was testing out for Mission Fest. Truly my cookbooks chronicle my life.

As you can probably imagine, over time, that cookbook took a beating. I don't remember when the cover fell off. As a toddler, Ashley scribbled on the recipe for chili. Eventually, I needed rubberbands to keep the book from total destruction.

This weekend I purchased two small binders with page protectors and remade the cookbook...and I cried. Silly thing to cry over really, but for some reason, it made me cry. The pages are protected now; Mom's handwriting won't fade, crumbs won't discolor the pages, and I can easily add favorites to it.

So why did it make me cry?

Maybe because in February, 1991, Mom got sick. She contracted herpes simplex encephalitis - essentially cold sores on the brain. Her rare brain disease took a lot from her - and us - many of her memories, her sense of smell and taste, and at times her dignity. She was 47 years old.

I've cherished that cookbook because it was the last gift from my mom - the mom of my childhood - the silly woman who danced with a broom while preparing for my high school graduation party. Don't get me wrong - I'm grateful that my mom is still with us, and at 81 years old, she is a marvel, a living - breathing miracle. But February of 1991, the mom I knew was gone.

Mom's illness changed us all, but out of all that, I also learned so much. I witnessed first hand how a spouse lives out the vow "in sickness and health" not knowing nearly 30 years later, I would be walking the same journey. I watched a woman fight for purpose in her life. She still wonders why God had her live through something so difficult - and maybe we won't know this side of heaven - but she tries to live by her life's mantra, "One Day at a Time, Sweet Jesus (her favorite song)."

This morning, as I get ready for church, I'm looking for some comparison - some metaphor between the cookbook and becoming a new creation in Christ. We so often want to hold fiercely onto our past, but God offers us page protectors for the stories of our lives. We come to him with faded writing, crumbs, and water stains, and He makes our lives new - same ingredients, better hotdish.

I wish I would have taken a picture of that ratty old cookbook before I dismantled it. But now, when I take out my fancy new binder, I'll remember, I'm a new creation - fully protected and loved - just like the recipes for "Shipwreck" or Mom's "Happiness Cake."

How long does it take to translate the Bible?

That question is one of the most frequent questions I get asked. One answer to that question could be: less than ever before. Technology and software have revolutionized the process for get-

ting God's Word into more and more languages around the world. What took decades in the past, now is typically completed in years. At the forefront of that transformation sits a computer program called Paratext.

What do you do?

That is another question that I often get asked. I teach people how to use Paratext.

Over the past 30 years, I have been able to train people from around the world on how to use Paratext. In the 1990's, Paratext was more or less a basic text editor. With Paratext, the Bible translator no longer needed to open and close separate files for each chapter of the Bible. With a full Bible project, that meant they had more an 1,000 files to open, close, and maintain. Paratext could load the entire Bible



with a single click. Even in those first versions of Paratext, the translator had the ability to find anything anywhere in the Bible or quickly fix problems throughout the Bible. When introduced to Paratext for the first time, one translator said, I wish we had this program when we started 10 years ago

Over these past 30 years, Paratext has changed tremendously. It has been my privilege to have a part in guiding the development and improvements. At times, I was the voice of those on the field

who needed the software to do tasks that were challenging and time-consuming for translators. Over the years, Paratext continued to change so that the work was easier but without sacrificing quality. Faster but also better was the goal. I remember a translator saying, "I want our translation to be perfect." Paratext became the primary tool to manage, maintain, and move towards a faithful and meaningful expression of God's Word in thousands of languages.

It was exciting for me this morning to see a YouTube video which highlights the Paratext program. Typically, promotional videos will highlight translation projects in some exotic part of the world. Those videos are inspirational and I love to watch them. However, this video highlights Paratext. So, in a sense, it highlights what I have been doing these past 30 years.

Thoughts

At some time in your life, you may have heard a wise sailor recite this very old saying, "Red sky at morning, sailor take warning; red sky at night, sailor's delight." Well, you now know where it came from? I used to think those very wise sailors learned it from years on the high seas. I'm sure many of them have.

If you had to guess how long that saying has been around, you would have to go back before the time of Jesus. When Jesus was confronted by the Jewish leaders wanting a sign from Him, He used it to confront their hypocritical way of life.

He simply showed them that they could look at the sky and know how the weather was going to unfold that morning or evening. But, they could not understand the significant events that were unfolding right before their eyes.

Action Point

I think today it is so easy for people to get caught up in what the media and others believe and think about what is happening in our world, and yet, fail to evaluate for themselves what is really taking place.

Jesus wanted people to stop and examine the circumstances in which they found themselves and see the truth - that He was truly the Messiah and the fulfillment of scripture. Our world is not on a road leading in the right direction.

Jesus said in Matthew 7:13-14, "Enter through the narrow gate. For wide is the gate and broad is the road that leads to destruction, and many enter through it. But small is the gate and narrow the road that leads to life, and only a few find it, (NIV).

The narrow road with the small gate is Jesus. It is only through Him that one can be saved from his sins and receive eternal life.
