Dear First Reformed Church,

Grace and Peace be yours in abundance through the knowledge of God and Jesus the Christ, our Lord,

Over the last couple of years there has been much discussion around the human sexuality issue and the Reformed Church in America. I am hearing from the Consistory and members of First that you have felt out of the communi-

cation loop and have been wondering exactly what is happening. The box to the right sum-

marizes the three decisions that were made by General Synod in October of 2021.

Much time has been spent trying to decide what is best for each individual congregation and we will take the time to discern for First, Sibley as a congregation and consistory, what God's emerging future is for us. Here are some things that I would like you to be aware of as we begin the conversation this fall. **First, the RCA has not changed its official position on marriage and ordination. The RCA maintains a "traditional" view meaning that marriage is a lifelong covenant between a man and a woman.** Not everyone in the RCA sees this the same way but it is the "official" position.

Second, East Sioux Classis, to which we belong holds this same traditional view and that is who we are accountable to as pastors and a congregation. There may be people within our congregation who do not agree, but I believe our elder board continues to maintain the position that marriage is a lifelong covenant between a man and a woman. Just in the form of reminder, there were three recommendations from the team that came to the floor of General Synod:

- <u>Restructuring-</u> this recommendation included changing from geographical classes to affinity classes and formed a team to investigate how this could best be accomplished. This passed.
- 2) Form a Separate Global Mission Agencyglobal mission has always been important in the RCA and we have a strong presence outside of the North American continent. This recommendation would have formed a separate agency so that churches who were thinking to leave the RCA would still be able to support our missionaries.
 This did not note:

This did not pass. Global Missions remain under the RCA denominational structure.

3) <u>Generous Separation-</u> this recommendation allows congregations to leave the denomination and join another denomination while taking their assets with them. It spells out and streamlines the procedure. A congregation will be required to pay 4 quarters of assessments to the RCA. This passed.

Third, God is faithful. Churches do not need to be in a rush to leave the RCA nor must they abandon what they believe to be God's teaching on marriage and ordination. First's Consistory will continue to seek the guidance of the Holy Spirit as we seek God's emerging future for the denomination and our congregation.



Over the coming months we will have opportunities to gather to discern who we are as a congregation, and how God is calling us to minister to the community of Sibley and the world beyond. This will start with Discernment Gatherings where you will be invited to gather as a congregation, to hear information and to discern

together God's will. It is with this information that the consistory will ultimately decide regarding the Reformed Church in America.

As your Transitional Pastor, I count it a privilege to be able to journey with you in this discussion. There are hard decisions ahead for you. I encourage you to remain thoughtful and rational. Listen well to each other so that you remain connected as a community of faith. I am so happy to be serving Jesus with you as we journey into God's emerging future for First.

Thoughts

Do you have someone you love listening to



when it comes to telling about an outdoor adventure? Well, this past week I had the privilege of seeing two family patriarchs laid to rest - my wife's grandpa and a very good friend from work. Both of these men lived for Christ and dedicated their lives to making a difference for their savior.

I loved listening to my wife's grandpa tell his hunting stories. His eyes would light up when he started to share them, usually accompanied by a sheepish grin. As a young Christian and entering my wife's family through marriage, Grandpa became an important part of my own faith journey. As I was just getting grounded in the faith, we would have a family gathering - Thanksgiving, Christmas, or maybe the 4th of July. He was always there, and he was always quietly living out his faith. In his humble unassuming way, he was a steadying influence for all of us in the family.

As his wife faced Alzheimer's, he visited her every day in the nursing home for over a year. Most days, she didn't know who he was, but it didn't stop him from loving her until she passed. After she passed on, he moved to northern Michigan to live in his cabin. He pressed on for ten more years - until the age of 93, finding ways to contribute to his local church, neighborhood, and our family.

He encouraged me and helped build my own faith - just by watching the way he lived his life. He was a true Christian Patriarch for our family.

Action Point

I recently read that you really will never know the quality of a person until their later years in life:

- Why do the kids keep visiting?
- Why do the grandkids keep stopping by?
- Why are the neighbors always going over to that house for coffee?

When you've spent your life investing well in the things of God, there will be fruit - but it may not be seen until many years have gone by.

If you are like me and living a very busy life, just pause and take some time today to reflect on the quality of the life that you are living. Are you giving everything and every day to Christ?

There's going to come a time, when you and I are no longer on this earth. We will be dust. Make sure that you invest today and every day in the things that really matter to Christ.

I will miss Grandpa and my work buddy, but I know that they invested well and they are with Jesus today. I can only hope that one day, my life and the fruits of it will look like theirs.

Dania & A Radio

I was born in the Middle East in a country where 97 percent of the population—including my parents—didn't believe Jesus Christ is Savior and Lord. My parents moved our family to another country in the region to pursue a better future. There they met a pastor who shared with them the hope of the Gospel, and they gave their lives to Jesus.



But instead of finding a better life, things were very difficult. The room we lived in was empty except for a few pieces of cloth we had to eat and sleep on. My dad worked two jobs, but it was still hard for him to provide for our family. Many nights I went to bed without food, or if there was some, it was raw onions and bread.

My wish as a 5-year-old was to have something of my own that was not passed down to me from other people. I told my mom, "I just want something new to help me feel that I am valued." Being a wise and Godly lady, she said to me, "Dania, I know it's hard for you to understand. Your dad and I can't give you new things, but I know Someone who can."

She taught me Psalm 23 and I prayed, "Lord, I want my own new things—things that will put a smile on my face that are not passed down to me from other people."

At that time, my family wanted to be able to keep up with the news from our home country, but we couldn't afford a radio or a television. So, we prayed together and waited.

After a little while, we went to church and found out they were giving away shoeboxes. I didn't know what that meant as I'd never received a gift of any kind before. When I eventually received my box, nothing mattered more to me. It put a joy in my heart that I'd never had before.


Before I could open it, I had to walk about an hour home because we couldn't afford a taxi. When I finally opened my shoebox gift, I was speechless. Everything in there was brand new! I found pencils, an activity book, a calculator, a stuffed bear, and soap that smelled so good. It hit me that this was the answer to my prayer. These items were my own from people we didn't even know.

Inside the shoebox was another surprise—a tiny radio! Out of a million shoeboxes, this one



came to my family the year we prayed for a radio. We all knew this could not happen apart from God. When I went to bed that night, I counted all the items in my shoebox and thought, *God is good*.

After living in that country for seven years, we went back to our own country to preach the Gospel. It was hard for us, though, because the Good News was often not accepted. As I watched my parents be harshly persecuted because of their faith, I was convicted that I needed to accept Christ for myself personally.



Alone in my bedroom one evening, I prayed through tears, "I am a sinner. My life is all yours, Jesus. Use it as you will."

As a believer, I was bullied by the teachers and students at my school. Despite this treatment, my dad continued to have Christian meetings in our home because we could not have a church.

One morning we went to my dad's shop where he fixed and sold watches and found oil poured over the front door. He found a note that said, "If you don't stop preaching the Gospel, we'll burn this door and kill you and your family." We still talked about Christ, though, and people were saved.

After nine years in that village, it became so dangerous for us that we had to get out of the country. As we departed, I had to leave everything behind—including my shoebox items. This was really hard for me.

After we moved to a third country in the Middle East, we applied to be refugees. Again, we prayed and waited. In 2010, more than a year after our application, God opened the door for us to come to the United States.

After being here two months, a woman from our church asked if I wanted to process shoebox gifts. Up until that point, I had no idea where shoebox gifts came from. When I arrived at the processing center, I was amazed to find so many people working like elves. But when I looked up and saw a banner with the <u>Operation Christmas Child</u> logo on it, I froze and realized these boxes were like my shoebox. I never imagined that I'd pack and process shoebox gifts like the one I received.

In May 2017, I graduated from Salem College in Winston-Salem, North Carolina, with a degree in education. Looking back, my shoebox was the colorful thing in my black-and-white childhood. It was proof to me that what my parents taught us about prayer was true: it is a strong weapon. 

Three more books have been added to the library, read about them below.



The first book is A STRANGER'S GAME by Colleen Coble. "Even though Torie Bergstrom hasn't been back to Georgia since she was ten, she's happy to arrange a job for her best friend at one of the family properties on Jekyll Island. But when Torie learns that her best friend has drowned, she knows it is more than a tragic accident—Lisbeth was terrified of water and wouldn't have gone swimming by choice. Torie goes to the hotel under an alias, desperate to find answers. When she meets Joe Abbott and his daughter rescuing baby turtles, she finds a tentative ally. The more Torie and Joe dig, the more elusive the truth seems. One thing is clear: someone will risk

anything—even more murder—to keep their secrets buried."



Lynette Eason wrote LIFE FLIGHT, book #1 of the "Extreme Measures" series. "EMS helicopter pilot Penny Carlton is used to high-stress situations, but being forced to land on a mountain in a raging storm with a critical patient—and a serial killer on the loose—tests her skills and her nerve to the limit. She survives with FBI Special Agent Holt Satterfield's help. But she's not out of the woods yet. In the ensuing days, Penny finds herself under attack. And when news reaches Holt that he may not have gotten his man after all, it will take all he and Penny have to catch a killer—before the killer catches one of them."



The last book is for children ages 3-7. Have your children experienced a "Bully?" DON'T CRY, LION! BY Dandi Daley Mackall might be of help to you. The Role of Empowerment in Poverty Alleviation

"They must want it more than you want it." You might have been told that once or twice if you have ever invested time into a person going through hardships. There is wisdom in those words. So often, poverty alleviation is portrayed as an easy pro-

cess where all you have to do is give people what you think they need and they will thrive. If only poverty alleviation was that easy. We have learned at the Center of Hope that the needs of people in poverty are more complex than mere handouts. They must want to get well. They must be willing to put in the work to get well. If they aren't willing, they will remain in poverty. Period. What people in poverty need is empowerment. They must be empowered to 1) grow in their relationship with our Lord Jesus Christ, 2) use their God-given gifts to bless our community, and 3) view work as a form of worship. That is why we started our Earn-Your-Way program. In the program, guests who are looking for work can earn bicycles, IDs, birth certificates, work clothing, and work shoes/boots through community service at our partnering agencies (Bishop Dudley Hospitality House, Union Gospel Mission, The Banquet, Kingdom Boundaries, Salvation Army, and Health Connect of South Dakota).

The program officially started last summer as the Earn-A-Bike program in our Geared-To-Empower Bike Ministry but due to the success of the program, we expanded what we offered in the program and changed the name to Earn-Your-Way. We hope that this program will be the first domino that falls to lead people to self-sufficiency. We have been greatly encouraged by the number of people who have been helped through the program. Our guests have earned what they need to get back on their feet in dignifying and empowering ways by using their God-given gifts to bless our community through community service.



When our guests leave the Center of Hope with a bike, helmet, and bike lock, they leave with dignity knowing they earned everything they received. There is no shame. No hierarchy of giving. They do not owe us anything for the items earned. They leave the Center of Hope as equals knowing they made a positive difference in our community. They leave connected to a local nonprofit that cares for them, and they know where to go if they ever want to give back to the community again. Poverty alleviation is all about empowerment. People must want to get well to get well. They must have some sweat equity in their growth. Don't rob people of working towards their own betterment. You can walk alongside, guide, pray for, and encourage. However, let them have some ownership in their growing process and empower them to press on. We understand this at the Center of Hope. We understand that mere handouts are not sufficient as we walk alongside people getting out of poverty. There is a time and place for handouts. However, empowerment is key. Empowerment to live into our purpose of loving God and people through work will bring about lasting change.
