Since August, the Consistory has had three regular meetings and one special meeting to consider the path forward for First Reformed Church regarding a decision about our affiliation with the Reformed Church in America. We have been diligent in prayer for the Holy Spirit's guidance in our discussions and fact finding. It has been of utmost importance to seek God's will in determining our journey forward into God's emerging future.

As we have prayed and discussed different paths, a couple of things have become abundantly clear. First, there are no easy paths. Whether we leave or stay, we will experience loss. Possibly from members who disagree with a stay or go decision, most certainly from the RCA if we leave. This is not a simple decision. It is fraught with danger and implications at every turn. Will we be able to find a pastor in a new denomination? To what denomination do we move? The questions and the unknown are often overwhelming. Second, there is a spirit of division that is at work in our church that has been present for a long time that has caused disunity. It has manifested itself in the denominational discussion, but goes even deeper to our theology.

As your consistory has considered the denominational question, it became clear that as a congregation we are not ready to move to a different denomination because we may not even know what we believe about our own faith much less be able to say that we fit within another denomination as a unified body of believers.

At the August consistory meeting the Discernment team presented a list of 6 standards that they used to guide their discernment of the RCA and the other denominations to be considered. Those standards are:

- 1. Biblical teaching the inerrant word of God
- 2. Consistency in teaching and belief
- 3. Best teaching for the spiritual care of the people
- 4. Long term decision-100 years or more
- 5. Church government/polity to maintain biblical standards
- 6. Pastor/seminary education and standards

Your consistory has determined the path forward to be that we as a church need to know what we believe and be able to articulate our faith before we can decide any sort of denomination affiliation question. Their plan is to lead the church to unity around these 6 standards. Their charge to you as the church is that you take to heart and participate in the opportunities that will help build unity. Here is how we hope to do this over the coming months.

1. Biblical teaching the inerrant word of God

This happens every week from our pulpit during our Sunday morning worship service. Not only does Pastor Troy preach the Word of God but all of our worship is connected to scripture through song, liturgy and the sacraments. We also have numerous opportunities for bible teaching in Sunday school and small groups throughout the week. Elders believe that these opportunities are beneficial and should be taken advantage of by our membership.

2. Consistency in teaching and belief

Currently, we are affiliated with the Reformed Church in America and our creeds and confessions unite us in our faith. Pastor Troy has led three different classes on the Apostles, Nicene, and Athanasian Creeds. He has a 4-part sermon series planned on the Heidelberg Catechism and will offer classes on both the Belgic Confession and the Canons of Dort before the end of the year. These creeds and confessions are subject to the authority of scripture but give us a place to stand. As elders and deacons, we take vows to "be loyal to the witness and work of the Reformed Church in America." Our standards (creeds and confessions) show us what that witness and work looks like.

3. Best teaching for the spiritual care of the people

Your board of elders is charged with your spiritual care. They have oversight of all members and they are charged with equipping everyone to live in harmony with God's Word. They ensure that the word is rightly proclaimed and taught and that the sacraments are faithfully administered. The elders are fulfilling their role and they are encouraging you as members to take advantage of the opportunities. It is not up to them to make you care for your spiritual health. They equip you to do it.

4. Long term decision-100 years or more

It was important to the discernment teams, after talking with other churches and the processes that those churches went through to decide to leave, that any decision that we make be one that was long-term. Your consistory plans to abide by this as well. There is concern that some of the organizations and networks that have developed will not be around at some point in the future because they were not well thought out from the beginning.

5. Church government/polity to maintain biblical standards

Our church government needs to hold all churches accountable to the biblical standards that we hold too. Currently, East Sioux classis is where our accountability lies and the classis holds to the traditional view of marriage.

6. Pastor/seminary education and standards

It is important that our pastors be theological trained and that we maintain the theological standards for our pastors and our seminaries.

Together we will step into God's emerging future for First, Sibley. Your consistory believes that together we can grow into the unified Body of Christ to which we are called and that there is hope for wonderful ministry as we journey together.

Thoughts



My son and I were sitting in our stand just before dark when we heard the shot ring out from a friend hunting nearby. I said, "Let's get going; she'll need help loading up her kill." We got there just as she was reaching her four-wheeler and went to help her load up. She had shot a nice feral hog. Once loaded, we went back to our vehicle and followed her into camp.

On the drive, my son said, "Do you know why she got that hog?" Having seen nothing to shoot for days, my thoughts ran to, "It was the only thing that stepped out under her feeder." Before I could make the flippant answer, my seven-year-old son quickly replied to his own question, "Because God blessed her."

That hit me hard. I was flooded with embarrassment over the shallowness of my own thoughts and pride over my young son's insight.

Action Point

Ah, the wisdom of the child. As His disciples were trying to shoo away the children in Luke 18:15-17, Jesus said that the kingdom of God belongs to such as they--trusting, innocent, believing, dependent.

Dependent: dependent upon parents to provide food and shelter; dependent upon parents to provide guidance; dependent upon our Heavenly Father to provide our daily bread.

Are we dependent daily upon our Heavenly Father or our own self- sufficiency? Are we providing spiritual guidance for our children? When our children provide spiritual insight to us, do we listen and take heed?

Marina in Egypt: One Among Many

In the slums of the coastal city of Alexandria, Marina, 11, attended an Operation Christmas Child outreach event where she received a gift-filled shoebox. Brimming with toys such as a stuffed clownfish, a puzzle, a pen, and a stuffed cat dressed in purple overalls, the gift from someone far away delighted her heart.

"The thing I liked most from the box was this cat called Bundle," Marina said. "I love it very much."

But Bundle was far from the most important gift she received that day. She also learned about God's free gift of salvation at the outreach event, and it prompted her to make a significant decision. "When I accepted Christ, it changed my whole life."

Marina went on to participate in follow-up discipleship lessons where she learned about how to follow her newfound Savior and share Him with others by studying 12 Bible stories including creation as well as Christ's crucifixion and resurrection. She said, "Each lesson, I actually learned something new about God."


Now seven years later, Marina teaches these same discipleship lessons to other shoebox recipients at her church. She does so because she desires others to have the same input in their lives as she received and called, "Wonderful!"

She also still keeps her shoebox gift intact with all the items inside it to remind her of God's great love for her. Marina said, "It's not easy to keep something for seven years, but because I like it, I did!"

In addition to opening her heart up to God, the shoebox gift taught Marina a significant lesson about giving. "I think the whole idea is that if I send something to someone, I don't have to appear," she said. "I don't have to be the one that gets the credit, but God can send me something from someone I don't know and it can change my life."

Marina is one of 200 million shoebox gift recipients and 50 million children discipled, but millions more boys and girls around the world need to discover God's love for them, just as she did. God can use you to help change the lives children like her simply by packing a shoebox! **National Collection Week is coming Nov. 13-20, 2023** when more than 4,500 sites will be open across the country to receive your prayerfully packed gifts.

CONFESSIONS OF A HISTORY JUNKIE

I love travel because I love to go 'see' history. I like art, old buildings,
 statues, and old documents. A couple of weeks ago my sister and I headed to
 Great Britan (primarily London and Edinburgh) to take the trip we've been trying

to take since 2020. It was a great adventure!

We visited museums, art galleries, castles, palaces, cathedrals and Buckingham Palace. I am always drawn to the people and ideas that contributed to the world we live in today.

For example, at Westminster Abbey we got to see one of the 11 existing copies of the Magna Carta. This document was signed by King John and was the first guarantee of religious freedom and protection of the people under the law. It is part of the foundation of our own government as well as that of Great Britan. *If you can't get to London, the British lent the United States a copy and it is on display at the National Archives in Washington DC.*

I am a Reformation history junkie, and I had such a good time in Scotland! There were several places that were on my bucket list, including St. Giles Cathedral, Greyfriars Graveyard, John Knox' home, and Holyrood Palace to name a few.

I expected to see most of what we saw, but there were some great surprises! At Knox's home there was an original copy of Calvin's Institutes from 1536, along with a Geneva study Bible from the early 1600s. I saw a 10th century copy of the Gospels—that is still in use. Old documents!

The Cathedral at St. Giles was incredible. John Knox, preached from that pulpit, and it is considered the home of Presbyterianism. What surprised me was the way that true Reformed Worship was on display in the sanctuary. Unlike the Church of England cathedrals, St. Giles did not use the altar area or the quire. Instead the church worships in the common area, with a pulpit, a communion table and baptismal font. No Roman influences—just worship the way that Knox and Calvin would have approved.

Also on display at St. Giles was a document that brought me to tears. They have the National Covenant of Scotland, which was signed by about 330,000 Scots in 1638. The Scots refused to bow to the changes that Charles I wanted to make in the church. Charles wanted a more Roman style of worship and church order, and expanded authority as king. Signing the covenant was not rebellion but an appeal to the law of the land (*the Magna Carta*) against the tyranny of the king. To sign it was to say that Jesus Christ was the only head of the church, and so it should be free from any control by the king or the government.

The result was the English Civil War (1542—1651). Many Scots died in Battle, or were martyred, in this war, and the other civil wars that followed. In the end, they helped to end the rule of the Stewart Kings over England and Scotland and established Presbyterianism in England, Europe and America. *Read a book called "Fair Sunshine" for short biographies of some of the martyrs.*

So, why do all of these old words mean so much to me? As R.C. Sproul always taught, there are **Consequences to Ideas**. He was right and this drives my desire to un-

derstand the ideas of those who have gone before us and have an influence on the world and the church today.

It may seem ridiculous or, at best, unnecessary to most people, but I have spent my adult life looking at how the ideas of the past influence our thinking and behavior today. It may not seem important, but when trying to understand why a politician holds a position that seems off base or a celebrity proposes something outrageous – I can probably tell you what led them to that position. It helps to understand so we can address the problems before us.

However, nothing, and I mean nothing, has changed the world more than the Bible. The words God has given us have had a more significant influence, for the good, than any other words ever! Look at these examples of how God's people, in obedience to his Word, changed the world.

The Roman Empire was a wicked society. They allowed all forms of sexual impurity imaginable, they practiced infanticide, and they allowed widows and orphans to starve. The early Roman Christians not only taught against these sinful practices; they did something about them. They took care of widows, adopted orphans and children left by the road to die, fed the hungry, and they practiced their faith in public. They strengthened family life by practicing marriage between one man and one woman. As a result, by the end of the Roman empire at the end of the 5th century, the Christian era had begun. For the next 1,500 years, Christian morality would rule Western civilization. *That era has ended.*

Augustine of Hippo (354-430 AD) wrote a theory of *Just War*. He taught (*among other points*) that warriors should only fight warriors – not women, children, and innocents. That was a new idea – and it has been part of our war theory in the modern world. We find it abhorrent what Hamas has done to women and children, but Hamas is not Christian and does not believe in Augustine's "just war" theory. They are only doing what all non-Christian Civilizations have done forever.

The Reformation built the modern world partly because Luther and Calvin taught that everyone should read the Bible – not just the clergy. You can't read the Bible if you can't read. So, the Scottish Presbyterians were the first to institute free public education to everyone about 400 years ago. As a result Scotland has been a leader in the development of many modern ideas and inventions, from capitalism (Adam Smith) to the telephone (Alexander Graham Bell). *Read more in "How the Scots Invented the Modern World" by Arthur L Herman.*

If God could do all of this through his people in the past, why not now? Do we really believe the Word is Gods' and we must obey scripture—even to death? Or, do we prefer to ignore the Bible by not reading or obeying it? God has proven over, and over, that he will bless those who call on His name. I believe He can work in America and the world in 2023, if we are faithful to Him. Do you? We must learn to live **CORAM DEO...before the face of God.**

Sampson has an amazing story.

I first met Sampson during a translation workshop in Nigeria, some years ago. The room was filled with translators from different teams and different languages who were all working on a project to get the Bible translated into their

language. Sampson was very quiet and sat in the back. However, I noticed when it got quite warm (actually hot) he would get up and adjust the fans around the room. Then, when some translators would struggle with how to do something on their computer, Sampson would get up, lean over, and offer to help. He did that on his own. He kept surprising me.

At the end of the event, I told the Bible Society that this young man was showing great potential. Sampson was not only able to do the complicated and technical work in Bible translation, he was

very aware of others' needs and able to help. I recommended that he be given an opportunity for advanced training.

A year later that happened

In that training event, Sampson and I were with translation supporters for the entire African continent. Again, like in Nigeria, Sampson was likely the youngest and least experienced person in the room. Instead of being with co-translators from his area and his own country, he was one of over fifty supporters and consultants from dozens of different countries. He interacted and engaged completely. I asked him to do a presentation to the entire group and he took it on and did very

well. It was a bit of a test to see if he could rise to the challenge. He did so with "flying colors." These past three or four years I have spent more time (via Zoom) with Sampson than any other person involved in Bible translation. Nigeria has hundreds of languages and a lot of work to do. I believe the investment of time has and will continue to bear fruit. Sampson is now married. He and Blessing have a son named, Excellent. He has committed to serving others not only in Nigeria but around the world. .

His amazing story began earlier.

In school, Sampson studied to become a science teacher. After graduating from university, he got a job in a local high school and taught for two years. During the second year, his uncle told him about the need for a Bible translator in their language, Epie. Bible translation into Epie had never been

done. Not one verse of Scripture was in their language. Even though Sampson was a Christian, he was surprised that his uncle would suggest he apply for the job of being a Bible translator. He was a teacher. In addition to that, even though Sampson had spoken Epie since childhood, he could neither read nor write his language. Needless to say, respecting his uncle's advice, Sampson applied for the job.

He was hired.

Not only did Sampson learn how to read and write Epie, but as the translation progressed he became the language and technology expert on the team. Their New Testament was published recently and they are well on their way to finishing the entire Bible. Praise God.
