I knew a man who saw hell. I'm going to call him Jerry, but that's not his real name. His brother and sister-in-law were members of the church I pastored in Sturgis.

Jerry was not a good guy. He was a raging drunk. His family had a history of violence going back generations. He was always angry. In his

earlier years he had been a trusted outsider among the biker gangs like the Hell's Angels and the Banditos. When those gangs, which were usually violently competitive with each other, needed to communicate and negotiate, Jerry was one of the people they would use to arrange a safe meeting. I got to know Jerry pretty well.

From the Pastor's

Jerry was an avid motorcyclist, of course. One day he was riding in Wyoming, somewhere not too far from Cheyenne, and he got into a terrible accident with two other vehicles. Jerry never wore a helmet. He died three times in the ambulance on the way to the hospital. He told me what happened to him when he died.

He said he was at the edge of heaven, and the person who was at the gate told him that he wasn't allowed in. "You're going there" the man said, pointing downward. Jerry looked down and saw hell. He said hell was huge and wide and black and terrifying. The thing he remembers best about it was the smell. He said the smell of hell was the worst stench he had ever smelled in his life. Then the person at the gate said, "Or, you can go back to earth for a while." Jerry chose to come back.

He was in the hospital in Cheyenne for six weeks and then he came to live with his brother and sister-in-law instead of going to a facility for his rehab. That's when I got to know him. He came to church with them while he lived in Sturgis.

Now, you would think that if someone saw hell, they would be so frightened that they would immediately turn to Christ and forsake their sins. To my surprise, however, Jerry seemed to feel no such fear. He believed that what he saw was real. He didn't think it was a hallucination or something like that. He never indicated that he thought that the person at the gate was lying. And yet he went right back to his old lifestyle the minute his bones and his bike were fixed. He didn't seem concerned about the state of his soul at all. He was repeatedly arrested in Rapid City for drunk and disorderly conduct and fighting. The cops took him to the hospital one night with severe DT's. The hospital recommended a three month in-patient alcohol treatment program. Jerry cussed them out, demanded a prescription for his DT's and went out and promptly got drunk again. He continued to live out of wedlock with his girlfriend. Lord knows what else he did. The last time I saw him was probably in 2016. I went to Spearfish to visit someone in the hospital and Jerry was there in the ER waiting room. I think he was high on something. We talked. I prayed for him and went upstairs to do my visit. In spite of the fact that he was an evil son of a gun, I actually liked Jerry, and Jerry seemed to like me. I also pitied him.

In Reformed theology we talk about total depravity. Total depravity doesn't mean that everyone is as bad as they can possibly be. Total depravity means that the totality of the person is infected with sin. There is no part of us that is untouched by sin, including and especially our minds. It's like there is a veil over our minds and we are blinded. That is why human beings are incapable of turning towards God by themselves. It's not that God is keeping a person at arm's length. It's that the person doesn't want God and is dead in trespasses and sins. Therefore he is incapable of turning towards God. The only person keeping an unregenerate man or woman out of a saving relationship with Christ is that man or woman. And apparently even seeing hell for yourself isn't enough to overcome that. You would think that would do it, but it won't. It takes a sovereign move of God to overcome that terrible trap. This is the basis for our understanding of predestination.

We must remember this when we speak to people whose souls are in peril and who need Christ. We cannot overcome total depravity with any human forms of persuasion. We can speak and maybe God will use our words, but if they resist, we must not badger them or try to manipulate them into "deciding for Christ." This is very destructive. Let everything be clear and honest and out in the open. Let us realize that this person isn't a Christian and doesn't want to be, and there's nothing we can do about it.

I am happy to report that Jerry did make a good end in just the nick of time. His sister-in-law texted me when I lived in Ohio to tell me that Jerry had died, and that he had prayed to receive Christ in the weeks before he died. I deeply hope it was a sincere profession of faith and that I'll see him when I arrive in glory.

It appears the torch has been passed on from our previous librarians to me. First off, thank you to Jeannette and Alfreda for faithfully taking care of our church library for so many years! I have always wanted to be a librarian and hope to do the best I can to keep up their good work!

On that note, for the rest of the year I will be adding a few new books each month. There are series that have new additions that I am excited to get into your hands! If at any time you know of a great author or have a book you would like to donate to the library, please let me know...I'm sure you all know how to find me!

This month we are adding three great new titles. Two selections continue two series that we have started in our library and one selection was a donated book from a new author!

Our first book, *Unfailing Love, is the third book in the When Hope Calls series*, by Janette Oke and Laurel Oke Logan. "When children go missing from the children's home, Lillian Walsh and Grace Bennet will do all they can to find them. With the future of the children's home in question and everyone struggling to determine their paths forward, they all begin to realize that sometimes loving well means making difficult choices."

The next book is book three in the *Treasures of the Earth series, titled A Hope Unburied* by Kimberly Woodhouse. In the bustling world of paleontology in 1916, Eliza Mills defies societal expectations to pursue her passion. Having published her early groundbreaking papers under a false name, she has finally earned her place at the Carnegie Museum and seizes the opportunity to work at Dinosaur National Monument with a renowned paleontologist. But things in Jensen, Utah, aren't what they appear. When Eliza gets the chance to dig up bones at a ranch with a dark history, it sparks a chain of events that will rock the very fabric of her carefully constructed world.

Our final selection this month, Songs of Naamah: A Novel of King David's Harem, is from a new author Gayle Walhof. the beautiful and gifted young Israelite, Naamah, finds herself ripped from the family she loves and brought into the harem of King David. There, she is forced to use her musical gift of song and composition while navigating the life of a concubine among powerful men, slaves, wives, and other concubines. Naamah must also face the terror that the king may discover her "secret," which would lead to her execution.

Through the eyes of Naamah and Reuel, the son of one of the King's advisors who has his own unique gifts of value to King David, the reader will live the tumultuous final years of David's reign: his adultery with Bathsheba; Amnon and Tamar; Absalom's rebellion; Census and plague; Adonijah's rivalry with Solomon. As the years pass, can Naamah keep her own dangerous secret safe, or will palace intrigue ultimately betray her? Can the sisterhood of the harem ever replace a family of her own? Will she ever know life other than as a powerful man's personal possession? Throughout, Naamah's songs of heartbreak and praise and King David's own cries to Yahweh recorded in the book of Psalms interweave an exquisite harmony of hope and redemption and lead to healing and love in the miraculous way only Yahweh can create.

"You meant it for evil, God meant it for good." "Beauty from Ashes"

The above two sayings (from Genesis 50:20 and Isaiah 61:3) have been resonating among our staff and board of directors since the fire that destroyed Lincoln Hall on the evening of July 30.

As we begin the cleanup of the rubble, it is challenging to envision beauty. However, we are reminded of God's sovereignty. We are grateful that no one was injured and that the adjacent buildings were spared from the blaze.

A significant amount of ashes ended up in our nearby swimming pool, which created operational issues with the filtration system. As a result, we decided to close the pool for the year to carry out extensive repairs. Several end-of-the-year parties had to be canceled because of this situation. However, an idea emerged to host a "Back to School Bash." We rented some inflatables, and students and their families had a fantastic time at the event. It turned into a wonderful celebration that arose from the "ashes." We are now considering making this an annual event.

Our vision statement is, "Impacting a broken and hurting world with the Christ of redeeming love." This reminds us that God can bring beauty from our brokenness, which is especially evident in our Project Restart program. This initiative allows us to work with selected inmates from the local detention center. Under our supervision, these inmates assist in unloading trucks at our thrift store and help with campus cleanup. Through our interactions with them, the inmates learn to trust us, and we have the opportunity to share the Gospel message—illustrating that our Lord is willing to forgive and will never fail us. It's a story of hope, a story of beauty emerging from our brokenness.

We do ask for your prayers, as we continue to navigate through the aftermath of the fire, for protection as we go through the cleanup process, and as we seek God's guidance on how to replace the building. Several of you have asked how to contribute to the rebuilding of our facility. Thank you for your partnership with us.







A Sign of God's Love

MINISTRY PARTNERS ARE USING SIGN LANGUAGE TO HELP DEAF CHILDREN LEARN ABOUT JESUS IN THEIR OWN LANGUAGE.

The Gospel message wasn't clear to Zahira until it was presented to her in her own language—a dialect of sign language the Cuban girl uses in the Dominican Republic.

At age 14 she was invited to an Operation Christmas Child outreach event led by a local church that has a ministry to the Deaf community. Interpreters used sign language to tell the children about Jesus Christ, God's Greatest Gift. That made the Gospel accessible to Zahira in what is called her heart language, a core way of communicating that produces a high level of comfort and understanding.

She watched intently as the story of Jesus' sacrificial, redemptive love expressed on the cross was explained in sign language during the event. In the following weeks, she attended *The Greatest Journey* classes, a follow-up evangelism and discipleship program for Operation Christmas Child shoebox gift recipients. Through each lesson, also communicated in sign language, she began understanding God's love in a way she hadn't before.

"I didn't know about Jesus," Zahira said. "I had no clear idea."

She realized that sin had separated her from God. She began to cry, feeling shame and regret. But she had hope after learning that Jesus had died and rose again to give new life to those who repent of their sin and turn to Him.

Zahira gave her life to Jesus, finding a Savior and His provision of a welcoming church community where she could find friendship, fellowship, and encouragement to grow in her faith.

She was overjoyed to receive a Bible as part of her graduation from the 12-week discipleship course. "Step by step, I kept moving forward and learning more each day."

"When I accepted the Lord, I first began to prepare myself and learn," Zahira said. "Step by step, I kept moving forward and learning more each day."

Zahira began sharing the Word of God with family and friends. Her mother as well as a friend gave their hearts to Christ. Zahira said *The Greatest Journey* equipped her with the knowledge and confidence to tell others about Christ.

"The whole plan was teaching us step by step," she said. "And I want to keep growing. I don't know the Word of God deeply yet, but I'm taking it step by step—growing, accepting, and learning." Caring for the Marginalized

There are multiple versions of sign language within a country or language group, with their own grammar and structure that can differ from culture to culture or community to community.

To help Operation Christmas Child ministry partners share the Gospel with deaf children in their communities, Samaritan's Purse is piloting the development of selected resources that make the content more accessible for translation into their local sign language. These elements will be especially helpful for presentations or talking one-on-one.



"Tell me ten things you can thank God for right now."

To be honest, when my mentor asked me this in the midst of grief and confusion and anger, I didn't want to respond. I didn't want to be thankful in the face of losing another unborn baby. Begrudgingly, I began my endeavor to search my life for evidence of God's goodness to me. Evidence that wasn't hard to find once I looked beyond the veil of sorrow.

Sometimes trials lay heavy on our shoulders, curving us inward and making it difficult to look up. Thankfulness can feel impossible when suffering closes in. When those times come, and come they will, maybe what we need most is to be reminded of what God has done and is doing. Yet, many of us also struggle to be thankful when our life is going smoothly. Instead, we might be anxious about what's to come or maybe we're busy living in a facade of self-sufficiency. Regardless of the season we face today, we can begin to cultivate a heart of thankfulness.

A Word on Thankfulness

God's Word is not silent on the subject of gratitude. In fact, thankfulness is often listed in the description of the new life in Christ (Col. 2:6-7, 3:12-17). Scripture says that Christians should "abound in thanksgiving" (Col. 2:7).

We're also reminded that in Christ, we always have a reason to give thanks to God (1 Thes. 5:18). No matter what trial may pop up in our life tomorrow, we can be thankful to God for who he is. The Lord deserves our praise and thanksgiving for his goodness. This truth is found all throughout Scripture but especially in the Psalms.

"Praise the Lord! Oh give thanks to the Lord, for he is good, for his steadfast love endures forever!" (Psalm 106:1)

We also learn from passages like Philippians 4:6 and Colossians 4:2 that thanksgiving should be part of our prayer life—that even among our anxieties and supplications lies a place for giving thanks to God. In the New Testament, the apostles often gave thanks for the work God was doing in the lives of other believers.

It seems it's expected that as followers of our Lord Jesus Christ, we should practice thankfulness. Yet it's hard sometimes, isn't it?

Roadblocks to Thankfulness

Certainly one of the biggest roadblocks to being thankful is suffering. We can quickly become blinded by our painful circumstances.

A helpful clarification is that God doesn't require us to call bad things good. Losing a child is not good. A woman being raped is not good. Cancer wreaking havoc on the body of someone we love is not good. Scripture doesn't claim that God makes bad things good; it says he *turns* them for the *good* of his people (Rom. 8:28). God uses bad things to sanctify his people and that is something we can thank him for.

As Christians, we have hope—we have reason to rejoice in our suffering because we have something precious that will never be taken from us: our salvation in Jesus Christ (Rom. 8:35-39). So we can thank God for the truth that he will never forsake us, that he promises to turn our pain for good, and that one day we will be with him in heaven and every tear will be wiped away (Rev. 21:4). Surprisingly, it's easy to forget to thank God for all his blessings when things are going well. Since the fall, we're prone to pretending we're self-sufficient. We forget that even the very breath in our lungs is something to thank God for. Literally everything good and beautiful that fills our life is a gift, and therefore we have never-ending reason to praise and thank God.

Another circumstance that may present us with a struggle to be thankful is our unrepentant sin

or shame from previous sin. We know we've sinned, and so we fear going to God. Here's a reason to give thanks: he forgives! We can go to him in repentance and ask for forgiveness and he promises to forgive us. Once you've gone to the Lord for forgiveness, don't let shame keep you from basking in his grace. Instead of wallowing in shame, lift your hands and sing praise to the God who bore all your sin and shame and has declared you *clean*.

Cultivating a Heart of Thankfulness

You know I can't leave you without some practical ideas to cultivate thankfulness in your life, right? Here are some things I've implemented that have stirred my heart toward gratitude.

- 1. Pray prayers of thankfulness throughout your day.
- 2. When struggling to be thankful, discipline yourself to write down ten things you can be thankful for right now.
- 3. Keep a thanksgiving journal where you write down five things every day, and then praise God for them in prayer.
- 4. Start your morning prayer with thanksgiving.
- 5. Remember to praise God for things he's done in the lives of others (and tell them, too).
- 6. Tell others of what he has done in your life and why you're thankful.
- 7. Open your eyes to even the "small" things you can be thankful for.

Seek accountability from a friend by sharing what you're thankful for with each other. This is not an exhaustive list, but I truly believe if you are intentional about a few of these, you will bear the fruit of being thankful.


The Fruit of Being Thankful
