

VALENTINES DAY!

It's February, and we are truly in the *bleak mid-winter*. We are halfway through winter and on our way to spring! Yet we also have a lovely (colorful) day set aside to think about love.

Americans will celebrate this year and are expected to spend about \$26 billion, or about \$200 per household. The most popular gifts are candy, greeting cards, and flowers. Many will include a special night out, while others will have a special meal at home. Hallmark acknowledges that Valentine's Day is the second largest card-giving holiday, but I am happy to report that more

will be candy. In general, men spend more on this holiday than women. In 2023 they spent \$286 versus \$103 (Lending Tree)

Do you know the origins of this holiday? A bit of internet research led me to the story of two different Valentines who were executed on February 14, in different years, by Emperor Claudius in the 3rd century. Both Valentines were declared martyrs by the Catholic Church, and so were given a feast day. In the Gelasian Sacramentary (8th century) mentions this feast day.

The modern romantic holiday may have its roots in the *Parliament of Fowls (1382)* by Geoffrey Chaucer. The story was written to commemorate the first anniversary of the engagement of two 15-year-olds - King Richard II of England to Anne of Bohemia. In the 15th and 16th centuries poems, letters, and essays emerged along with the idea of courtly love. A manuscript from 1415 is the oldest existing original Valentine poem. It is part of the manuscript collection at the British Library.

The invention of the printing press in the 15th century made it possible to invent the Valentine card, which became popular in the late 18th century. However, it was very expensive to purchase a card and send it. Paper and postage were not as inexpensive as they are today.

Mass-produced valentines emerged in the 1840s and were even embellished with lace and ribbons. As Christians, we are to love one another, and we ought to demonstrate that love in a way that honors God and is visible to the watching world. Read the next page to get a look into God's view of Christian Love and its importance in his view of our lives.

THE MARKS OF THE CHRISTIAN

In 1970, Dr. Francis Schaeffer published a small book titled *The Mark of the Christian*, and he considered it one of his most important works. The book focuses on two verses from the gospel of John that declare that Christian love is the true mark of the believer.

One is John 13:34-35 where Jesus says, "A new commandment I give to you, that you love one another, even as I have loved you, that you also love one another. By this all men will know that you are My disciples, if you have love for one another" (NASB).

The other is John 17:21, where Jesus is praying to the Father "that they all may be one; even as Thou, Father, art in Me, and I in Thee, that they also may be in Us; that the world may believe that Thou didst send Me" (NASB).

I found the emphasis that Jesus put on our love for fellow believers as the foundation for our witness to the world astonishing! Non-believers can judge our commitment to Christ, and they can judge whether or not Jesus was sent by God, by our love for our Christian brothers and sisters.

First, this love is not mushy or gooey. It is honest, and it is visible. We must be able to say we were wrong, we are sorry, and we must be willing to help others to do the same. We must care for everyone in our midst who is in need. We are to worship God together in love and to serve each other. This isn't about organizational unity or total agreement. It is about our bond with Christ and a love just for other Christians. The first century Christians astonished the world around them by loving the orphan and the widow, for breaking down separations by social standing, and for standing together in the face of extreme adversity. I have known this love at Sibley FRC!

Second, we are, as believers, to love others as well. This is a different kind of love. Christians are hold the answers to self-worth, identity, and dignity in our hands. Our world is convinced that we have to *find our own worth, our own dignity and to follow our own hearts*. The results are lost and lonely people who hate themselves, others and have the highest suicide rates in history. We know about the Good Samaritan and about loving our neighbor. This love we have the world searches for but can't find. As Schaeffer wrote,

"What then shall we conclude but that as the Samaritan loved the wounded man, we as Christians are called upon to love all men as neighbors, loving them as ourselves. Second, that we are to love all true Christian brothers in a way that the world may observe. This means showing love to our brothers in the midst of our differences-great or small-loving our brothers when it costs us something, loving them even under times of tremendous emotional tension, loving them in a way the world can see. In short, we are to practice and exhibit the holiness of God and the love of God, for without this we grieve the Holy Spirit.

Love-and the unity it attests to-is the mark Christ gave Christians to wear before the world. Only with this mark may the world know that Christians are indeed Christians and that Jesus was sent by the Father." (p.204)

Donations for baby supplies are needed!! Beginning on February 1st, and each month af-



There is something about the "D" word that just makes everyone shift in their seats or makes them uncomfortable. This "D" word is one that no parent truly wants to do, but it is something that needs to happen from time to time. That "D" word is "Discipline." This What is discipline?



Discipline simply means the practice of training people to obey rules or a code of behavior, using punishment to correct disobedience. What are we doing when we discipline? We are training our children to obey the rules and to know correct behavior. What does effective discipline look like? This is a great question because there is a lot that goes into this answer. What is your discipline accomplishing? What is the behavior you are disciplining for? These are all questions that one must ask before implementing discipline on your child. If we are wanting an answer to this question, we must always turn to the Bible first to see does God's word have anything to say about this question. Ironically, there is a lot in the Bible about discipline. Let's take a look at some these passages and see what God's word says about discipline.

Hebrews 12:11 ESV, "For the moment all discipline seems painful rather than pleasant, but later it yields the peaceful fruit of righteousness to those who have been trained by it." The author of Hebrews explains that discipline even though it is painful and unpleasant will produce fruit of righteousness. That is the whole concept of discipline is to have your children produce that fruit of righteousness. Proverbs 3:11-12, "My son, do not despise the Lord's discipline or be weary of his reproof, for the Lord reproves him whom he loves, as a father the son in whom he delights." Solomon explaining that discipline is not just from a good father, but also from God. There are consequences for our actions/sins and there are times where God shows us discipline. Solomon gives another controversial explanation of discipline and that is love. Parents who discipline their children show them love when they do it. Hence Proverbs 13:24, "Whoever spares the rod hates his son, but he who loves him is diligent to discipline him." Discipline is an act of love because, as I have stated in my previous article, you want what is best for your children and you care about the choices that they are making. Of course, in the moment it may seem that you do not love them, but that is the painful and unpleasant part that Hebrews 12 is talking about. Also, on this note from Proverbs 13:24 "the rod" is not just talking about discipline as a whole it is talking about spanking or a physical discipline. There is a context to this. One simple rule that Hannah and I follow when disciplining our children is that we do not leave a lasting mark on the kids. For example, bruises, cuts, etc. However, if you spank it needs to hurt, see Hebrews 12:11. On another note, if you have chosen not to spank, I do not think that you are sinning, and scripture would not say you are sinning. I just want to make sure parents realize that spanking is not abuse, it is an act of discipline. What about older kids? I would say that spanking loses its gusto after the age of about 15, but that does not mean that discipline still can't happen just because they are older. Take away phones, computers, or hanging out with friends.

In conclusion, it is hard sometimes to carry out discipline, because we don't want to see our kids in pain. If I can be honest for a second, there are moments after I discipline our girls that I have to go be by myself for a few minutes because personally I don't want anyone to hurt my girls and I was the one who put them in that pain. Then I have to remind myself that the pain goes away and that this is training them for that peaceful fruit of righteousness. Be unified together in this, parents. Do not try to do your own thing without talking to your spouse about it first, especially when it comes to disciplining your children. Next month I will be talking about the importance of being united in parenting. Thank you for taking the time to read my article and if you ever need a hug this big ole teddy bear has one for you.

- In our many interactions with students inside and outside of the classroom. Teaching is rewarding, but it was also nice to bond with students in less formal settings like off-campus trips, fellowships, and tea time with casual conversations.
- In our relationships with Christian colleagues at St Paul's. As the faculty and staff of St Paul's University have grown over the years, many well-qualified people have been added. These talented Kenyan Christians also serve here with dedication.
- In our student's lives after graduation. It is always rewarding to see how our students go out to serve God and humanity. For example, one of Jane's students is counseling men in his area struggling with alcoholism, and one of Rowland's students is serving as a youth pastor. Many lives are being touched and the love of God is expressed through these and other students.
- In the churches and fellowship groups we are a part of. The Reformed Church of East Africa added new congregations and ordained more men and women. Jane's spiritual formation group added more Kenyan women wanting to be mentored.
- In the good connections we made as we traveled and visited over half of our 19 supporting churches. Your prayers, concern, and care for us were encouraging. It was also inspiring to see and hear about the work churches are doing locally and globally.

As we look ahead to 2024, we covet prayers for the following issues and concerns:

- For the Kenyan economy to improve so that students can find good jobs and pay back their student loans so that the government can afford to offer more financial aid.
- For the Kenyan weather so that parents and families of our students can grow more crops and afford to pay their portion of university tuition, room, and board.
- For us and our Kenyan colleagues working and teaching at St Paul's. Pray that we have the time and energy to form meaningful relationships with our entering students.
