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A Future and A Hope



I'd like to take these next few newsletter articles to communicate with you a little bit about what I would like to see happen at First Reformed in the next few years. I'm not issuing any commands or telling anyone how things are going to be. That's not how I operate. Instead, I am floating ideas for discussion. These things will not be foisted upon you. They (or something like them) must be chosen by you.

First let me give you my analysis of how things are going at First Reformed. I think we have a few years to turn things around and ensure the future of the church going forward, but if we keep proceeding with business as usual, we'll be in a terminal decline pattern before long. Most churches that are dying don't really become aware of the fact that they are dying until it's waaaay too late to do anything about it. For that reason these next 2-3 years are critical in the life of First Reformed.

Most churches that are dying also have an unreasonable expectation that "if we just get the right minister in, that'll fix the problem." It won't. Things might have worked this way a few decades ago when most people were involved in church and therefore were seeking a place to attend worship. In that situation having a "better" minister (whatever that means) than the other churches in town might have been a draw. Today everyone who wants to be involved in a church is involved in a church. Those that aren't are fairly resistant to the idea of becoming involved in a church. Many people who do go to church are fairly committed to their chosen church under ordinary circumstances, but overall the numbers of people in American society who actually want to be involved in a church are declining. For younger people that decline is very steep. In other words, theirs is no floating pool of interested people waiting in the parking lot to beat down our doors every Sunday morning and check us out. There is a floating pool of consumers of religious products and services, and most of the churches that are "growing" are growing by recruiting these spiritual tourists. But they are notoriously finicky shoppers, usually don't stay around long, and our church isn't rich enough, big enough, or well-enough staffed to provide the expected levels of service to these sorts of people. They tend to frequent the big box megachurches, and generally aren't an asset to the health of the church when they are present anyway. They don't want to serve. They want to be served. Preferably by trained and paid staff so they can be more confident about the quality of the "product" they are consuming.

As a congregation ages, more and more of the members move into what church health experts call "Home and Hearth Mode." Nostalgia takes over. Losses accumulate. A kind of mild but pervasive sadness creeps in. "Change and decay in all around I see, O Thou who changest not, abide with me," says the hymn. The world changes all around you, and you want just one place in your life to stay the same. Often the church is the vehicle chosen for that nostalgia project. There are signposts when this starts to happen. For instance, people will begin to talk about how "out of control" the kids are these days. They become less tolerant of children (except their grandkids, who are perfect!) conveniently forgetting that their 7-year-old son almost burned down the barn in 1965 by trying to light his brother's face on fire with grandpa's pilfered Zippo lighter.

The idea that the kids just get worse and worse, and the parents softer and softer in each generation is an old and venerable one. One of the ancient Latin phrases I used to give to my students as an assignment was, "Antiquis temporibus, nati tibi in rupibus ventosissimis exponebantur ad necem!" Which translates to "In the good old days children like you would have been left to perish on windswept crags." Complaining about the rising generation is a truly ancient pastime. Children haven't changed that much. The fact of the matter is that as we age we often become less tolerant of noise, childishness, repetition, messes,

snotty noses, red Kool Aid, and little people zipping around underfoot making us feel vulnerable to a fall. It's us who change, not the kids.

I think "Home and Hearth Mode" is probably an inevitable part of aging, and I don't see it as necessarily negative, so long as it isn't allowed to become the main theme of the life of a church. I begin to feel the pull of it myself as I contemplate the fact that since overweight men don't generally live long lives, I probably have about 20 years left in this world, give or take. Sometimes I find myself looking back, wondering what I actually accomplished and what it all meant.

Let me also hasten to say that most older folks have endured a lot of loss. Many are lonely and socially isolated. They need to be in community, and the church should be a major source of this community. But they need two kinds of community: They need community with their peers, and they need community with those who are younger than them, so that they can bless, teach, and be a resource for those younger adults and teens. When Laura and I were in our 20's, our best friends were a married couple from church in their 50's named Kathy and Stan. Stan died of Covid in 2020, but I just spoke to Kathy on the phone last night for almost two hours. We are still close 30 years later. Kathy is a 77 year old woman, but when I am struggling, I know I can say anything to her and she will still love and accept me. The idea that people only benefit from relationships with people their own age is just stupid. We should be actively reaching both up and down from the rung of the aging ladder we are currently standing on. Grab a teenaged boy and help him work on his car. Grab a teenaged girl and teach her your super-secret snickerdoodle recipe. Ask them about themselves. Listen and don't give advice unless you are asked to. Pray for them. Pray with them if they will let you.

If too large a portion of a congregation is in Home and Hearth Mode, that's the end of the church, even if it takes another 5 years for the money to run out and the doors to close. The oldsters will find a million different subtle and creative ways to run the young families off, from snippy remarks about childrearing practices, to parking themselves in the prime meeting spaces in the church and refusing to share, to declining to fund or volunteer for programs that are designed to meet the needs of young families. The new ones who wander in the door won't stick around because there's nothing for them and their families in the church. In its most pernicious form, I've seen the oldsters want the younger people to join the church to give and serve, but change absolutely nothing. Two of the Presbyterian churches I served as a seminary student in the 90's did exactly that. These two churches were within blocks of 5 others that were in the same boat. They were all defunct within 7 years of me graduating from seminary. Basically they just wanted fresh labor and money to keep their club going a little longer. They didn't get any takers. It's hard to feel even a twinge of sadness that they are gone.

I'm going to round off this article by just giving a brief outline of my ideas for the future. Idea #1 is spiritual care for the senior citizen set. In particular, I would like to see a daytime group for anyone over the age of 55 that meets on, say, Wednesdays from 11-1. There would be a Bible study, a meal, maybe a craft or a project, maybe a guest speaker. Once in awhile we should take a field trip together.

I would also like to start a Meal Club for people who live alone. Cooking for one stinks. Getting all the single/widowed/divorced together once a month to cook 4-5 big meals that could be divided up and sent home with the participants to put in the freezer would provide both fellowship and a welcome respite from the relentless demands of finding something nourishing to eat when you don't feel like cooking, and you can't afford to eat out all the time.

From the Pastor's lay

#2 we need a really well promoted and well-run children's ministry. In my last church we did Awana because a lot of the materials were pre-prepared and you could just take it out of the box and implement it. Another church in town is doing Awana, so we probably need to look at a different, though similar program.

And we would do well to have a ministry to young parents at the same time. I spoke briefly to a young mother this past Sunday. During the conversation

I asked if her baby was sleeping through the night yet. Alas, he was not. I recommended a book that helped Laura and I enormously called <u>BabyWise</u>. Our kids slept through the night by about 2 months of age thanks to what we learned from that book. Momma was interested in that! A six week study on <u>BabyWise</u> could help a lot of young moms and dads with their sleep. Flexible, defined commitment groups targeted at young parents will help foster community and give young parents extra resources for living their lives. We need studies on Christian parenting, on being a Christian husband, on being a Christian wife, on being a Christian woman, etc, etc.

#3 we also need to think about the demographic makeup of the people who are moving to our community, because they are the future of Sibley. Broadening our outreach to build relationships with the Hispanics who are coming to town is a very wise move, but it is a heavy lift. The language barrier is not insignificant, but it is possible to overcome it. We especially need to be reaching out to their children (see #2 above!) who will become fluent in English pretty quickly and can provide an excellent bridge to their parents.

#4 we need to focus on spiritual transformation (or discipleship or growth in sanctification.) Jesus did not call us to become masters of complex theological systems. Having that knowledge is a good thing, but it's not the most important thing. Instead, Jesus called us to become disciples... people who have learned how to actually do "whatsoever [he] commands." (Matt 28:20) That task doesn't require that much "good" theology up front. And the theology you learn along the way, you tend to learn by living interactively with God and with his scriptures, which is the best kind in my opinion.

In the coming months I will flesh some of this out more, but let me finish with this thought: I, as your pastor, cannot possibly implement and run all of these programs. If they are to happen individuals in the church must say, "I think Jesus wants me to be responsible to birth this ministry together with others and raise it up to maturity." Perhaps you have ideas nobody else has thought of. If so, I'd love to hear them. God created you and saved you and gifted you to build up his body, the church. Will you ask him if any of these things are on his agenda for your life?





The Bible is for everyone.

It was great to be in Uganda a few weeks ago. The Bible translation movement throughout the world continues to thrive. Meeting new teams and hearing of their tri-

umphs and challenges inspires me day in and day out. Being a part of their journey and helping shape the quality of work they do gives great satisfaction. Far beyond any personal experience, Bible translation pivots history by transforming people and cultures. The translators are on the front line of that historical change, bringing the Word to their people.

As the years go by, over and over I see new teams take up the work of shaping and translating God's Word into their language. However, world events impact the work and progress. With this trip to Uganda I listened as several teams shared how COVID challenged them to learn how to work well. During COVID, they got new computers, knew generally how to translate, but Each and every Bible translation project is unique.



Each language is different. The scripts, letters, and characters vary. The translator's biblical knowledge differs. The teams are shaped by different cultures. The age and gender makeup of every team varies. Teams are small, usually with only three or four translators.

In spite of these variables, as I said before, Bible translation is thriving. There may be as many as one thousand active projects going on around the world today. With the software we use, we can track some of the work being done and do all we can to support each project. Every day hundreds of neverwritten-before verses are translated. The message and stories that are so familiar to us are brought into a new space, a new culture, and a new language.

Just as new projects start each year like those in Uganda, others finish. This graphic above shows the number of Bibles, New Testaments and portions, that have

been completed over the past 200 years. (from progress.bible) As you can see, in recent decades a lot of progress has been made. That comes from the efforts of many Bible translation organizations but also from your support. Currently and thankfully, there are 744 languages that have a full Bible. The Bible is for everyone. The challenge continues. Join us in praying for and supporting this mission and ministry.
