## **Building a Foundation for the Future**

Last newsletter I began to sketch the outlines of my vision for the future. Mostly I talked about the future in terms of programs. If I had it to do over again, I might have arranged my thoughts into essays in a different order. But I have begun how I have begun, so I will plow forward and try to bring things into a better order.

One of the reasons why I think I should have talked about church programming later in our discussions is not immediately obvious to everyone, because they don't understand the difference between worldly wisdom and divine wisdom. What I mean by that is this: The world uses a certain array of techniques to persuade you to do things it wants you to do. You can study these techniques at any university that offers marketing or communications classes. Basically, these techniques appeal to the natural desires of human beings and seek to harness those desires to make money or achieve power, or some other goal. But it is not so with the things of God. One of the implications of the doctrine of Total Depravity is that there is no longer any natural desire for God as he actually is (as opposed to versions of God we make up for ourselves.) Paul states as much plainly in 1 Corinthians 2:14:

From the Pastor's

"The natural person does not accept the things of the Spirit of God, for they are folly to him, and he is not able to understand them because they are spiritually discerned."

Notice Paul does not say, "He could understand them if he really wanted to," nor, "With sufficient education, the natural man could understand spiritual things." Most importantly, Paul is a hundred miles from the idea that the natural person can accept the things of God if he gets a sufficiently compelling presentation of them from a really talented speaker.

Those who fail to understand such things would rewrite the Parable of the Sower. Instead of one sower sowing the Word and four different soils, whose condition determines the fruitfulness of the Word, they would have only one soil and four different sowers. The varying results would be explained by differences in technique and talent on the part of the sowers. Maybe the sower that got the best results is the most charming and personable. Or the most educated, or the most attractive, or the cleverest and funniest. It's no wonder our least successful pastors are borderline suicidal, and our most successful pastors often flirt with narcissistic personality disorders. Both are convinced that human salvation and the wellbeing of the church depends on their sales presentation and performance, and they take blame or credit as they deem appropriate.

Instead, what Paul says is that the natural person is <u>incapable</u> of understanding spiritual things. He is spiritually dead in trespasses and sins (Eph 2:1), and one of the main marks of the dead is that they don't do anything. They are incapable of responding to the gospel message and the good news that the Kingdom of God is now available for people to live in right here and now, simply by placing one's whole confidence in Jesus. The natural person is only interested in worldly things that cater to his worldly interests. One of the greatest failures of the 20<sup>th</sup> and 21<sup>st</sup> century church is the failure to understand this and adjust to it. The contemporary church really believes that selling Buicks and selling Jesus are fundamentally the same sort of thing. You just gotta have the right marketing strategies for both.

The trouble is, this is a totally inadequate understanding of spiritual things. For instance, God chose the "foolishness of preaching" of his living, active, sufficient Word to accomplish the spiritual heavy lifting of truly building the church: "For since in the wisdom of God the world through its wisdom did not know him, God was pleased through the foolishness of what was preached to save those who believe." (1 Cor 1:21)

There are a couple of other reasons for my regrets about placing programming first in our discussions. One of them must be that the metric of success we have in the church today could be described as "Bodies, Buildings, and Bucks." If your church has lots of bodies in the pews on Sunday mornings, a big building, and a lot of money, congratulations! Your church is a success! And by implication the pastor is deemed to be a worthy person who makes things happen. It's hard to imagine anything further from the spirit of Jesus than that. And of course, a crowd is not a congregation. Add to that the fact that a large group of mostly untransformed people knocking

about in the same place on a Sunday morning led by a man who is stuck on himself in the name of Jesus is just going to bring their worldly powers and forces and habits into the church.

Cathedral is an example most RCA folks are probably familiar with. Willow Creek is another. Mars Hill and James MacDonald's church are a third and a fourth. And there are hundreds of lesser-known ones. And this is where my first concern and this concern collide. Because you absolutely can build a large church on a pastor with speaking talent, coupled with well-staffed and well-funded programming. It just won't accomplish anything of any lasting value when it's built that way, and it runs the risk, perhaps, of making the church leadership into egomaniacs. But many people in the pews of "not successful" churches long for that experience of Bodies, Bucks, and Buildings in their own congregation. Now a few will end up leaving to go try to find it.

A successful church according to Kingdom standards is one that is reliably producing people who can walk humbly with God, in wisdom and power through a hostile world, bringing the blessings of God upon everyone they meet with, day in and day out, offering forth the words of life to the lost. It may be a congregation of 100 people, or it may be 1,000 people. Size is irrelevant when we live in the Kingdom.

Now, let me just give you a blinding flash of the obvious. By Kingdom metrics of success, there are very few successful churches of ANY size in North America today, either big or small. You need to let that sink in for a minute. You have probably never seen a successful church, if we measure success by the same standards the Lord Jesus uses. I'm not saying there weren't some fine Christians in those churches. I'm saying that when you consider the whole effect of the church's activity, it did not produce significant numbers of true disciples. That is in stark contrast to the first 400 years of the church's history. They focused on making disciples, transformed into the image of Christ, not on programs. They were often unable to meet openly. They were frequently persecuted. They were hated and considered foolish and vile by the culture. You could not stop them from growing. By 300 AD 50% of the population of the cities in the Mediterranean Basin were Christian, according to Professor Rodney Stark of Baylor University.

Which leads to my final concern. Because Jesus' standard of success is so radically different from our standard of success, the worst thing you can do is make the survival of a congregation its highest priority. It can be a priority. It must never be the highest priority. This is a cruel irony, for the death of a church is often one of the most painful things a Christian can ever experience. You fight like the dickens and expend huge energy, time, and treasure trying to keep a sinking ship afloat. Every nerve and fiber wants to preserve what the shrinking gathered handful thinks is most important. But they are sawing off the limb that they are sitting on the whole time. Keeping a congregation going is never most important. Ever. Jesus and his Kingdom are most important, and any church that loses sight of that for very long will have its lampstand removed. Such a congregation has lost its first love. It has replaced love of Jesus with love of itself and its own existence (see Rev 2:5).

The problem with a dying church or even a "maybe going to start dying soon" church is never that there are not enough people. It is always because of the character and the quality of the people who are there. Therefore, being who we should be must precede doing what we should do. This is where we must first focus our time and energy. If what we are speaks of a life and peace from a realm beyond this world, then anything and everything we do will be fruitful. If what we are does not speak of those things, nothing we do will be truly fruitful, no matter how impressive and successful it looks from the outside. Jesus is much more concerned with who you are than what you do. This is because if who you are is properly ordered, what you do will take care of itself.

Next month we will travel further along this path. I want to give you a crystal-clear vision for what a thoroughly transformed person looks like in some detail. I hope you have a great March.

I was once told, after having a bad day, "You never have to do today again."
You know, it really is true! God gave you the strength to do today. Good job! It wasn't easy. Tomorrow may not be easy either, but at least it won't be today.

Guess what else...God is already there waiting to walk you through it.

# Results of the Special Congregation Meeting

Of the 290 active members of FRC, there were 107 members present along with 56 members voting via absentee ballot. The results of the vote are as follows: 155 votes were cast in favor of the motion to leave the Reformed Church in America and begin the process of joining with the Alliance of Reformed Churches, with 7 ballots in opposition to the motion and 1 ballot declared by the tellers to be invalid. The motion passed with 95% approval. As a result of this vote we will now begin the process of breaking ties with the RCA and moving toward affiliation with the ARC.


## Consistory Meeting Highlights February 10, 2025





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#### Hello First Reformed Church,

What is your favorite account in the Old Testament? I personally love the Abrahamic account, just all of his adventures and things that God has him do. Abraham is a true example of making sacrifices. We all know the story of Abraham and Isaac when Abraham is given a test. Now I want you to think about



this for a moment, because we teach on this account a lot in Sunday school and when you hear it on the pulpit there are a few different meanings behind it, but do we actually get it? Here is the SparkNotes version of the account. God made a covenant with Abraham that he will have children and they will become a multitude of nations. For years Abraham and his wife Sarai did not have any children. They even tried breaking what God said and Abraham had a son with Sarai's servant Hagar. This son was not the son that God was going to give to Abraham and Sarai, until Sari became pregnant with Isaac. One day God told Abraham that he is to take Isaac up on this mountaintop and sacrifice him on the altar. Abraham did as God commanded and before he could kill his son with the knife God stopped him and blessed him. Now this is a pretty intense account wouldn't you say. However, there is something that we tend to miss when it comes to this account. Everyone seems to think that this was a hard decision for Abraham and that it was the hardest thing he ever had to do. What would you say if scripture revealed that it in fact was not this horrific decision for Abraham? What if scripture reveals that Abraham was willing to do it because he knew who God was? Let's take a look at scripture and find out.

Hebrews 11:17-18 "By faith Abraham, when he was tested, offered up Isaac, and he who had received the promises was in the act of offering up his only son, of whom it was said, "Through Isaac shall your offspring be named." Abraham had amazing faith in God, but why did he have this faith? He remembered what God had promised him. Isaac was the fulfillment of that covenant. Abraham knew that God is the God that keeps His promises and that never lies. God promised him and Sarah (now known as that name) Isaac and now for some reason God is asking for this. He may not know the reason, but he knows what? Let's look at verse 19, "He considered that God was able even to raise him from the dead, from which, figuratively speaking, he did receive him back." Do you see it? Even if he did kill Isaac, he knew that God was able to bring him back form the dead, because of the covenant He made with Abraham. Abraham knew His God and knew His character; he knew that by this sacrifice God was going to honor it and make it good. We as human beings, especially in modern times, are afraid of sacrifice. We are scared of giving something up that means so much to us. We are afraid of missing out on something precious, we are afraid that if we sacrifice it now, we may not get to experience it ever again. I am not talking about sacrificing our children. God would never ask any of us to sacrifice our children, but we have to ask ourselves this question, "Are we sacrificing our children by not giving this thing up?" How much time does your child have to be a child? I don't care if they are 5, 10, 15, 17, etc. Our kids are so eager to grow up they tend to miss out on their childhood.

I want you to sit down with your children and ask them to map out their 168 hours in one week. If you already have done this, great, do it again! This is something parents should do with their children every week. See where the priorities lie. Get technical about this too, see where your kids are doing Bible study, youth group, Wednesday night classes, prayer time, movie time, screen time, everywhere that they spend time map it out. Then do a split between "secular stuff" which means stuff that does not pertain to Christianity, and then their personal faith walk stuff. Where do the sacrifices need to be made for the furthering of our children's faith?


#### **Sportsmen's Tip of the Day**

Agent Maxwell Anderson used to work with Jenna in the Chattanooga Police Department, and there was even a smoldering fire of


attraction. Now they team up to track down the killer before a big political rally that promises to bring not only the former mayor into the crosshairs but hundreds of civilians as well.

## Random Musings Devotional

I'm a master multi-tasker. No, really. Most women are, but I'm particularly good at it. If I'm walking on the treadmill, I'm also listening to a book or watching television. If I'm cooking, I'm also putting dishes in the dishwasher.

If I'm on the phone with one of the girls, the call is on speaker so I can also fold a load of laundry. If I could figure out a way to harness the hours I sleep, I would.

I just think that if I'm doing this, I could also be doing that, as well as the other thing.

Suddenly I asked myself, "Do I do that with God?"

When I'm reading my devotion, am I fully engaged? Or am I also figuring what I need to take out of the freezer for supper?

When I'm at church on Sunday, am I listening and growing, or am I making my to-do list for the upcoming week?

When I pray, am I multitasking? Cough, cough...usually. Now I'm not saying that I can't talk to God while I'm doing something else. I've had some deep conversations with him while driving to work. I've put a lot of miles on my car with my new position, and I've had some animated conversations with my Lord. However, those conversations have usually been one-sided. I'm doing all the talking. If it's too quiet, I turn on the radio or listen to an audiobook.

In my speech courses, I taught students that communication is circular. First, you have the speaker who communicates the message to the listener. Then the listener provides the feedback, and the speaker takes that feedback and adjusts the message. And the cycle continues.

Often when I pray, I'm just spewing a message to the Listener, and He no doubt provides feedback, but I'm not listening ...because I'm multitasking.

I can't tell you the last time I sat and just listened. I've never had a lot of sit in me. I like being busy. If I don't think I'm busy enough, I'll volunteer for something so I can be even busier. I'm pretty faithful with my devotional reading, and I love the little prayers that are printed at the end of each entry, but I don't know when I've just sat and listened.

Why?

Am I afraid of what He's going to say? Do I cringe at His feedback? 1 Samuel 3:10 says, "Speak, for your servant is listening." But is she? No, she's not. She's too busy doing other things.

So this morning, after a not-so-subtle reminder, I'm going to try to sit and listen. Not fold laundry in silence, not drive home in the quiet, but I'm going to find a place to just sit and listen.

For as Deuteronomy 3:20 says, "Love the LORD your God, listen to his voice, and hold fast to him." I definitely love him, and I sometimes hold onto Him with a death grip, but I need to work on listening to Him.

So Lord, I'm turning off the television, I'm waiting to fold the laundry, and I'm ready to listen. What have you been trying to tell me? I'm listening.



Bundled up with hats, coats, and gloves, backpacks packed with books, pencil cases, and lunchboxes, we step out of the stairwell of our apartment building into the predawn darkness and chill of Germany in January. As parents, Chelsea and I have braced for these moments that have been looming over us for over a year: the first few weeks of our kids attending the local public school here in Hanno-

ver. Time and time again, we've asked congregations to join us in prayer for our children, that they would be able to make friends and adjust well to doing school in a new language. This is where the rubber meets the road.

We walk a couple of blocks as the traffic flows by, wait at the intersection for a tram to cross, watch for the little red man on the light to turn green. A part of me wants him to stay red, to keep the kids on our side of the street, close to the little English-speaking nest of our apartment where they feel confident, expressive, joyful, and safe. But, the light turns green, and we continue on.

As we walk, my mind drifts back to a few weeks earlier. We did our final "big move" here to Hannover just a few weeks ago, just a week before Christmas. My parents came with us to help us get settled in and to see for themselves just where their son and daughter-in-law had brought their beloved grandkids. Members of Chelsea's family followed ten days later. They each discovered a place which was very different from home, but also filled with excitingly different opportunities. We said our goodbyes to them at the end of their trips at the airport, waving at the security checkpoint.

As the kids and I continue our chilly walk to school through the dark, I realize that my anxiety for my kids' well-being at school was probably the same feeling our parents felt for us. There comes a point where you have to say your goodbyes and give final hugs and trust them to God's loving hands.

As we walk, we begin to notice that we're no longer walking alone. A couple of girls and their mom march along in similar hats, coats, and backpacks a few yards ahead. A dad and his son follow along behind us. Children zoom along on scooters, shouting out greetings to their friends as they pass. Soon we find ourselves in a group of a couple dozen elementary school kids and their parents, all streaming to the school ahead.

I feel a wave of solidarity with these other moms and dads: in a few minutes, we'll all bring our children to the entrance to the school, give a squeeze and a word of encouragement, and send them off to be challenged and cheered by teachers and classmates, to wrestle their way through Deutsch and math, to navigate their way through friendships and playground politics as they each begin to discover themselves.

We get to the gate and I give them each a hug and send them on their way. As they walk through, I say a silent prayer that those teachers and kids will love them at least a fraction as much as I do. And then I turn, heading to catch the tram that will bring me to my office.

As pastors of the English-speaking RELISH community (Reformed English Language International Service of Hannover), we are a bit like teachers ourselves. Just as we entrust our children into the care of the teachers at school, brothers and sisters in Christ from abroad have been entrusted into our care. We have been given the opportunity to challenge and cheer believers from around the world who have found themselves in Hannover for a time, sent by families and communities who love them and who pray for their welfare. Chelsea and I get to walk alongside them as they wrestle with God, as they seek to follow Jesus faithfully, as they deal with the pressures of work and family and culture in a place that is often far from home. Just like our kids' teachers, we want to build these believers up, strengthening their minds and hearts so that they can not only survive in this world, but thrive as they follow the call of Jesus Christ to be salt and light.

A few hours from now, either Chelsea or I will walk back to school and gather our kids back at the schoolyard gate. And just as I pray that my kids will emerge a bit wiser, a bit kinder, a bit more confident and resilient, so I also pray for our RELISH community, that whenever they will leave us, God will have worked in their hearts to prepare them for the journeys ahead—planting fruits of the Spirit that will grow into a harvest that will bring glory to Jesus Christ over and over again.

P.S.
