HAS GOD SAID?



This month I am presenting a bit of a mental ramble as I think through a new thought. I have been trying to figure out how we have come to the point that people find it entirely rational to ignore physical reality in favor of personal perceptions. Men claim to be women, and women are men, no matter the physical reality of their anatomy. While I can wander through the history of western Philosophy, I think I have come up with two

points that may make sense to all of us.

First, have you ever heard someone say **perception is reality**? I have many times. It always makes me wince because perception isn't always correct.

Have you ever seen (*or read*) an experiment where a fake murder is intentionally committed before a group of strangers so that they can learn to be eyewitnesses? When the group is asked what they saw, the results are hilarious. Not only do people have different memories, they often contradict one another. Except on TV, eyewitness testimony is only sometimes helpful in a court of law.

Why do people use the *perception is reality* statement to justify what they want everyone else to think? Besides the fact that we have heard this for the past four decades, it is also easy and doesn't require anyone to justify their ideas. Your feelings are your feelings – and mine are mine. Who can argue with that? I hope we can.

The solution is both simple and complicated. The simple part is remembering that God created the physical world, which was good. (Genesis 1 &2). It also reflects his invisible nature to everyone (Romans 1:19-20).

Second, I want to think about sin and the lie that lies underneath all of the lies we tell ourselves. Grab your Bible and look at Genesis 3:1. Now the serpent was more crafty than any other beast of the field that the Lord God had made. He said to the woman, "Did God actually say, 'You shall not eat of any tree in the garden?'"

Satan's question boils down to this – *Did God say?* When we sin, how often do we excuse our actions by saying that? Do I need to keep the Sabbath holy? No, I need to rest and play. Do I need to honor my parents? No, they weren't nice to me. Do I need to tell the truth, refrain from stealing, from being faithful in marriage? No, because..... you fill in the blanks.

Again, the solution is both simple and complicated. We need to know what God said, and we need to obey him. However, even in the church, we question God's words. However, in the church, we examine scripture all the time! *Surely, we need to modernize, or that was just a cultural thing that Paul wrote, or....* You know the excuses. So, what do we do? We must say sin is sin and stand by the truth of what God has said in his word.

THEOLOGY 101

BELGIC & WESTMINSTER CONFESSIONS

THE FALL OF MAN, ORIGINAL SIN, AND PUNISHMENT

Both the Belgic and the Westminster Confessions spend a significant amount of time on the subject of the fall, original sin, God's justice, and God's plan of redemption. It is worth reading! You can get a copy of each online if you don't have one at home.

As modern human beings, we have become very, very good at saying that sin isn't sin. When we seem to do something incorrect or less acceptable, it is the fault of our parents, friends, society, government, or anyone else. We also argue that it is our choice, so it is right for us—at least for us.

But God seems to take sin very seriously. His righteousness demands death, if not ours, then that of His son. He is Holy.

The Westminster Shorter Catechism defines sin, and there are two sides to the definition to consider—active and passive sinning.

Q14. What is sin?

A. Sin is any **want of conformity unto**, or **transgression** of, the law of God.

Passive sin

We don't say *want* anymore; we might say *lack* of conformity. This refers to sinning when we don't do what we ought to but sit back and ignore doing what we should do. For example, have you obeyed the commandment of Jesus in Mark 16:15, "Go into all the world and preach the gospel to all creation?"?

Active Sin

This is easier for us to see, particularly in others. This is going out and breaking the law of God—deliberately or accidentally. Maybe you meant to tell a lie, or perhaps one seemed to pop out of your mouth, but you have broken the 8th commandment.

We are all guilty of not doing what God commands, and of doing what he commands us not to do!

This month you will be reading synopsis from the second book in two different series. The first is OBSESSION by Patricia Bradley from "Natchez Trace Park Rangers" series. "Natchez Trace Ranger and historian Emma Winters hoped never to see Sam Ryker again after she broke off her engagement to him. But when shots are fired at her at a historical landmark just off the Natchez Trace, she's forced to work alongside Sam as the Natchez Trace law enforcement district ranger in the ensuing investigation. To complicate matters, Emma has acquired a delusional secret admirer who is determined to have her as his own. Sam is merely an obstruction,

one which must be removed. Sam knows that he has failed Emma in the past, and he doesn't intend to let her down again, especially now that her life is on the line."



The next series is "Sky King Ranch's" book SUNBURST by Susan May Warren. "When former Navy SEAL and lifelong bachelor Ranger Kingston is called upon to take part in a rescue mission to save his brother Colt from terrorists in Nigeria, he is shocked to find among the hostages a woman he could never forget. Noemi Sutton was attempting to return a young girl to her family in Boko Haram territory when she and the girl found themselves taken hostage, along with several others. And while Ranger Kingston may be able to get the hostages away from their captors, he'll need Noemi's help if he ever hopes to get out of Nigeria alive. Her solution??

Pose as husband and wife. But when her uncle discovers the union, he insists on a traditional Nigerian wedding—which would bind Noemi to a man destined to break her heart. Worse, the trouble they're fleeing has found them—again. It's clear anyone around Noemi is bound to be caught in the crossfire, including her potential new husband."



WHEN THE MEADOW BLOOMS by Ann H. Gabhart is a book that has a little intrigue, a little mystery and a little romance. "If any place on God's earth was designed to help one heal, it is Meadowland. Surely here, at her brother's-in-law Kentucky farm, Rose and her daughters can recover from the events of the recent past—the loss of her husband during the 1918 influenza epidemic, her struggle with tuberculosis that required a stay at a sanatorium, and her girls' experience in an orphanage during her illness. At Meadowland, past troubles become rich soil in which faith can grow. Dirk Meadows may have opened his home to his later brother's wid-

ow and her girls, but he keeps his heart tightly closed. The roots of his pain run deep and the evidence of it is written across his face badly scarred by a fire and abandoned by the woman he loved."



Something amazing happened in Sunday School on March 19th, 2023. I was teaching the high school class and we were covering the book of Judges. This specific week we studied Samson. If you don't know much about Samson here are some fun



facts about him. He was very strong, had long wavy hair (for a short while), and as one of the high schoolers pointed out, he loved women. Not in the way of respect and honor, but lust. Not only did he love women, but he loved the Philistine women. This was a problem back in this day because the Philistine's were considered to be "unclean" or "uncircumcised" people. The Philistines viewed the Israelites as fundamentally the same way, however Samson found some of them to be very appealing. It was a fun discussion. We read the account of when Samson killed 1,000 Philistines with a fresh donkey jawbone. It was interesting to read and as said to the students, "This is one of the baddest accounts in scripture in my opinion." Meaning that it was really cool, how many other men can you say killed 1,000 other men with just a jawbone? NONE! Then we started getting really deep into this study.

We discussed who judges were and what they were tasked to do. They were the ones who were appointed to save Israel and to turn Israel back to God. Samson was the coolest of all though, he was the action hero of the judges. Even though he was a complete knucklehead. We talked about his complete disregard for the Lord's ways and his call to God and to Israel. Many times, he fell into the same pit that we fall into. We give in to our desires, even though they are sinful. We don't follow what God tells us to do. Even though we do all of that God still uses us. Even though Samson was a knucklehead he was still a mighty warrior of God. The book of Hebrews even states that he is a "hero of the faith." That we may follow after his example of faith, not his sinfulness but his faithfulness after he repents of his wrongdoing. We should not look at Samson and think, "Well Samson was used by God so I will just sin and repent later." This is not what God is saying through the example of Samson. God is saying that even though we sin and fall short God is still going to use us.

Have you ever heard someone say, "I'm not good enough for that." Well there is truth to that, none of us are good enough for that. I myself do not have any right to be up on the pulpit, in front of youth group, or anywhere near a pulpit because of my sins, but God still uses me. I have repented and even though I still sin, I am forgiven. Even though I fall short God picks me back up. Don't let the enemy tell you that you're not good enough, because that's the beauty of the gospel. Even though none of us deserve it, God, being rich in mercy, sent Jesus into the world to die on the cross for our sins so that our debt would be paid, and our sins are forgiven. Samson did some amazing things through the Lord's help, what sort of things has God done in your life? Are we ready to move? Are we ready to do something?
