



Bible Study Verse

Ezekial 3:17

"Son of man, I have made you a watchman for the people of Israel; so hear the word I speak and give them warning from me."

Thoughts

While I was sitting at a watering hole a while back, I heard rustling in the bushes on the other side of the water. Moments later, a very nice buck poked his head out from the trees and looked around. Slowly, he emerged from the trees, extremely cautious about every move. Eventually, he came down to the water to drink and ended up a mere fifteen yards from me. (Of course I was hunting elk).

The entire time I watched him from my blind, he appeared very alert and on edge. After several minutes, a much older buck stepped out from the same area in the trees and came down to water.

The first buck then seemed somewhat more relaxed, but very submissive to the older buck and still kept watch while they drank.

Action Point

A watchman in Ezekiel's time would stand guard on the wall of the city and warn of impending danger. God called Ezekiel to be a watchman for God's people and to warn them of God's coming judgment.

As Ezekiel was a watchman for the Jews and this younger buck was a watchman for the older buck, so should we be watchmen for God's children. Sometimes I find myself witnessing to others, spreading the great news about God's salvation, but omitting the ugly side of sin and death.

This verse helps to serve as a reminder that, in addition to sharing the greatness of God's salvation, we may also need to warn others of the consequences of denying what He offers to us

Our first book this month is from a new series, "Doors of the Past." The books are not about the same people or family but each story takes you to two different centuries and the history of a house or in this case, a steamboat, UNDER-CURRENT OF SECRETS by Rachel Scott McDaniel. "As wedding coordinator for the 100-year-old steamboat The Belle of Louisville, Devyn Asbury takes pride in seeing others' dreams come true, even though her engagement sank like a diamond ring to the bottom of the Ohio River. When *The Belle* becomes a finalist in the Timeless Wed-

During a murder trial, something doesn't sit well with her about the case, but no one except the handsome new Carnegie librarian will listen to her. Librarian Mark Andrew's father sent

When a patron seeks his help with research in hopes of proving a man's innocence, Mark is immediately drawn to her and her cause. With the hope of Spring, what better time than now to reflect on those in the Bible who experienced a new beginning or a fresh start in their lives?

Noah after the flood

What might be the most monumental "new beginning" in the Bible, life must have looked VERY different for Noah and his family once they departed the ark after the great flood. Read what happened in Genesis 6-9.

Rahab

After protecting the Israelite spies, Rahab and her family were spared when the walls of Jericho fell and they were adopted into the Israelite camp. Read more in Joshua 6.

Jacob flees Esau's wrath

A man of multiple "fresh starts"—after Jacob deceived his way into receiving his brother's birthright, he fled to the household of their uncle Laban. Life was different for him there, as he worked hard for 20 years to gain wives and a flock of his own, eventually packing up his household and moving back to his home. Read Genesis 27-31 for the full story.

Moses becomes a prince of Egypt

Throughout his life Moses had several "fresh starts": from fugitive newborn to prince of Egypt, then fugitive from Egypt to a worker/husband in Jethro's house, then to a leader of the Israelites in their escape from Egypt. Read Moses' journey in Exodus.

Joseph goes from imprisoned slave to ruler of Egypt

After Joseph interpreted Pharoah's dream about the coming famine, he is promoted to second in charge of Egypt. Pretty good considering he had just been an imprisoned slave! Find the story in Genesis 41.

The Lord blesses Job

We are familiar with the trials of Job and how he lost everything, but God blessed Job in the second half of his life even more than in the beginning. Check out the happy ending in Job 42:7-17.

When Ruth meets Boaz

Widowed and poor, things really turned around when Ruth encountered Boaz, the wealthy relative of her late husband. Read the story in Ruth 2-4.

Saul encounters Jesus Christ

Jesus heals the man born blind

story in John 4:1-42.

Many people who encountered Jesus had their lives changed, lifelong conditions healed and fresh new starts. One blind beggar demonstrates his changed life after he encounters Jesus, is healed and then stands up to the Jewish leaders, admonish-

ing them that they did not believe in Jesus as the Messiah. You'll find the story in John 9.

The Samaritan Woman encounters Jesus

While drawing water from the well, a Samaritan woman is approached by Jesus, who leaves such an impression on her that she runs back to her village proclaiming she has just met the Messiah. Because of this woman's faith "many Samaritans from the village believed in Jesus". You'll find the



Have you ever thought about making a profession of faith during worship? What questions do you have about it? Why haven't you done it yet? These are questions I hope to answer in this article about profession of faith. We recently, at the time of printing this



article, had a profession of faith retreat that involved helping students with making their public profession of faith and becoming a member of First Reformed Church. I have had many discussions with different people about this topic and everyone has a different opinion on the matter. However, right now I want to pose some things for us to think about when it comes to profession of faith. I want to first be brutally honest. When I first moved here and became involved in the Reformed church, I did not like the profession of faith aspect of our beliefs. I think we have resolved some of the minor issues that I have had in the past, however one of the main reasons I did not like it was that I did not understand it. Is it membership? Are they professing their faith? What in the world makes a profession of faith special? This is what I have discovered from my own personal study and discovery of profession of faith. To the first two questions the answer is obviously, yes! Profession of faith comes with becoming an official member of this specific body of Christ. Yes, they are publicly professing their faith in Christ. The last question is one that I could not answer, what makes profession of faith special? I do not know. Is it even special anymore? Has it become just something we do when we are older? What makes profession of faith special? I could not answer this, until I did a lesson with the middle school youth group about a month ago.

The lesson revolved around our relationship with the church. I taught the different things that we teach in this church, baptism, salvation, and then we go to membership. I explained that we practice in the RCA profession of faith. A student then asked, "So what is a profession of faith?" I explained that it is where you profess your faith publicly to the church and then become a member of church. This student then asked, "So, it's only about membership?" I said, "No, of course not. It's about professing your faith to the congregation who has loved you and has supported you." It then just hit me like a ton of bricks. Has God ever done that to you? Where you say one thing and God just flips a switch and then you finally understand! I finally understood what it means to make a profession of faith. When a child is baptized in our church what happens? We make vows and so do the parents. Parents vow to raise that child in the Lord and the church yows to help the parents and teach the children as well. Why do we do that? Because one day we hope that this child will grow up and come to believe in Jesus and become a follower of Him. Profession of faith is that moment. The moment where that child shows the fruit of the vow that the church made at their baptism. They are not just making profession of faith publicly to a bunch of people, they are doing it in front of the ones who have loved and cared for them since they were babies.

I do believe we need to view profession of faith this way. We need to teach our children how to be faithful members of the church and what that looks like. We need to celebrate with them. Not only are they professing their faith, but now they are becoming a member of the church that baptized them and cared for them, and now they can do the same thing to a new baby that is baptized in our church. I have a newfound passion and excitement for profession of faith, and I hope that you do as well. If you would like to discuss this with me further, I am more than happy to sit down and talk about it. Thank you for reading my article and it you ever need a hug, this big ole teddy bear has one for you!

Dear Friends,

I've never been one to choose a single word to focus on for the New Year, or as a star word for Epiphany. It's just not a practice that I've adopted. In the past I've sometimes chosen a hymn or a Bible verse, but never a single word.

This year, however, in the time between January 1 and January 6, I had one word that stood out to me on three separate occasions: connection. I decided not to ignore it, and have spent some time reflecting on the word connection and its significance in my life and my work as a missionary.

And I've decided to write a series of Dear Friends letters in 2024 focused on the word connection. Today, I'd like to share a story of my connection with the Sale Family from West Michigan. In May 2022, Dee Dee Piers from Hope Church in Holland, MI, reached out to me with an urgent request to connect with a woman named Alison Sale. Alison's husband, Scott, served on active duty with the U.S. Army in Afghanistan, and Scott and Alison have been working hard since the fall of Kabul to the Taliban in August 2021 to protect the lives of Scott's Afghan interpreter and his family (I'll call him M* in this letter to protect his identity). My name came up as someone who was working to evacuate vulnerable Afghans, and I connected with Alison immediately to assess the situation and see if I could offer any assistance.

Here we are almost two years later (and almost three years since the Taliban regained control of Afghanistan), and we are still working together to find safety and refuge for M* and his family. I can't begin to estimate the amount of time I've spent the past two years consulting on this case, exploring options for resettlement in six different countries, and praying for the safety of M* and his family and for God's guidance amid so much pain and suffering. These past 10 years of working in refugee care have taught me that we don't also get the happy ending we would like to see, or in a timeframe that fits our desires. But the faithful response has been—and continues to be—to honor this connection to Alison, Scott, and M*, and to continue walking beside them, praying for them, listening to their hopes and worries and frustrations, and letting them know that they are not alone. This is an important part of what it means to faithfully engage this calling of refugee care.


For over two years, we have been tirelessly working to find a new home country for our Afghan friends whose world was ripped out from under them when the Taliban took control of Afghanistan. They were forced to quickly leave their home and live in hiding for fear they would be killed due to their family's multi-generational history of fighting the Taliban and their beliefs. Throughout this painful and devastatingly long process, we have been so blessed by others who have used their time, skills, and resources to guide us. We are incredibly grateful that one of those special people was JJ TenClay. When it felt like doors were closing at every turn, JJ made us feel like we weren't alone. She has never given up advocating for this Afghan family we care for so deeply. It has given us so much hope and confidence knowing that we have her in our corner, praying for this family, and advocating for their journey to safety with her colleagues around the world. The connections we've made with people like JJ over the past two years that simply cannot be explained other than by God bringing people into our lives to help us on our mission to get this Afghan family to safety. It is because of the generosity of our global community that

we've made it this far. From financial support to prayers to people taking the time to educate us about secure communications and filing legal documents, or connecting us to someone they know who might be able to help—one thing we have learned is that humanitarian work can't be done in a bubble—or by a single person. It takes all of us working together, sharing what we know, and making the time to connect with others that will make a positive impact in this world. While this family still has not reached their destination, we remain determined and continue to pray for God's quidance. We are hopeful 2024 will be a great year for this family.
