#### A Target To Aim At



"First of all, my child, think magnificently of God. Magnify His providence; adore His power, pray to Him frequently and incessantly. Bear Him always in your mind. Teach your thoughts to reverence Him in every place for there is no place where He is not. Therefore, my child, fear and worship and love God; first and last, think magnificently of Him! —PATERNUS, ADVICE TO A SON"

I've started a series that aims to use this opportunity to communicate with you as a means of casting a vision for the future of First Reformed. I started (mistakenly, I believe) by talking about proposed planned programs. But what needs to happen first is that you and I need to be on a journey of progress in Christlikeness first. If we do that reasonably well and in reasonable numbers, FRC will be fine. If we don't, then we might be able to create a program-generated crowd in our building, but it will mean very little and accomplish nothing of any real lasting spiritual value. A healthy church, which is creating spiritually healthy people on an ongoing basis, will not need to worry about survival. It will naturally flourish as people discover the beauty and goodness of the With-God Life which is being freely imparted and taught within her. As I mentioned last month, it would be good to lay out what the transformed human life looks like, so we can have a target to aim at. What changes happen in a person as they learn to live the With-God Life?

The first thing we must hasten to say is that a transform(ing) person is not a perfect person. Nor do they live in a perfect world- yet. But they are remarkably different. And this difference isn't a pose they strike or an attitude they assume from time to time, like one would put on a costume. Nor does it consist at its most basic level in things that they do or don't do- though their behavior will be very different also. Where to disciple of Jesus is different is primarily on the inside of their life, in their hearts, their minds, and the feelings they experience and what they do with them. Remember, Jesus teaches us that it is out of the heart which all human behaviors, both good and bad, arise. (Matt 12:35) One key difference in a child of light is their thought life. And if we are going to be changed into Christlikeness, the Bible says that the place we have to start is with the mind. (Rom 12:1-2) Whoever we are and wherever we live, our life is primarily run by what we habitually think about and what we believe to be true (or don't believe to be true!) The mind of the apprentice of Christ is primarily fixed on God. He or she loves to think about God and upon his greatness and loveliness as he is revealed in Jesus Christ. They see him everywhere and are constantly and joyously experiencing his presence and power all around them, whether that would be in nature, or history, or in the scriptures, or in other people, especially the people of God. The person who practices the with God life is "God intoxicated." Thinking on God and interacting with God makes them happy and fills them with peace and strength.

Their minds are filled with biblical information about God's nature, his actions, and his plans for them in this world. Therefore they do not dwell upon or fear evil. (Psalm 23:4) It doesn't loom large in their thoughts. They know it will be defeated in the end, and even here we can "overcome evil with good." (Rom 12:21) That doesn't mean they ignore evil, but they deal with it appropriately in each individual situation that arises. Then they go back to setting their minds on God and "things above." (Col 3:1 -2)

Because their mind is focused upon God and everything else in life is re-oriented with reference to God, all other good things are welcome too. This is why Paul commanded us that "Whatever is true, whatever is honorable, whatever is right, whatever is pure, whatever is lovely, whatever is of good repute, if there is any excellence and if anything worthy of praise, think on these things." (Phil 4:8)

The child of light can exult in an excellent athletic performance by a non-Christian athlete and thank God for gifting that athlete. Or she can be enraptured by a well-crafted piece of music, even if the music isn't specifically Christian. A well-told story can bring pleasure even if it isn't a Christian story. The apprentice of Christ recognizes that a slice of well-baked bread is something to thank God for, even if the loaf was baked by an atheist or a pious Hindu. Therefore we can be realistically positive and trustingly open to the experiences God brings to us each moment. After all, all of life is a gift from him. As the psalmist says, "I have set the Lord continually before me. Because He is at my right hand, I will not be shaken." (Ps 16:8)

Next month we will examine how the child of light deals with their feelings and perhaps, if space permits, their relationships also, are dealt with in a healthy and God-honoring way.

#### **Dear Friends and Supporters,**

"If one part suffers, every part suffers with it; if one part is honored, every part rejoices with it." I Cor 12:26 (NIV) or as The Message puts it, "If one part hurts, every other part is involved in the hurt, and in the healing. If one part flourishes, every other part enters into the exuberance." "If anyone has material



possessions and sees his brother in need but has no pity on him, how can the love of God be in him? Dear children, let us not love with words or tongue but with actions and in truth." I John 3:17-18.

Most Africans are Christians, and today our brothers and sisters in Africa and other parts of the developing world are suffering and hurting because of two recent decisions made to withdraw the U.S. from the WHO and to freeze \$40 billion foreign aid that was being run through USAID.

To quote a Christian aid worker, "This is how missionaries that you support do their jobs every day... The church needs to know what is happening. Pray for what is happening. People are dying every day because of this." (in Christianity Today, Feb 4, 2025). The health and safety of millions of Africans and many millions living elsewhere is at stake, even in the USA!

30 years ago, when we worked in Malawi with the Church of Central Africa Presbyterian, we got some money from USAID to monitor the distribution of 30,000 tons of food relief during the drought there. The food and the money to monitor and target the food aid saved thousands.

In February, USAID projects in 130 countries were stopped, including those that fight famine, and diseases like TB, malaria, HIV/AIDS, Ebola, Polio etc. Much of this money is often given to Christian organizations and Christian hospitals like the one where our two daughters were born in Malawi, that use this money for food, medicine, research, fuel, and paying additional staff.

In one Presbyterian hospital in Kenya, with over 3,000 HIV patients, 42 staff had to stop work and they have no idea how they will get more medicine for these patients. The Pepfar program started by President George W. Bush in 2003 pays for HIV prevention and testing and has saved 25 million lives and allowed 5.5 million babies to be born without HIV. Now millions are at risk.

While no doubt there is need for some reform and probably room for more efficiency in any big organization, the freezing of funding and the firing of staff and the way it was done so abruptly has left many programs hanging in uncertainty and caused much additional pain and suffering.

Americans give almost as much money privately, but such giving would have to double to make up for this shortfall and many areas like research, monitoring, and collaboration would probably suffer. Our world has become less safe and the U.S. is in more danger from another pandemic.

Christians are called to love our neighbors unselfishly and even to love our enemies. This year and the next few years will test how much the church is able to live out its calling to be salt and light and yeast in the world.





### WORLD DAY OF PRAYER DESSERT CAKES

#### **Pineapple Sunshine Cake**

#### Cake:

- 1 box yellow cake mix
- 4 eggs
- 1/2 cup oil (I used vegetable oil)
   1 (8 oz) can crushed pineapple with juice
   Frosting:
- 1 (8 oz) container whipped topping, thawed
- 1 small box instant vanilla pudding 1 (8 oz) can crushed pineapple with juice

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Spray a 9x13 pan with cooking spray. In a large bowl, combine cake mix, eggs, oil, and 1 can of crushed pineapple with the juice. Mix well. Pour into prepared baking pan and bake for 25-30 minutes, or until toothpick inserted in center of cake comes out clean. Allow to cool completely on a wire rack. In a medium sized bowl, fold together whipped topping, box of vanilla pudding, and 1 can crushed pineapple with the juice. Spread over the top of cooled cake. Enjoy!

#### Pina Colada Cake (Pineapple Coconut Cake)

#### Cake

- 15.25 ounce cake mix white, vanilla or yellow cake mix will work (1 box needed)
- 1 cup crushed pineapple do not drain, spoon from the can into the measuring cup
- ½ cup vegetable oil or canola oil

3 large eggs room temperature

#### **Pina Colada Filling**

15 ounces <u>cream of coconut</u> not coconut cream and not coconut milk, sweetened condensed milk can be substituted

½ cup pineapple juice

#### **Frosting**

- 3.4 ounces <u>instant coconut cream pudding mix</u> vanilla or french vanilla instant pudding can be substituted
- 1 cup whole milk
- 8 ounces whipped topping
- ½ cup crushed pineapple well drained

⅔ cup toasted coconut for garnish (optional)

#### **Prepare the Cake**

Preheat oven to 350°F. Spray a 9×13 baking dish with square edges with baking spray and set aside. In a large bowl or the bowl of a stand mixer, combine the cake mix, crushed pineapple, vegetable oil and eggs. Beat with a hand mixer or stand mixer on low speed for about 30 seconds and then increase the speed to medium and continue mixing for another 2 minutes. Pour into the prepared baking dish and smooth out the top so the cake bakes up evenly. Bake for 28 to 33 minutes or until an inserted toothpick comes out clean. Let the cake cool on a wire rack for 30 minutes. Using a fork, gently poke holes all over the cake. Try not to crumble the top of the cake the best you can.

#### **Prepare the Pina Colada Filling**

Whisk together the cream of coconut and pineapple juice in a medium size bowl. Slowly and carefully pour over the top of the cake allowing it to fill in the holes and absorb into the cake. Let the cake rest until the liquid is fully absorbed and the cake has completely cooled.

#### **Pina Colada Frosting**

Combine pudding mix and milk in a large bowl and whisk until it thickens, about 2 minutes. Add the whipped topping and fold in until no streaks remain. Add the pineapple (making sure it has been well drained) and fold into the mixture until evenly combined. Gently smooth the frosting over the top of the cooled cake with an offset spatula keeping it as even as possible. If you like, top the cake with toasted coconut. Cut into squares and serve.

Hello, First Reformed Church,

Not only do you share meals together or have coffee together, but you do life together. I will always remember when Hannah and I lived in Sioux Falls we attended a church there that had a phenomenal hospitality ministry. This ministry trained people in the church to be welcoming, hospitable, and caring for visitors and members of the church. Our first Sunday we attended we were invited to go to dinner at about four different family's homes. Every week it was like that. That is what community looks like.

Go out and do life with your community because it is what God is providing for you, and you need them just as much as they need you. It can be with people your own age or even people who are much older than you. At the end of the day in the Christian worldview, age is just a number. #### **Bible Study Verse**

#### **Thoughts**

Awhile back, I was blessed to draw a bull elk tag for Arizona's coveted Unit 9. On the evening of the first day, a large bull entered a clearing about 200 yards from me. Once I had closed the distance, my shot rang true and the majestic bull lay 75 yards from where he was hit.

As I cleaned and quartered the elk, I was amazed at how powerful the blood was. Blood that normally carries life can be disrupted by one well-placed shot; and suddenly, 75 yards later, life ceases to exist.

Blood is the key ingredient that gives us all life.
