



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How to Ask for a Change

In a recent sermon I talked about how Christians are to handle interpersonal conflict, especially where one party has sinned against the other. But that's not the only kind of conflict that emerges in our common life together. What about the frictions that arise as the leaders of a church attempt to lead it in a certain direction, but there are some who disagree with the direction or an individual decision made by leadership? There is a way

to go about doing that which preserves peace and good order.

One of the favorite verses that marks the Reformed and Presbyterian churches is 1 Corinthians 14:40, which says, "Let all things be done decently and in order." This verse really defines how we do worship and how we govern the church. We abhor chaos in the life of the church. God does not want anarchy among his people. Disordered churches rarely thrive and usually give the Devil multiple opportunities to cause havoc among God's people.

Presbyterian and Reformed churches have a very well-defined power structure which is taken straight from the New Testament. In this system, there are two kinds of elders. Teaching elders (i.e. pastors) are responsible for the ministry of the Word and the administration of the sacraments. Usually we also direct or run the meetings of the elders and deacons. In some circumstances we can vote to break a tie, though the widespread counsel given among ministers is, "Never, ever do that!" If something is so controversial that there is a tie vote, the church is in all likelihood in deep division and it is not the time to be making decisions. In 30 years of ministry I have never cast a vote in a local church.

We pastors have other kinds of influence, but it is only influence. Our formal, constitutional power is over the ministry of Word and Sacrament. So even if I wanted to (and believe me, I don't!) I couldn't come to a new church and begin unilaterally making changes to suit me. Conversely, nobody is allowed to tell me how or what to preach on, and the right administration of baptism and the Lord's Supper are under my authority, so long as I am practicing them in a way that's in accord with our constitution and doctrinal standards.

Ruling elders are responsible for the spiritual wellbeing of the members of a church. Theirs is a ministry of spiritual oversight, care, teaching, and if necessary, discipline. They are also responsible to see that the worship of the church and what is taught in the church are in accord with the constitutional and doctrinal standards that everyone in the church swore a vow to uphold and be guided by. Therefore, the ruling elders ought to be the most spiritually mature, wise, discerning members of the church. They should also be deeply committed to the specific doctrinal standards of the church. You shouldn't be an elder or deacon in a Presbyterian or Reformed church if you don't agree with infant baptism or predestination or other Reformed distinctives. You also shouldn't be an officer if there is serious, unaddressed sin in your life. The New Testament qualifications for both elders and deacons are very high. We find them in 1 Timothy 3:1-7 and Titus 1:6-9. It is the ruling elders who are to make most of the decisions regarding worship, teaching, doctrine, and

discipline. The deacons are traditionally responsible for money, property, and Christian benevolence towards those in need. In most Reformed polity, the elders oversee the deacons, though they ought not to meddle unduly in diaconal business.

Now, it is inevitable that the elders or the deacons will make decisions that some in the congregation don't support. That's just how life works. So what happens next? Well, let's start with what doesn't happen. Nobody gets to start squawking and trying to undo the decision by recruiting factions and taking direct action. As an individual church member (even if you've been an elder or deacon in the past) you simply don't have that authority. It is also terribly destructive to the fabric of the church over time because nobody will want to serve in leadership. And if they do serve, they will be apathetic. Why? Because any decision that is made will get unmade within 3 or 4 days, everyone will be riled up. Some will be angry at the elders or the deacons. You give up at least one night a month to go to an hours long meeting for three solid years when there are other things you could be doing. Nobody is paying you. You do it because you care about the church, and this is how you get treated. Why would anyone volunteer for such a task? Why spend hours in a meeting deliberating on the wisest course of action only to have your decisions criticized, second guessed, and repeatedly unmade by people who aren't in power, don't have any legitimate authority, and just want something different? Or even worse, want OTHER people to do something different even though they themselves aren't involved and don't plan to participate or lift a finger.. None of this is good.

If you disagree with a decision by the elders or deacons, there is a simple, respectful, polite way to register your disagreement and ask them to reconsider their decision. It's entirely possible they weren't in possession of all the facts at the time of the decision, or didn't foresee some impact on another area they hadn't considered. Not to mention that you might be the one who is not in possession of all the facts. Instead of assuming that they are ignorant idiots who are out to make your life miserable, give them the courtesy of assuming good will and a lack of relevant information.

Write a brief, respectful, polite letter outlining your understanding of the decision, and why you think it might not be the best decision. Then suggest an alternative course of action. Give that letter to me or your shepherding elder. We will either take it up at our next scheduled meeting, or if things are time sensitive, we can call an unscheduled meeting to consider the issue. Maybe you will get your way. Maybe you won't. Maybe there is an as-yet-undiscovered third way that takes everyone's concerns into account. But you will be heard. Your concerns will be discussed.

Being an officer in a Reformed or Presbyterian church is a very high calling and a difficult duty. We should be grateful for our elders and deacons. We should pray for them and for the consistory as it does its work. We should be respectful and as deferential as we can be to their authority. As Hebrews 13:17 says, "Obey your leaders and submit to them, for they are keeping watch over your souls, as those who will have to give an account. Let them do this with Joy and not with groaning, for that would be of no advantage to you."



And it's probably what you'll always keep doing.


Because they will always be your baby -

All versions wrapped up into one amazing human.



We did it!

In May of 2022, RCA Global Mission announced a special project to raise \$85,000 to provide faith-based trauma healing, reconciliation, and social cohesion training for South Sudanese refugees living in refugee camps in Uganda.

Why? Because the people of South Sudan have been suffering for far too long. Because global programs to care for the people of South Sudan continued to be some of the most underfunded humanitarian aid programs in the world. Because South Sudan is where RCA Global Mission began missional engagement on the continent of Africa almost 77 years ago. [At the time, Sudan and South Sudan were still one country.] Because God loves the people of South Sudan...and so does RCA Global Mission.

Our goal was to raise \$85,000 in one year. We knew it was a lofty goal, especially at a time when so many groups of people worldwide were suffering due to violent conflict, persecution, natural disasters, and other situations that have led to mass death and displacement.

But we believed it was faithful. We didn't meet our goal, but persisted by extending our goal to raise \$85,000 for a second year, with a final push of inviting churches to take a special offering for World Refugee Sunday so that we could meet our goal by the end of June 2024. As we waited for the final number to come in through the end of June/beginning of July, I was pretty sure that we'd meet our goal.

But, to my surprise and delight, more donations came in throughout the summer and beyond, and I'm delighted to share with you that, thanks to the generous support of 25 churches and 79 individuals and families, we raised almost \$116,000!

In November 2024, RECONCILE, Int. used part of these funds to host a 4-day training for 102 South Sudanese refugees living in the Rhino refugee camps in Uganda. This training focused on trauma awareness and trauma healing, reconciliation, and social cohesion (among those living in the camps and between the refugees and native Ugandans in their communities).

Tut was one of the participants. Here's what Tut says about his experience attending this training: "I witnessed my only son killed. He was shot seven times. I want to thank God that I have been able to forgive those who killed my son. I forgave them and I am relieved. This teaching by RECONCILE is refreshing and healing to my spirit. How I wish that every South Sudanese could get access to this teaching...my life is changed."

Friends, this is the power of God at work in this broken and hurting world. This is the power of Christ followers living out the biblical mandate to care for the stranger, the foreigner, the sojourner... the orphan, the widow...those in need of healing and hope.

Don't Forget About South Sudan and Her People

I was blessed to spend some time with my friend and colleague, Shelvis Smith-Mather, at the RCA Global Mission 2025 Conference in January. Shelvis and his wife, Nancy, are joint RCA/PCUSA missionaries, working with the people of South Sudan both in South Sudan and Uganda, and were my partners for this fundraising project.

Shelvis led a dynamic plenary session about the work of our South Sudanese siblings towards peace and reconciliation (and how Christians and the church have played a unique and vital role in these efforts for decades) at Mission 2025. I encourage you to watch Shelvis' plenary session here. [Please note that there is the sound of gunfire from 4:05-5:08 in the recording.]

Shelvis and I talked several times throughout our time together at Mission 2025—encouraging one another, praying for one another, thanking God for the success of our fundraising efforts and the opportunity to share more about South Sudan and the work of RECONCILE, Int. with Mission 2025 participants. But there was also an underlying concern that we shared in our time together: the concer that now that our fundraising project was complete, people would forget about South Sudan and her people.

Hello First Reformed Church,

I am always imagining teaching my kids how to play base-ball/softball, acting, or just plain how to minister to people.

These are my gifts and talents, and I wanted so badly to teach those things to my kids so then they too can be like me or even



better than me. Until I realized something, my kids, at least at this point of their lives, really are not interested in those things. They are interested in horses, playing dress up, or just wanting to read books. It drove me nuts that MY children would have these tendencies to want to do those things, instead of wanting to play my sports or do the things that I did successfully growing up. Then God directed me to the most important text in the Bible for parents, Proverbs 22:6, "Train up a child in the way he should go; even when he is old, he will not depart from it." The context of this verse is to explain that a parent's number one priority to their kids is to instruct them in the ways of the Lord. This promise, yes, it is a promise, says that if you do this diligently and correctly your children will not depart from the faith. Notice how when we read the passages of Scripture referring to raising children it is not about making sure they play the right sports, in the correct clubs, doing extra curriculars, etc. It is simply, teach them the ways of the Lord and bring them up in the faith.

This is not to say that sports or other activities are not important, because even in the Biblical days parents had to teach a trade of some kind to their children. However, what was the number one priority in the home? It was God. The books this month are a continuation of the two series started in April: ONE LAST CHANCE by Susan May Warren from the series, 'Alaska Air One Rescue #2' is the first book.
