

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In the past couple of months I have thought a lot about how to begin my ministry at First Reformed. I will be starting off, a few weeks after my arrival, with a sermon series called "First Things." These messages will be designed to bring a sharp clarity to certain important issues that hopefully heads off any misunderstandings in the future about what sort of a pastor I am, and why I do (and don't do) the things I do (and don't do.) For the same reason I am gratified to have the chance to speak to you in this newsletter before I even officially begin my duties at FRC.

You might find that I am a different sort of pastor than you've been used to. You might even consider me strangely old-fashioned in many ways. That in and of itself can be a huge opportunity for the Devil to begin interfering with the Lord's work at FRC via his old, tried and true method of bitterness and anger over unmet expectations. Therefore, I hope to introduce myself here and get us started on a good footing.

Right out of the gate, I want you to know that I am, above all else, a shepherd of souls. I am relent-lessly driven by that priority. That is what God called me to do. The wellbeing of your soul is my primary job. That means that other, lesser priorities will inevitably take a backseat to that one. That doesn't mean I won't work on those lesser priorities. It does mean they can't ever become the highest priority. There's a reason I'm telling you this.

For the last hundred and twenty five years in the mainline denominations, like the RCA, the pastors have by and large given up on shepherding souls because of what they've been taught at seminary. I know this from personal experience because I am a graduate of a mainline Presbyterian seminary and was formerly a mainline Presbyterian minister. The guiding assumption of many pastors has generally been that everyone is basically a good person. Sin is something built into our social structures, not an issue of personal choices and behavior. Whatever problems the good people do have can be solved by inspiring platitudes and education. There's no hell (and perhaps no heaven and maybe even no God, at least in the way we've traditionally understood him.) And so the soul doesn't really need to be shepherded because it's never really in any danger. A nice God will see to the wellbeing of all the nice people he has created.

What is needed instead, thinks the mainline liberal, is to teach the nice people of the church that they ought to do nice things for other basically nice people outside of the church. That is the essence of the Christian message, they say. Suffice it to say that it is nothing like the essence of the Christian message. Instead, it is a false gospel that has damned many.

The abandonment of soul shepherding as a core function of the pastoral ministry meant that a pastor had to find something else to fill his days with and justify his salary. And so many pastors learned to fill their days with all sorts of nonsense. Some of it was marginally useful, but much of it was a total waste of time and resources. Over time the people in the church began to accept this state of affairs and even rely on it. As the spiritual health of the mainline churches declined, many even found it to be a relief, since they didn't really want their soul to be shepherded to begin with. "Better to have the pastor making the bulletin, cleaning the men's room at the church, attending meetings with the other pastors in town, and giving speeches at the Ladies' Auxiliary than to have him bothering me," they reasoned.

The other basic function of the pastor is often thought to be getting people to do things they don't really want to do. In this model a successful pastor is a pastor who can cajole lots of people into coming together and doing big things they don't really want to do, so that he can take credit for their labors.

I will not be following either of those models. I will be a soul shepherd instead.

It's important to note that in soul shepherding, you set the boundaries. You invite me into your life if you want, as deeply as you want. And if you don't want, I will not try to press my way in. The reason for this is simple. It's in the nature of soul shepherding itself.

Quite simply, soul shepherding is me, assisted by the Spirit of God, guided by the Word of God, helping you to learn how to change in all aspects of your being, in order to become progressively transformed into the image of the Lord Jesus Christ. Another name for this is discipleship. It is the way of strength, peace, sufficiency, and rest. It's the life of the easy yoke and the light burden that Jesus promises to the weary, heavy-laden soul. In this way you learn how to lay down the things that are tormenting you and making it hard to be in relationship with you- things like anger, and anxiety, and fear, and the need to have your own way. You learn from personal experience about the sufficiency of God for every issue of life and death, and that vast resources of provision and power are only one request away.

If we are even modestly successful in that joint endeavor, amazing and powerful things will happen in you, your family, the church, your workplace, and our community. God himself will show up in undeniable ways.

That's it. That's my basic job. Everything else I do is designed to support or facilitate that end. Now, obviously that is a process that requires your voluntary cooperation and some effort on your part. You've to "work out your salvation with fear and trembling" understanding that "it is God who is at work within you, both to will and to act according to his good pleasure." (Phil 2:12.) So you've got to want that change. If you don't really want it, there's really nothing I can do but pray for you and love you and be present and available to you should God move in your life, and you begin to desire that change.

Keep in mind that this is not a denial of Calvinism and the Reformed Faith. Properly understood, it is the very foundation of its doctrine of salvation. Total depravity means that you can do whatever you want, but you are powerless to <u>want</u> whatever you want. The lost person is not able to choose Christ because, at bottom, he or she doesn't want to and can't bring themselves to want to. There's no use sugarcoating that fact or descending into nice platitudes. You will do what you really want to do. People always do in the end. Humanly speaking, the ball is in your court, and I am at your disposal. Please consider yourself cordially invited into a life of transformational discipleship, should you so desire.

I look forward to getting to know each of you in the coming months.



Action Point

How He does it.


When He does it.

It's time again for the monthly newsletter. Until Pastor Luke left and I stepped in to help write it, I had no idea how hard it could be to do this month after month. I look forward to handing off my commitment next month to Pastor Brian Carpenter!

Preparing for my final contribution, I feel compelled to share a personal testament of my faith and devotion. Those who have followed these arti-

cles are aware of my deep-rooted Christian beliefs, my profound love for Jesus Christ, and my unwavering faith in the teachings of the Bible.

Many Christians believe this, but we have differences with others. I am a Calvinist, a descendant of the Reformation branch called "Reformed." I am committed to the creeds, the five Solas, God's sovereignty in salvation, pedobaptism, and a Presbyterian form of church government. I wasn't always. I did not grow up in the Reformed tradition; I grew up in a liberal military chapel with chaplains who told me I didn't need to believe the Bible because it wasn't true.

I tanked in college. I walked away from my freshman year as an atheist because I thought Christianity was a foolish emotional tradition without substance or truth. It was the late 60s, and we were also questioning the existence of truth.


Fortunately for me, God is sovereign and does not fail his elect. He sent a Reformed theologian into my world and the words of solid theologians who helped me to *re-form* my mind so that I could present my life as a living sacrifice. Romans 12:1-2 are vital verses that have informed my life for almost 55 years.

I read Francis Schaeffer's *The God Who is There* and *How Then Shall We Live*? and J.I. Packer's Evangelism and the Sovereignty of God. I can still remember what they said,

and I still quote both of these authors.

Another book that changed my view of God was The Holiness of God by R.C. Sproul. This is one of the most outstanding books ever written. When RC died in 2017, people who loved his work often asked each other where they were when they read this book. Ask Josh—he can tell you the same thing.

Hello First Reformed Church.

What have you given God today? I get requests all of the time from people who are asking for something, and yet I ask myself, "What have I given God today?" I have spent countless hours in prayer about asking for things, however, I just recently thought



about, "What have I given to God?" Now of course He does not *need* anything from us, but does He *want* anything from us? The answer is yes! He wants us to worship Him alone, live for Him alone, and to glorify Him alone. What have we given to God today? I am reminded of Mark 14:3-9 when Jesus was anointed at Bethany. I preached on this a few months ago, so I hope that you can remember the key points of that passage, but if not allow me to refresh your memory. In Mark 14:3 it explains that Jesus entered into Simon the Leper's house, this indicates that Simon was a leper whom Jesus more than likely cured of leprosy. Continuing in this passage, Mary, the sister of Martha and Lazarus, pours an expensive oil on Jesus's head, therefore anointing him. What we may not know or remember is that the contents in the flask came to 300 denarii, which was the equivalent of a year's salary. This was probably the most precious and expensive item that Mary possessed. Quite possibly, she may have even taken a family heirloom and gave it to Jesus. Which, when you think back, makes sense considering the miracle he performed for her family in the raising of Mary and Martha's brother, Lazarus, from the dead. It is safe to say Jesus had done a lot for this family.

Back in May, Hannah and I went to California where I was able to conduct my grandparents' funeral. While we were there, Hannah and I visited an antique shop in downtown Clovis. We walked in and I found a locked case with money in it, old coins and bills, and then I saw another locked box that said, "Ancient Roman Coins," so I asked to see it. I saw coins that dated back to 200-300 AD. I was able to see and touch money similar to what is talked about in Mark 14. No, I do not possess money that Jesus or the disciples handled, at least I don't think so, but I now have in my possession coins that are dated back to the ancient days. When I saw this, it really put things into perspective as to how much it would have financially meant for Mary and her family if she would have sold this ointment. Then it hit me, I asked myself, "What have I given God today." Do I give God my everything or do I give Him the leftovers? Do I actually trust Him with my life, my family's life, and even my future? These are questions that we really need to consider. Today, don't think about ways in which God could give to you, but rather, how you could give to God. There is ultimately nothing material that you could give to God. However, we can give Him our worship, our attitudes in how we treat people, and our generosity with our money, time, and efforts. We even could show Him gratitude by following His commandments.

The ultimate source of showing gratitude is not in words, but in actions. Let's not only say we are grateful, but let's show that we are grateful. This is the concept of good works found in James 1 and 2. Our good works are not what saves us, but it reveals the fruit of our salvation. It reveals that God has transformed our hearts. Today not only should we ask God for His blessing but think of ways that you can bless His name. Here is the final thought, if you are thinking, "Well, why should I have to be the one who does something for God. He's God, what can I do for Him?" There are two answers here. First, because God has commanded us to do this through worship, word, and deed. Second, it is because He is worthy of it. He is worthy of our everything. He has given us everything and so we should be willing to give Him everything as well. Don't give God the leftovers.
