




Meeting Minutes

Hello First Reformed Church,

By the time that this has been printed and you're reading this Father's Day will be done and over with, but I wanted to speak on Father's Day. This is something for me that I am still trying to wrap my head around. I was recent-



ly at Melvin Reformed Church and I preached on Father's Day. I preached from Ephesians 6:1-4. I taught about how Paul was concerned about the family unit in the church, because children were not obeying parents, parents were not disciplining children, and they were not raising them in the Lord, the way that they needed to. Paul uses the term "Fathers" because he is focusing his attention on the general rule that most families in the church have a Father in the home. However, the Greek word that is used for "father" actually can be translated as "parents." With that being said it is safe to say that Mothers are included in the text just as much as Fathers are. Fathers it is our job to lead our households and to lead them well.

Are you aware Fathers, of the influence that we carry? Our presence alone in our households reduces our children's likelihood of going to jail or ending up dead by a significant percentage. Our children are less likely to deal drugs or carry a gun illegally. Our children are more likely to do better in school. Also, our presence decreases a mother's overall stress level, if we are involved. The key word here is "involved." It is not enough that you are just a warm body present. There needs to be involvement, there needs to be action. Are we aware that right now if we have a daughter, we are developing the man that she wants to marry? No, I'm not saying she wants to marry her father, but she is looking for traits in a man. You are the prime example in her life as what a man should be, act, and treat children and even her. Our sons are learning the same thing. The way we are raising our sons is how our sons are learning to act and live. Are we happy with the result so far? Are we taking that role seriously? Fathers, are we aware what sort of influence our decisions have on our families? Turn with me to Daniel 6:24.

It reveals that not only did the men get thrown into the den, but so did their wives and children. How can that be? Fathers, it is because our decisions to live in an ungodly manner can cause horrific outcomes for our family. The way we treat our wives and children, what we watch when we're alone at home, the way we act toward other women in our lives, if we get drunk, if we do drugs, all of these things will lead our families down a path that we don't want them to go on. It could lead them right into the lion's den. What do we do? Do as Scripture tell us to do. Ephesians 5:25, "Husbands love your wives, as Christ loved the church, and gave himself up for her." Ephesians 6:4, "Bring them (your children) up in the discipline and instruction of the Lord." The most loving thing we can do for our children is to raise them in the Lord and lead our wives in the Lord. Bring your family to worship, bring them to youth group, Sunday School, get yourself involved in those things. If they don't see you doing it, they won't do it, or if you make them do it, they will not enjoy it and become resentful to it. It is never too late to parent your children. As they get older the manner may change, but you are their parent for life. Don't be afraid to give advice, to instruct, to guide, and above everything else love your children. Never forget the second most important person in your life, your wife. Thank you for taking the time to read this newsletter and never forget that if you ever need a hug this big ole teddy bear has one just for you! Blessings,

LOVING THE PSALMS

Blessed is the man who walks not in the counsel of the wicked, nor stands in the way of sinners, nor sits in the seat of scoffers; but his delight is in the law of the Lord, and on his law he meditates day and night .—Psalm 1:1-2

Years ago when my mother was dying and her pastor and elders called on her they would offer to pray and read scripture with her. What amazed me was that when they read a Psalm, she recited the words aloud with the person reading the passage. We, her children, did not know that in the previous decade she had dedicated herself to memorizing the Psalms. They had become for her spiritual sustenance, they were the words God used to help her to lie down in green pastures, to restore her soul, so that she could dwell in the house of the Lord forever.

I think that the church today pays less attention to the Psalms than previous generations. We know one or two of them, but there are 150 Psalms. Maybe we don't like poetry, or maybe we don't like old music, but we are really missing out if we don't learn to love the Psalms!

Here are three ideas to consider.

- 1. **Jesus was a Psalm singer!** When Jesus sang in the synagogue or the temple, he sang Psalms. So did the apostles. The Psalms are God's songbook for his people. It may be time to write new tunes, but we need to know the Psalms if we are to follow in our Saviors steps. They were so important to Jesus that he quoted the Psalms more than any other book in the Old Testament.
- 2. **The Psalms reflect all human emotions**. The Psalms reflect joy, sorrow, fear, boldness, sin and repentance, anger, despair, comfort and everything else any one of us could ever experience. God uses the Psalms to connect with his people, providing comfort and purpose in the midst of all of our life's experiences.
- 3. The Psalms were God's idea, and are to be included in Worship. God gave us the psalms so that we could give his words back to him in worship. If we could ask Jesus to teach us how to worship, as he taught us to pray, he would include singing God's own words back to him. In fact, Paul wrote in Colossians 3:16 Let the word of Christ dwell in you richly, teaching and admonishing one another in all wisdom, singing psalms and hymns and spiritual songs, with thankfulness in your hearts to God.
- 4. **Memorizing Psalms** keeps God's thoughts in our hearts and minds, making it easier to *meditate day* and night on the law of God.



THE FIVE BOOKS IN THE PSALMS

Poetry isn't always easy —it isn't like reading a magazine or text message. It requires a little training, time and understanding to read well. We are to *meditate* on these words. Here are a couple of quick ideas that might help you learn to love and understand the Psalms.

The Psalms are not 150 random poems. They are organized into five books that have a clear purpose and progression. Keep in mind which book and theme include the Psalm you are reading. For instance, we are studying the 23rd Psalm and that clearly reflects the idea of confidence in God's care.

Book One: Psalms 1-41. Confidence in God's Care

- 1. Book Two: Psalms 42-72. Commitment to God's Kingdom
- 2. Book Three: Psalms 73-89. Crisis Over God's Promises
- 3. Book Four: Psalms 90-106. *Comfort in God's Faithfulness*
- 4. Book Five: Psalms 107-150. Celebration of God's Salvation

There are also several kinds of psalms, or different genres. There are:

- a) Hymns of Praise (see Ps. 8, 24, 29, 33, 47, 48)
- b) Laments (see Ps. 25, 39, 51, 86, 102, 120)
- c) Psalms of Thanksgiving (see Ps.118, 66, 107, 118, 138)
- d) Songs of Confidence (or trust). (see Ps. 23, 121, 131)
- e) Kingship Psalms (see Ps. 24, 93, 20, 21, 45)
- f) Wisdom Psalms (see Ps. 1, 37, 49)

LEARNING TO LOVE THE PSALMS BY DR. W. ROBERT GODFREY

What happened at General Synod 2023?

I spent June 8-13 in Pella as an East Sioux Minister Delegate to General Synod. There may be some who don't understand how our RCA government works but the General Synod is the body that is made up of minister and elder delegates from the whole denomination. This assembly sets direction for the denomination from year to year. Their decisions cannot bind General Synods to come, nor can they be bound by previous General Synods. This means that from year to year they are completely able to follow the will of the Holy Spirit. Contrary to what you may have been told, each General Synod convened from year to year is a very traditional group gathered to do the work of the RCA. There were several things that made it to the floor for discussion this year and I am pleased to say that while there were a few tense moments, this General Synod conducted itself with grace throughout the week. I left for home last Tuesday encouraged. Here are some highlights:

Restructuring team proposals

Throughout the General Synod, we considered the draft proposals from the RCA's restructuring team. On Friday, the team presented its work. On Saturday morning, I was able to serve as a facilitator for one of the feedback groups. Later Saturday, General Synod came together for a plenary discussion with the full assembly. On Monday, related overtures and motions from the floor continued the conversation. Delegates provided substantial feedback for the restructuring team's work over the coming year. The team will bring recommendations for synod's consideration in 2024.

Five decades of women's ordination

General Synod celebrated five decades of women's ordination to offices of elder, deacon, and Minister of Word and Sacrament in the Reformed Church in America. It was a time of rejoicing over the ways God has created space for women and men in the church to live fully and freely into all their gifts and callings. Stories of women were elevated and honored: women from the past who had to push against the patriarchy to follow their call, women from the present who are leading in powerful ways, and women in the next generation who play a vast variety of roles within the church. "We see women from many cultures, women that speak many different tongues, rising up into leadership positions both within the RCA and beyond," said synod vice president Judy Nelson at a celebration of the anniversary on Sunday evening. Nelson was elected president of General Synod 2024 the following day.

Ruth Langkamp, Next Generation Program Specialist for the denomination, called attention to the stories of women in the Bible as tangible reminders for "men and women everywhere that women are not footnotes in God's story, we are main characters and our voices, our power matter. This is the rich legacy of women in ministry here at the RCA." The offices of elder and deacon opened to women in 1972; the office of minister of Word and sacrament opened to women in 1979. In his General Secretary's report on Friday, Rev. Eddy Alemán said, "We in the RCA will always, unapologetically, bless and embrace all our women leaders and pastors. Women of God, we need you! Thank you for responding positively to God's call in your life."



First Sibley, you are to be commended as you have two daughters of this church who are currently ordained as Minsters of Word and Sacrament. Katlyn DeVries serves as a writing tutor at Western Theological Seminary and Chelsea Lampen is serving as a co-pastor in Illinois. Both were at General Synod this week and represented your legacy in the Reformed Church in America well.

Inaugural rate for covenant shares set by General Synod

General Synod adopted an inaugural covenant shares rate of 2.7 percent, which will go into effect January 1, 2024. This marks a shift from a

per-member assessment to a percentage-of-income approach, with the intention of a more equitable system of funding denominational work. Covenant shares allow churches and classes to pay in at a rate in accordance with their means.

Ministerial Formation Certification Agency Changes

Over the past several years, the Ministerial Formation Certification Agency (MFCA), which oversees the credentialing of ministerial candidates enrolled at non-RCA seminaries, has been making changes to its function and processes, including transitioning away from directly providing courses required for ordination in the RCA. The changes related to the new CRE designation also affect the MFCA's role. The new *BCO* language emphasizes the role of the classis as primary in the ordination process, while the theological agent—New Brunswick Theological Seminary (NBTS), Western Theological Seminary (WTS), and the MFCA—is responsible for attesting that a candidate has been appropriately instructed and may be examined for ordination by the classis.

Because of this, the PFOB's report laid out additional adjustments to theological education:

- With the MFCA no longer offering courses, students enrolled in non-RCA seminaries will need to meet their requirements elsewhere. Now students will take those courses at Western Theological Seminary (WTS) and New Brunswick Theological Seminary (NBTS).
- To facilitate communication among all parties affected by the changes (students, seminaries, and classes), the PFOB's report commended the use of transcripts and the role of classis clerks through the transition.
- WTS, NBTS, and the MFCA are working to figure out how to handle the Clinical Pastoral Education (CPE) requirement for MFCA candidates.

During the MFCA report on Monday afternoon, interim director Dave Schutt shared his excitement for the ways these changes will enable the RCA to extend hospitality to new churches and leaders wanting to join the denomination. "It's a time of change. It's a time of transition, and in many places and in many ways within our denomination," said Schutt, "Personally, I'm very excited about that. I believe that God is doing some fantastic, new, and wonderful things among us. I believe there is a very bright future. I believe as we walk in faith, we will be able to experience that future together."

If you have questions about General Synod or you would like to know more, I am happy to chat. I know that there are people who are highly anxious about denominational issues. I for one am not. One of the beautiful things about the RCA is the fact that we can disagree and still be in relationship with each other.

Two DVDs are the latest additions to the library. If you were not able to attend the showings in April, you can have a family night around the camp fire and watch THE PILGRIM'S PROGRESS and/or LIFEMARK. Following are synopsis from both of the DVDs.

THE PILGRIM'S PROGRESS is animated and based in John Bunyan's epic masterpiece. It is one of the most popular books of all time, and one of the most important stories of our faith! Second only to the Bible in total copies and translations, the story was written by John Bunyan, a pastor imprisoned for sharing his faith. This powerful allegory helps families understand that the spiritual journey is the most important journey in life, as well as the importance of staying on the straight path, even when the journey gets difficult.



LIFEMARK is inspired by a true story. David's comfortable world is turned upside down when his birthmother unexpectedly reached out to him, longing to meet the 18 year-old son she's only held once. With the encouragement of his adoptive parents, David embarks on a journey of discovery that leads to a staggering truth from his past.



We also have two new books in the library. One is the fourth and final book of the "Natchez Trace Park Rangers" series, **DECEPTION** by Patricia Bradley. "After being forced to kill an FBI agent gone rogue in self-defense, ISB ranger Madison Thorn is happy to be working in the fraud and cybercrimes division. At least numbers don't lie. So she's less than thrilled when she's drawn into a violent crime investigation in Natchez, Mississippi. She could also do without being forced to work with former-childhood-enemy-turned infur-

iatingly-handsome park ranger Clayton Bradshaw. When a woman who looks just like Madison is attacked on the same night Madison's grandfather is shot, it becomes clear that there is something much bigger going on...and that Madison herself is in danger. 
