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I want to start off this month's article by saying a deep and heartfelt thank you for the kind way in which my family and I have been received here at First Reformed. The welcome gifts are wonderful, and we will be enjoying locally sourced meat products and other goodies for some time to come. Laura and I and Jordan feel very comfortable here.

True story: When I was pastoring in Sturgis, there was a new minister at the Wisconsin Synod Lutheran Church in town. He called me and introduced himself. I suggested we have lunch together. He

agreed. We met at a local restaurant and ordered our food. When it arrived, I asked him if he'd like to bless it. He said no. I asked him if I could bless it for us, and he told me to go ahead, but that he couldn't participate in my prayer because I was a Presbyterian. You see, the Lutherans think that we Presbyterian and Reformed Christians are deeply mistaken on the issue of the sacraments, and particularly the issue of the Lord's Supper. We don't "rightly discern the body of Christ" (1 Cor 11:29, NKJV). Therefore he couldn't even pray with me or even acknowledge me as a fellow Christian. I was wrong about communion, it was going to send me to hell, and, while I'm sure he felt bad about that, my stubborn persistence in my errors was going to kill my soul. Needless to say we didn't end up having much of a relationship after that lunch. It just wasn't possible.

If you take a historical survey of things that Christians have debated throughout the centuries, the issue of the sacraments is probably one of the top three. A lot of ink has been spilled formulating and defending various positions, and at this point in history those positions are fairly well entrenched in the various denominations. The Catholics and Lutherans and Baptists are unlikely to change their views. Neither are we. How to understand and practice the sacraments is one of the main things that divides us into denominations. While there are certainly some downsides to that division, there is at least one good thing that grows out of it. It means we are taking the Bible seriously, even if we arrive at different conclusions about what, exactly, the Bible means on this issue.

I want to take this second newsletter article and deal with where we are going in terms of the pulpit teaching in the next few months here at FRC. The elders have asked me to do a preaching series on the issue of the Reformed understanding of the sacraments. I am of course doing what they requested. We will be dealing with the nature of the sacraments themselves and exploring other questions. We have strong and well-defined beliefs in these areas, but they are not widely understood by Reformed people. Lots of confusion abides. Not only that, the Reformed position is, in my opinion, the most difficult one to understand. So, while I am definitely going to be laboring to make these concepts easier to understand, there is a sense in which I am probably going to be stretching you a bit. That ought not alarm you. You are not unintelligent people. You can disassemble and repair complex machines. You can understand enough soil chemistry to calculate how much anhydrous ammonia to knife into your fields. You can assemble complex patterns in your quilting. You master complex concepts and technical language all the time. Let me tell you, if you can understand the basics direct injected variable valve timing engines, you can understand Reformed sacramental theology if you want to. Don't let the new words intimidate you. You can do this. I know you can.

The first sermon in the series on July 14, had to do with lawful oaths and vows, and the keeping of promises. That's because vows and promise keeping figure prominently in our understanding of the sacraments of Baptism and the Lord's Supper. The second sermon on July 21 was an introduction to the concepts of sacramental theology. We asked the questions, "What is a sacrament?" "How many

sacraments are there?” And “What, if anything, do the sacraments do?” In the next few weeks we’re going to be further broadening our understanding of how a sacrament works in the life of a believer to help him or her, and we will be discussing baptism and the Lord’s Supper each in more detail. After that series is finished, I am going to do a series called “So Great a Salvation.” In that series we are going to explore the fuller picture of what happens when the Lord saves a person. There are some things we can see, but there are a bunch of things that the Bible teaches us are going on behind the scenes. Understanding our salvation will help us grow confident in our salvation, and in the Lord who saves and preserves his people.

During Advent we will zoom out and take a “God’s Eye View” of His whole plan for human history, and the place of Christ in bringing about God’s purposes for us.

In the new year we will begin a sermon series on the doctrine of the Assurance of Salvation from the High Priestly Prayer of Jesus in John 17. We will see from the scripture that we are in the care of a good, kind, wise, powerful God who wants to do good to us, protect us, and provide for us. My goal is to help you begin to see the true heart of God. Our God is a good God. You can trust him. Lots of Calvinists think God’s mean, but he’s not. In much the same way that the great powers God created in this universe (like electricity and nuclear power) aren’t safe, yet they aren’t mean. If you understand them, you can harness them safely and they can be marvelously beneficial.

Our God is not safe, but he’s also not mean. If you approach him as he commands, life with him is full of delights and blessings that will last forever. If you don’t, you put yourself in the position of a person who is wandering around in a high voltage substation, who doesn’t know what he’s doing. Sooner or later he is going to touch the wrong thing, and it will probably kill him.

I’d also like to hear feedback on the idea of me teaching a Sunday School class for the adults. I don’t want to try to drum up interest in something people aren’t interested in, but I would like to feed any sheep who are hungry. My idea is to do a study of a portion of the scriptures or a book of the Bible. My initial idea is a study of the Sermon on the Mount. Please let me know your thoughts.

It is a pleasure being your pastor. I look forward to continuing to get to know you and in order to properly serve you and love you.

Today's Photograph . . . Be A Link In Your Family Chain To Lead Them To Christ



## **Bible Study Verse**

Deuteronomy 4:40

Keep His decrees and commands, which I am giving you today, so that it may go well with you and your children after you and that you may live long in the land the Lord your God gives you for all time. (NIV)

## **Thoughts**

I live along the coast of Lake Huron where the Thunder Bay National Marine Sanctuary is located. This marine sanctuary has some of the best preserved sunken ships in the world due to the fresh water. Over 200 preserved ships are at the bottom and a good chunk of our local tourism has evolved for those who wish to come and either snorkel or scuba dive.

The other day I was snorkeling with my daughter checking out an old shipping dock and lane, that for the most part, lies below the surface of the lake. It was a beautiful day and we could see 60 ft down to the bottom. We were checking out the fish, old posts, and other artifacts that had been left behind from an earlier time.

We had a great time exploring and contemplating all that had happened at this little port. There were quite a few clues left below the surface that allowed us to piece together the type of activity that would have been happening here. Though we didn't have all the information on this particular spot, there was enough evidence left for us to certainly get a picture.

## **Action Point**

One day, your life and my life will probably be inspected by someone from a future generation...grandkids, great grandkids . . . a long distant relative somewhere down the chain. They are going to be looking back and inspecting the evidence of your life. I heard a quote awhile back that said something to the effect that no one can really get an accurate measure of who a man is until he is in his later years when:

- His children choose to come home to visit, that's a sign of what he invested in.
- His neighbors swing by to have a cup of coffee and visit, that says something.

The people in his community can identify that he was honest in his dealings from one place to the next, that also says something.

The evidence of what he invested in their lives will still show itself even though he may be gone.

Your life is not lived in a box, and neither is mine. God expects each of us to spend our days living for Him. Someday, the evidence of your life will show itself. What will people see about you? What will God see?

The beautiful thing about God is that He chooses to redeem what has been lost. He never wants someone to stray away from Him. He is always willing to take them back to restore them to wholeness.

If you look back at the course of your life with shame today, know that God wants restoration for you. Ask Him to lead your life fully and completely from this day forward. Also ask Him to help you redeem the things in your life that you have lost. Not because of selfish gain for you, but to let them know that God has changed your life and that He can do the same for them! Be a link in your family chain to lead people to Christ!

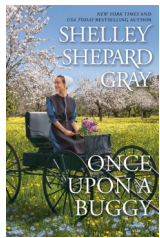
## From the library--

***The church library inventory is always changing, here are three new books...***



I HEARD A FLY BUZZ WHEN I DIED by Amanda Flower: “August, 1856, Emily is delighted when her brother, Austin, and his new wife, Susan, play host to famous thinker and writer Ralph Waldo Emerson and his young secretary, Luther Howard. Emerson has come to Amherst to speak at a local literary society and Emily is thrilled at the chance to meet one of her idols. Willa Noble, the second maid in the Dickinson home and Emily's friend, encourages her to speak to the famous but stern man about her poetry. But Emerson's secretary, Luther, intrigues Willa more because of his clear fondness for the Dickinson sisters. Willa does not know if

Luther truly cares for one of the Dickinson sisters or if he just sees marrying one of them as a way to raise himself in society. After a few days in his company, Willa starts to believe it's the latter. Miss Lavinia, Emily's sister, appears to be enchanted by Luther, which bothers Emily greatly. However, Emily's fears are squashed when Luther is found poisoned in the Dickinsons' garden. Emerson, aghast at the death of his secretary, demands answers. Emily and Willa set out to find them to save the Dickinson family's reputation and to stop a cold-blooded fiend from killing again.



Our next book by Shelly Shepard Gray, ONCE UPON A BUGGY (book #2 in Amish of Apple Creek series) is for the Amish lovers: “May Schott would do anything to change the tragic moment when she stepped too close to the fire that left her best friend, Carl Hilty, devastatingly burned. After Carl left Apple Creek for extensive surgeries, May patiently prayed for one chance to ask his forgiveness. Now, six years later, Carl Hilty is coming home. The reunion goes nothing like May anticipated. Overwhelmed with emotion at seeing Carl again, she is speechless, unable to look away. And Carl's own stone-cold silence leaves her certain that

whatever attraction they once shared has been replaced by his hatred of her. After hiding in the shadows of the big city, Carl has returned to connect with his family and to see if May can overlook his scars and accept his love—but it seems she wants nothing to do with him. He grudgingly agrees to stay with his family for a time before retreating once again...But in Apple Creek, it's easy to miss what everyone around you sees plain as day. For two people who belong together, it will take a few helping hands to heal the hurts of the past and make a miraculous new beginning.”



The last book takes us back to the Spanish Civil War and World War II in THE SWISS NURSE by Mario Escobar. “Elisabeth Eidenbenz left Switzerland in 1937 to aid children orphaned during the Spanish Civil War. Now, her work has led her to France, where she's determined to provide expectant mothers and their unborn children a refuge amid one of the worst humanitarian crises of the twentieth century. Desperate to escape the invasion of Franco's Fascist troops, Isabel Duenas becomes one of many Spanish patriots fleeing their country. She leaves behind her husband as he fights for democracy, and she seeks asylum in a refugee camp across

the border in France. Without adequate shelter, clean drinking water, or medical care, Isabel's future looks bleak—until she meets Elisabeth. When Germany invades Poland, an avalanche of humanity sweeps into France. In the cascade of crises that follow, Isabel and Elisabeth learn the cost and unexpected joy of sacrifice.” (Based on the true stories of refugees and the woman who risked everything to save them.)

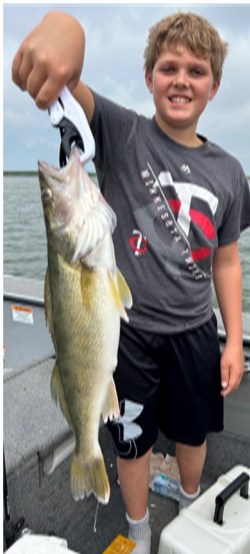

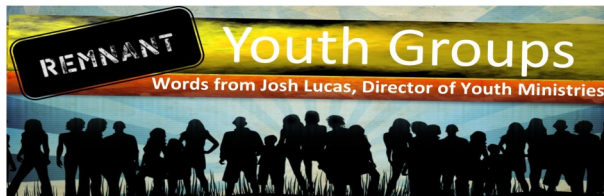


Hello First Reformed Church,

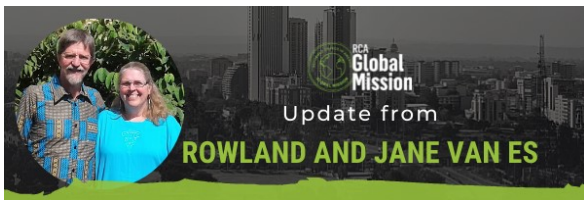

Dear friends,

The recent Gen Z protests in Kenya made international news headlines and prompted several of you to write us asking about our personal welfare and safety. Thanks for your concern and for reaching out to us. We appreciate your prayers and ask you to con-

tinue praying for us, for St Paul's, and for Kenya.

After the protests on June 25, classes were moved online for the rest of the month. We are back to having physical classes this month, although that could change if protests continue. Up to 41 or more protesters were killed and hundreds wounded. Many activists were abducted and some are still missing. One of our student leaders was abducted, but we thank God he has been found and released. Several other St. Paul's students and recent graduates joined the protests, including some of our younger Gen Z clergy.

What the youth were protesting was a finance bill introduced to increase government tax revenue to cover increased debt repayments. Kenya's debt is now 68 percent of its GDP and interest payments take up 25 percent of government revenue. Instead of reducing spending, President Ruto and his party tried to increase taxes to cover the difference, including taxes on basic necessities: food, fuel, phones, etc.

In 2022, President Ruto was elected by a slim majority after promising to help the "hustlers"—the small-scale informal workers—who make up the majority of workers here. 70 percent of Kenyans are under 34 years old but 40 percent of the working-age population is officially unemployed, surviving by hustling daily. Ruto promised one million new jobs but unemployment has increased as has income inequality.

In 2023, Ruto increased income tax and added a new housing tax. Then in 2024, he proposed more new taxes: hospital insurance tax, business turnover tax, and a 16 percent tax on fuel and bread. In response, many people started calling him Zakayo, the local version of Zacchaeus, the infamous tax collector in the New Testament. Perhaps, if like the biblical Zacchaeus, he climbs down and gives away half his wealth they will forgive him. (After the protests, he did agree to reduce government spending, so that is good).

The Kenyan economy is growing but not for everyone. Income inequality is increasing and most of the urban poor live in "informal settlements"—large slums of many small rooms made from iron sheets with no plumbing, no sidewalks, no government services, no police, etc. where life is very hard. Africa has the fastest urbanization in the world and Kenya is no exception, but the infrastructure is not keeping up.

**As you continue to pray for us and Kenya please include the following in your prayers:**

Pray for more peaceful dialogue between the elected government and its citizens, especially the youth. May a solution to the current problems be found that is more equitable and transparent.

Pray for more jobs and equal opportunities for people everywhere, especially for the unemployed. May inflation and interest rates decrease so businesses can expand instead of reduce their hiring.

Pray for reform of the police and security officers. May they be "content with their pay" (Luke 3:14) and not use their power for extortion but instead truly serve and protect all the citizens of Kenya.

Pray for church leaders and pastors as they seek to minister in this volatile environment. May they speak truth to power, comfort the afflicted, and lead God's people wisely in these tense times ahead.

Pray for the leaders of schools like St Paul's University as they decide how to keep their institutions running and provide an education for the youth. May they have much wisdom and discernment.

Thanks again for your support. We are staying safe and remain confident of God's protection.
