THE LAST HORSEMAN ~ FRIEDREICH SCHLEIERMACHER ~

We come to the end of our summer series on thought leaders that have influenced our world and have done so much harm to our culture—and to the church. Our last horseman is Friedreich Schleiermacher. You may not have heard of him, but his impact on the church has been devastating. How important is he? If we stay or leave the RCA will depend on the debate that this man's ideas helped cause. We are going to look at Schleiermacher and the roots and causes of Christian Liberalism, and the modern debates concerning worship.

Historically, the church has looked to the Bible as the starting point for our understanding of God and His salvation. Consider this verse: *"That which was from the beginning, which we have heard, which we have seen with our eyes...and heard we proclaim also to you"* (*I John1:1–3*). Unfortunately, many in the church today do not start with the Bible. They start somewhere else, usually with a human centered view of scripture.

Let me introduce you to this man and the theological movement he helped found—*German Higher Criticism, and Christian Liberalism.* He was born in Prussian in 1768 and he died in Germany in 1834. He lived during the same age as Darwin, Marx and Nietzsche—a time of major cultural change that was influenced by the rise of modern science. During his academic career he developed new ways of interpreting scripture (*hermeneutics*), and new ways of knowing God. As an academic he tried to reconcile the modern scientific world with the Bible.



Two key points that Schleiermacher made were:

1. The **Bible is not the historical, infallible, inerrant word of God**. It is a book informed by the history of believers, but it is full of human thoughts and errors. We don't need to interpret it literally, we must try to understand it in light of our own human needs.

Miracles are not real—science has demonstrated otherwise—therefore there was no virgin birth, Jesus didn't really rise from the dead, and life after death is questionable.

However, when you start with the assumption that the Bible is not inerrant and infallible, then it is possible to take out what you don't like. It is the lie of Satan to Eve in the garden, *"did god really say?"*

2. But Schleiermacher believed in God. So he said if we don't know God with our minds, or in scripture, we must only know Him through **personal experience**. It is our feelings that matter, not our minds or hearts. Our entire experience with God is personal—it is subjective, not objective. From him would come the idea that doctrine divides and experience unites.

As a result, the modern evangelical church tends to emphasize experience instead of knowing the Word of God or any theology. It is important that we have a 'personal relationship' with Jesus, but worship must meet 'my personal preferences'. We don't need to study scripture, just have religious experiences.

We are living in a day when liberal theology has made deep inroads in the church. Many professing Christians and even ordained ministers no longer believe in the authority of Scripture or the resurrection of Jesus Christ. How can people deny these essential doctrines and still call themselves Christians?

CHRISTIANITY AND LIBERALISM

Now for our last theological history lecture before we come to the end of this series. One thing I find very interesting in subtle ways is that the 'old' isn't important, only the 'new' has value. Some of you are probably wondering about why I am bringing up all these old *dead guys and their ideas*. Let's start with an idea that many of us are familiar with—*if we don't learn from history we are doomed to repeat it.*

I don't know about you, but there is a lot of the last century that I do not want to repeat. The 20th century was the bloodiest in all human history. More people died at the hands of their own governments than have died in all the wars in recorded history. However, it was also a century of great accomplishment and discovery. We went from wagons to supersonic air travel, from snail mail to the internet, from leeches to antibiotics, and so much more. The church had to navigate all of these changes—and it has not been easy. So, our last two major historical movements to consider because they have changed the church.

First: German Higher Criticism led to **Liberal theology.** In the early part of the 20th century seminaries, denominations, and theologians began to embrace this view of Christianity. Liberals said that the Bible was not inerrant and infallible, and we could take what we wanted and leave the rest behind. Miracles didn't happen, Jesus wasn't born of a virgin, and He didn't rise from the death in real time and history.

Seminaries, who train preachers, taught these ideas. Pastors started teaching these ideas from the pulpit. Sermons changed. Instead of teaching what the Bible has to say, they became focused on the needs of people and society rather than the purposes of God for his people. Sermons moved away from Biblical exposition towards themes from psychology, social justice, politics, or how to be better at something. Sermons may mention scripture, but they don't explain it.

The debates between the liberals and the conservative theologians in the 1920s and 30s led to a number of denominational splits, the establishment of new seminaries and to an ever widening divide among protestant theologians. The liberal churches and denominations are generally referred to as *mainstream*. Many of these denominations have drifted so far from historical Christianity until they are not recognizable as Christian. The RCA is considered a mainline denomination and the split that is underway is between those who embrace liberal theology and those who remain faithful to the God of the Bible.

Our decision to stay or to go needs to be based on our view of Scripture—not on the views of our culture. Serious cultural issues are before us—primarily homosexuality. But the division is deeper and more far-reaching than one social issue.

Secondly, **secularization** is having a major impact on the church. Secularization is *process of converting something from religious to secular possession or use.* Our society was once 'one nation under God' now we are a nation that denies free speech and demands that anything religious be removed from society. We have to deal with this new *cancel culture*.

It is deeply distressing when churches become more a place of community self-help meetings, places to teach yoga, places of social change instead of places where God is worshiped and studied, and where the body of Christ is equipped and nurtured.

HOW NOW SHOULD WE LIVE?



Let us come to an end of the series, and try to see our way forward. Since 500 ad, Christianity has been the dominant influence on the cultures of the western world. In less than 50 years we have lost that position. It may be the end of the former Christian era, but a new one is beginning. Like Christians in the first 500 years of the church, we are living a time of intense cultural conflict. These early Christians managed to change the world. They laid the foundation for our world.

We must learn to live, and worship Biblically if we are going to honor God. I don't know the answer to all of the questions we are facing, but I have hope. God has promised to preserve his people, to preserve the church. His kingdom is here, and he rules as Lord of Lords, and the King of Kings.

Perhaps the most important idea that we have to embrace fully on our way forward is this—**TRUTH EXISTS**. We live in a time of relativism, truth isn't universal it is only a matter of our own choice. Think about the way that people talk. *Sex before/outside marriage*—a matter of personal choice among consenting adults; *Sexual identity*—a matter of personal choice, not biology; or *Abortion*—a matter of a woman's choice about what to do with her own body. Right and wrong are just a matter of personal choice. Thank you Nietzsche!

Think about the words of Jesus from John 14:6 "I am the way and the **truth** and the life. No one comes to the Father except through me." The truth is that there is a solution to the problem of sin—it is Jesus Christ and his salvation. There is no other solution, not evolution and science (Darwin), power/politics (Marx) or sexual revolution (Freud). God will judge people who do not believe, those who do not worship him in justice and truth. All false ideas and teachings are lies, and they come from Satan himself. Lying is his native language. Consider John 8:44: "You belong to your father, the devil, and you want to carry out your father's desires. He was a murderer from the beginning, not holding to the **truth**, for there is no **truth** in him. When he lies, he speaks his native language, for he is a liar and the father of lies.

Why would any follower of Jesus follow the lies of Satan? 2 Corinthians 11:14 describes Satan as "an angel of light." Sin is tempting! It sounds like a good idea, more fun that not sinning, and above all reasonable and right. But all of the false ideas we have talked about shift the focus away from the truth of God and towards the desires and ideas of men apart from God. It is the lie that Satan used in the garden—"you will be like God."

Living a lie is not an option for believers, 1 John 1:6 says, *"If we claim to have fellowship with him and yet walk in the darkness, we lie and do not live out the truth.*" Jesus said, in John 14:15, *"If you love me, keep my commands."*

In order to know God, we need to know his thinking, and we know that in his Word. When we quit diving deeply into the Bible, and try to live on few remembered stories or ideas from sermons or classes when we were children, we will not be able to grow into the people we need to be. We must stop compromising, stop going along with the ways of the world when those ways are not God's ways.

It is time to stand with Paul who wrote in Romans 1:16 "For I am not ashamed of the gospel, because it is the power of God that brings salvation to everyone who believes: first to the Jew, then to the Gentile." We too must not be ashamed, we must not remain silent, and yet we must be loving.

We must rediscover and affirm that the Bible is our only rule for faith and practice. Luther knew the risks when he stood before the Diet of Worms in 1521. He could not deny his writings unless he was convinced

by *Scripture* that they were incorrect. He said it knowing it would likely lead to his death. Can we do less, especially when we still have a constitutional right to freedom of religion, press and speech? Therefore, as the psalmist said, in Psalm 119:105 *"Your word is a lamp for my feet, a light on my path."* We must put our feet on the path, and follow the light of the gospel revealed in the inerrant, authoritative word of God.

How do we begin? It is hard to say, and I admit that it is very confusing right now. Things are changing so fast, and it seems as if there is a new challenge everyday. Be comforted. God lives in Eternity, He is with us and His timing is perfect. Here are a few ideas to consider as a starting point for our struggle to find how now to live.

1. Speak the Truth in love (Ephesians 4:15). We must speak up, we cannot be silent and let the lies go unchallenged. Why wouldn't we want others to know the truth. I find that many believers are remaining silent when ideas that we reject are being proclaimed. We know the truth, so why wouldn't we proclaim the wonderful, saving Gospel at all times and in all places?

It seems like we live new time in which anyone who disagrees is guilty of hate speech. We must not hate, we must be patient, polite, kind and yet truthful. Differing with someone is not hateful, so we may have to find new words, new ways of interacting with people, and we must show the love of Christ at all times.

2. Worship in Truth. Worship isn't for us, it is for God. We need to turn from the American worship of self and seek to obey the first three commandments. We must seek to hear the Word from the pulpit, participate in the sacraments correctly, pray continually, praise him with psalms and spiritual songs. John 4:24 reminds us that, "God is spirit, and his worshipers must worship in the Spirit and in truth." I think it saddens the Spirit when we ignore scripture in worship, and spend time fighting over secondary issues. We must worship in truth.

We also need to become people of prayer—deep, ongoing, lasting prayer.

- 3. Live in Truth—we must practice the truth we say we believe. It isn't uncommon to hear people complain about the 'hypocrites' in the church. Sometimes those charges are false, but I think they may be more and more true. For example, we must live sexually pure, honoring marriage and families if we are to demand our culture listen to us about homosexuality and transgenderism. All the data reveals that people who claim to be Christians live lives as sexually impure as those who don't believe in God. We can do better! Another thing we need to do is practice being the loving neighbors that the Bible describes. I think that demonstrating love may be our greatest tool in solving the problems we are facing.
- 4. Teach the Truth—we must study and teach God's word. Bible study, Sunday school, small groups, home bible study....we can't live what we do not know. There are more Bibles in the world today than at any time in history, yet the people of God know less about what it says than before the invention of the printing press. Let's ALL attend a Sunday School class this fall—and make sure our kids attend too!

All of these suggestions are from my heart and they are a beginning, not an end. I need to make sure that I practice what I write. We have a glorious challenge, may we be as faithful as Christians in the first five centuries of the church. They changed everything!

Thoughts

It was opening day of bow season, October 1, 1993. I was 24 years old and excited about having time off to hunt whitetail deer. The leaves were still in their place providing excellent cover for both the hunter and his prey. A light, but cool breeze combined with a mixture of sun and clouds made for a perfect Michigan day.

I climbed into an old wooden and abandoned tree-stand, built more than twenty years ago, and not more than 10 feet off of the ground. I wouldn't complain though, as I was just happy to be in the air and glad that it held my weight.

The first hour went by quickly and without any action it was time to stand and stretch. Looking to the east, I saw what I came for, an 8 pointer striding in my direction. He wasn't a monster, but he was still a shooter. I readied myself and as if on cue, the young buck trotted into bow range and stopped approximately thirty yards away. I had only a small opening to shoot through, as the fall foliage was thick.

The bow vibrated, as I released the bow string pushing the arrow with deadly force towards my unsuspecting target. A direct hit caused the buck to hunch over, as he bolted through the brush and ground cover. I would find him fifty yards away, breathing his last, as I cautiously approached.

Action Point

The story doesn't end there. I only had time to hunt in the morning, as a playoff softball game awaited me in the evening and we had a long drive ahead of us. If I left right away and if I hurried, I would have just enough time to get ready for the game. However, as life goes, we ran out of gas, causing us to arrive, just as the game was starting. I was the head coach, so I quickly had to set the line-up, pay the ump, and run on to the field. And then all of a sudden one of my players began yelling and shouting at me about playing time. He totally caught me off guard. The situation quickly escalated into a yelling match between the two of us, as my adrenaline was already running high from an awesome hunt, the stress of running out of gas, and the pressure and excitement of trying to get to the game on time.

We would later work things out, but I will never forget this opening day hunt, as it was filled with such raw emotion from the beginning to the end. Nonetheless, it serves as a reminder that as Christians we need to control our emotions and realize that the earthly things we believe to be so important are really just fleeting events.

Nothing should ever overcome the responsibility that we have to love each other, forgive others, and ultimately serve our King. Not even a great opening day.

Sportsmen's Tip of the Day

After hearing about many hunters getting seriously hurt falling from tree-stands, I do not recommend climbing into old abandoned homemade hunting structures. It's not worth it. CENTER of HOPE God who leaves the ninety-nine to seek out the one who is lost (Luke 15:3-7). As followers of Jesus, we must also seek out the lost ones among us. A couple of days ago, Jesus' parable of the lost sheep ech-oed in my ears as I sought out a man whom I spoke with the day be-As a faith-based organization, we teach our guests that God is not disfore. Let's call him "Don." The sun had not risen yet and there was a

cold breeze in the air, but God laid it on my heart to seek him out on the streets. The day before, Don came into the Center of Hope with a group of known street beggars. I did not recognize him, but he recognized me. When he approached me, I realized that I had spent quite a bit of time with him four years ago when I worked at the St. Francis House. Back then, he had full-time employment and was handling his addiction to alcohol in a healthy manner. However, it was obvious that he turned back to his old ways. Out of concern, I asked to speak with him in my office. In our conversation, I learned that COVID-19 had claimed the lives of his brother and uncle several months ago. His grief led him back to the bottle and his addiction led him to homelessness. He now spends his days begging for money so he has enough money for more alcohol. He told me that he drank hand sanitizer as a substitute for alcohol one day. He is truly lost. He is scared to seek help because he knows the withdrawal would be brutal, and he would feel the full grief of the loss of his loved ones. I learned as we spoke further that he had no self-worth. He told me all he wanted to do was find a tree to sleep under to freeze to death so he could be with his brother and uncle again. I told him he had immense value to God, so much that God took on flesh to die on the cross for him. We spoke of this for a while. After we spoke, he asked if I could bless him with a pair of gloves, so I did along with a trench coat. He had been sleeping outside every night without proper winter gear. I arranged for him to go to detox that night by contacting the police and made sure a bed was available at the St. Francis House for him for the next day. However, I learned later that day that Don never made it to detox. I sought him out early the next morning with a warm blanket in hand to lay over him, but sadly, he was never found. As the days go by, Don has been active in my thoughts and prayers. I will continue to seek him out on the streets and help others like him draw closer to Christ. There are so many lost ones, like Don, on the streets who need a loving word and guidance. As the Church, we must be ambassadors of Christ, seek out the lost, and show them the overwhelming love of Christ.

In those encounters, we stand on holy ground. Our mission is to love God and love people. What that looks like now is different than what it was. However, the need for mission has not changed and the Church is called to respond to that need. We must seek out the lost ones as Jesus did for us. 
