

Thoughts

The last trip I made to the Grand Canyon, a brother and I sacrificed our annual hike (to the bottom and out in the same day) so that we could ride our mountain bikes around part of the rim. This allowed me to get some pictures for these devotionals. One photo I was able to capture is entitled, "The Heart of the Canyon". (Can you see the heart-shaped rock at center-right?) If you have not been to the Grand Canyon, you need to go. If you are like me, you will be moved by the splendor and majesty of God's creative power!

"To declare God's worth" is a very appropriate definition of worship that I learned some years ago. The rocks and stones in the canyon are doing just that. As a matter of fact, they are crying out, even now, as you read this. While driving home from work today, I listened to a song which invited us to come back to the heart of worship:

"... It's all about You, Jesus; it's all about You."

Not only is the Grand Canyon ALL about Jesus, but THE ENTIRE creation declares His worth!!

Action Point

The next time you visit a place like the Grand Canyon, bring a Walkman, Discman, or iPod with your favorite praise song, or some really inspirational music. As you listen and look at that small part of creation, from your heart, give credit where credit is due. It really is all about Jesus and His ingenious works of art everywhere we go!

GENERAL SYNOD2023



I have been listening to the videos from General Synod and reading about the major changes proposed at this year's meeting. I encourage you to read and listen for yourselves—everything you need is found on the website homepage and is easy to find. Go to www.rca.org

One of the more interesting discussions occurred around the draft from the Restructuring Team. If you recall, the Vision 2020 team proposal included a way for churches to leave the RCA peaceably, and they recommended restructuring the denomination.


Since then, the Restructure Team has been working on a proposal that was presented to the General Synod this year. It was NOT adopted. More information will be presented in 2024.

The team proposed a radical change to the way that the church government of the RCA would

function. Besides changing our terminology, there would be a significant change in who has authority, how work would take place, and how we would think of ourselves globally. Here are the highlights:

PROPOSAL 1: Move to *global leadership* and *resource centers* with *clusters of churches* and ministries

- · Resource center: Primary assembly, responsible for credentialing and ordaining ministers and commissioned pastors, equipping churches, and functioning as a judiciary.
- · Global leadership council: Secondary assembly, serving as the denominational executive board.
- Clusters: Groups of churches and ministry leaders within a resource center serve as a relational support network.



PROPOSAL 2: Move to more frequent local gatherings with less frequent global gatherings

- · Resource centers would hold annual business meetings, using a consensus model for decision-making rather than Robert's Rules of Order.
- · Global leadership gatherings would happen every three to four years. The focus would be worship, prayer, preaching, and equipping, with no decision-making business on the agenda.

PROPOSAL 3: Create a Biblically-based system for accountability and discipline

- The policies would be based on the process outlined in Matthew 18, with a sought outcome of reconciliation in each case.
- · The resource centers would be the primary judicatories.

Recently the library acquired many new books, included were a number of an Amish genre. So this month the synopses from two of the Amish books will begin this article:

SECURE (SECRET (SECRET

A SISTER'S SECRET is the first book of the "Sister of Holmes County" series, "Putting her 'Rumschringe' (running around years) behind her, Grace Hostettler returns to Holmes County, Ohio, joins the Amish church, and begins a new life with a new romance. The next four years are nearly idyllic for the oldest Hostettler child-except for the hidden pain she bears from a carefully harbored secret. Her peaceful world is shattered the day she runs into Gary Walker-an English man who knows enough about her past to destroy her future.

Gary's arrival in Holmes County coincides with a series of startling attacks against the Hostettlers. Is Gary at the root of this evil? Amishman Cleon Schrock plans to marry Grace but is unaware of her past. When evidence of Grace's deception arrives on her family's doorstep, will Cleon abandon the woman he loves? Will one women's secrets destroy an entire Amish community? Can love and faith triumph over shame and deception?"



Some of you have read THE PATIENT ONE by Shelley Shepard Gray, "The Walnut Creek Series." THE LOYAL ONE is book number 2: "When Katie Steury hires Harley Lambright to remodel her rundown house into a bed-and-breakfast, she does so with trepidation. Though they are longtime friends, they've recently had a rocky relationship, thanks to her being partly responsible for his latest breakup. But while they may not always get along,

she needs someone to trust with her secrets, and Harley is nothing if not trustworthy. Katie has always reminded Harley of a bright hummingbird—she moves a mile a minute, and she possesses a very sharp beak. He's hesitant to accept the job because of his history with Katie. But when he realizes that Katie's been hiding her mother's hoarding, he agrees to help because it's clear she needs someone on her side. Both soon discover that clearing the debris in an old house can lead to some cleanup in their lives, too. As the house gets a second chance, so does their relationship. Now all they have to do is open their hearts—and pray that their new bond will stand the test of time,"


















Dear Friends,

Another semester, another group finishing, and another set of practicum students to visit. This time I (Rowland) went to Thika Memorial Church to visit Samuel, one of our BD students. Funny enough, the priest he was working under was

also an SPU student, but studying Counseling Psychology with Jane.

I was told to come in the afternoon. When I got there around 1 p.m., I found Samuel teaching catechism in the main sanctuary to a dozen sixth graders from the church-run elementary school next door. I told them I had joined the church in seventh grade so they were one year ahead of me. Samuel also goes to their school during the week to do Christian Religious Education (CRE) classes. Religious education classes are offered in most schools here (Muslim schools offer Islamic Religious Education, and mixed public schools offer both classes).



While Samuel was teaching, I met with Rev Andrew, the one studying counseling psychology. Andrew said he chose to do that degree instead of a bachelor of divinity because, while working as a youth pastor with his diploma in theology, he was constantly asked for advice about personal issues, and so he felt that psychology would help him. His bishop then encouraged him to study counseling at St Paul's

University.

Andrew had good things to say about Samuel, who then showed me around the parish. They have an old sanctuary built in the 1920s with some nice stained-glass windows. Their youth service is held in the old sanctuary, while the main English and Kikuyu language services are held in the newer, bigger sanctuary.

When I posted a picture of these two churches on Facebook, a missionary friend who used to work in Kenya commented that he had started the youth service with about 13 in attendance, 4 of which were his family members. When I told Samuel that during exam week, he said they are now over 100!

Samuel is just one of many students finishing this year. Those who finished this semester had a special commissioning service during which the Dean of Students encouraged them to be useful to God and society. Then, they each lit a candle from one of the three Deans, marched outside to form a circle, and enjoyed tea and cake to celebrate. It was one of the biggest finishing groups ever.

Because you support us and St Paul's University (through the RCA-SPU scholarship fund), many students are getting an affordable quality Christian higher education that will equip them to work in Kenya, East Africa, and beyond. This year we are celebrating 120 years of faithful ministry since the original divinity school was started by the Church Missionary Society (CMS) on the Kenyan coast in 1903.

Please pray that God will continue blessing St Paul's and send more students and staff for another 120 years of faithful service here to God and humanity.

We thank God for answering our prayers earlier this year for rain. We hope the rainy season that has begun will last long enough to ensure a good maize harvest (it is the staple food of Kenya).

Pray also for the economy here, which is suffering from inflation from the war in Ukraine and the devaluation of the local currency against the dollar (which makes everything imported more expensive).

Pray for an easing of the tension between the ruling party and the opposition, which has had several demonstrations over the cost of living as well as still contesting the results of the 2022 election.
