Grace and Peace to you from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ, People have been wondering about the Restructuring conversation that has been going on within the denomination. That restructuring conversation has been happening now and more feedback was received at 2023 General Synod. It is important to note that this past General Synod was **NOT** to vote on a proposal, rather our job was to give feedback and insight for a proposal to come before the 2024 General Synod. It is important to note that this con-

gregation is close to 400 years old and change in any church organization is never fast as you well know. I would like to share with you the values and principles that are guiding this discussion.

RCA Values The Reformed Church in America recognizes this current moment as a strategic opportunity to faithfully discern and determine its call as a 21st century institution and beyond. As a part of this process, the GSC staff of the RCA faithfully commit to the following values as part of the expression of church and mission in our participation in the disruptive, redemptive, and transformative work of Jesus Christ here on earth:

- WE VALUE the multiplicative and generative work of the Holy Spirit, which is expressed through the practice of disciple making, apprenticeship and ministry multiplication.
- WE VALUE the body of Christ, composed of disciples and leaders of all races, abilities, and generations—men and women—who courageously contribute to God's kingdom mission here on earth.
- WE VALUE the participation of the Church in the practice of community renewal here and around the world, partnering with local and global leaders to see the restoration and flourishing of our communities.
- WE VALUE our local and global responsibility to bear much fruit and multiply as followers of Jesus—loving God, loving others and making disciples—from where we are to the ends of the earth.

Guiding Principles for the Re-structure of the RCA

As followers of Jesus Christ and agents of transformation in the world, we must to go back to the calling we have from God to be a blessing to our communities so that the people we serve can experience the transforming power of the gospels in their lives. We need to come together in love, which is Jesus' basic message, and to refocus all of our efforts and energy in the proclamation of the gospel and the making of new disciples of all ethnicities. In order to do that, the RCA needs to reorganize and restructure to maximize focus on the mission. These seven principles will guide the re-structuring vision for the future of the RCA:


- 1. Focus on the missional priorities of making disciples, multiplying leaders, ministry multiplication and missional engagement. The making of disciples must be at the tip of the spear of RCA work in the future.
- 2. Reaffirm the historic RCA statements on human sexuality. As a denomination we are not walking away from our historical understanding of sexuality and marriage.
- 3. Embrace covenantal relationships that reflect Hebrews 10:23-25 at the classis level. Classes must embrace a covenantal relationship at the local level to support and encourage one another in love for mission, ministry and good deeds.
- 4. Accept the RCA polity regarding exercise of discipline. RCA polity gives local classis the responsibility for the ordination and oversight of their pastors. If a pastor needs to be disciplined for any reason, his or her classis are responsible for the exercise of disciple and restoration.
- 5. Reorganize and streamline RCA structure to maximize focus on the mission. The organizational

structure of the denomination will be revised to allow for more flexibility and less bureaucracy.

- 6. Transition the General Synod meetings toward ministry equipping and celebration. General Synod meetings are too heavy on business. In the future we will include intentional time for leadership development and celebration of ministry.
- 7. Extend love and grace toward those who decide to leave.

If you have any questions, please reach out to me. I was at this years General Synod as a delegate for East Sioux Classis and I served as a moderator for the small group feedback sessions. I have more hope now for our denomination than I have had in a long time. We are healthier now as a classis than we have been since I transferred into East Sioux Classis in 2006. Please continue to pray that God's leading of the Reformed Church in America would bear much fruit and help others to enter and receive the kingdom that has drawn near to us in Christ.

Words, Words, Words

I love words. I love it when they make me think, or smile or sometimes laugh out loud. For example, what does it say when I buy *Old Dutch* tortilla chips to make *nachos?* I wonder if we could buy *Old Mexican stroopwafles* south of the border?

Putting the silliness aside, one reason I studied theology in college was that I love the words of God, because they reveal the nature and character of God. The more I learn, the more there is to learn. There is no end to learning about the God of glory. He is infinite and I am not! I always think about the words from *The Last Battle* by C.S. Lewis. As the book ends everyone in Narnia is running towards Aslan—faster and faster and faster! This is what he wrote, "The further up and the further in you go, the bigger everything gets. The inside is larger than the outside." God is like that, as his word.

One of the great blessings that I have had the past few months was to work on the Denomination Discernment team. It was delightful to work with a great team that took the time to evaluate many, many denominations. We had several criteria we used in the evaluation process, but the primary question was to find denominations that were faithful to Biblical inerrancy and infallibility.

To do this we looked at the confessions, statements on websites, BCOs and other documents to try to see who consistently seeks to treat the Bible as described in the Belgic Confession. It wasn't always easy. Theological words can get slippery—and understanding the underlying theological positions. Our team learned to dig down, ask questions, read lots, and then discuss our findings to come to a consensus to present to the consistory.

It was fun! I took the time to read the Triple Unity (Belgic Confession, Heidelberg Catechism and Canons of Dordt), and the Westminster Confession and Catechisms again. And, just for extra fun, I read the scriptural supports. I am convinced that the reformational scholars that wrote these confessions were correct, and what they wrote was as important now—as then. They were confronted with the errors of Catholicism, while we are facing the errors of liberal theology.

The purpose of the confessions is to have a statement of beliefs to guide and direct our understanding of what it means to be the people of God, and to be the Church. The congregational survey demonstrated that 83.93% of us agree that the Confessions help believers to understand Biblical doctrines and help to prevent false beliefs. And 76.78% of us believe that our faith is objective truth, not personal opinion.

Whatever decisions we make in the next few months, let us pledge ourselves to study God's word and the Triple Unity to make sure that what we decide leads us *further up and further in!* To help you on your way, read the Belgic Confession Articles 3-7. From the scriptures, read Matthew 5:17-18, John 17:17, 2 Peter 1:19, 2 Timothy 3: 16-17, Proverbs 30:5, Hebrews 6:18, John 10: 35, Luke 24:44, and Romans 3:4 to begin with.

Hello First Reformed Church,

There was an aspect of my sermon that I wanted to stretch out a little bit more and that is the beginning on the word, "Love." I think there needs to be some clarity on something here, I am not in any way going to condemn or



talk down on anyone who says that they "love something." It was just merely a suggestion of a thought to the idea of using a word out of context. However, I do also think it is important for us to understand what we are teaching ourselves when we use this word. We tend to lose its meaning if we say we love everything. Let me explain it this way, have you ever asked a young Gen Z aged person what love is? They say that it is a feeling majority of the time. They have no idea, because they are not taught what love is, the culture or Hollywood explain what it is. Granted there are a few movies out there that explain that love is not a feeling it is an action, but in general there is a change in the culture that love is just a feeling. The other sad reality is that one of the more recently popular podcast subjects is on dating. If you listen to some of these podcasts that talk about dating, they have usually college aged women and even men as well talking about the idea of dating and marriage, the results may shock you. Girls especially in this culture have no idea what it means to be in love and have no real desire to marry, at least until they are significantly older, mid-thirties usually. Our culture has tried to redefine what love is, but what is love? Love is sacrifice. Jesus made it abundantly clear in John 15:13, "Greater love has no one than this, that someone lay down his life for his friends." Now the context of this verse is Jesus ultimately is talking about His upcoming death on the cross, however the principal applies here that the greatest ACT of love is sacrifice. The concept of laying down your life for your spouse, boyfriend, girlfriend, son, daughter, mom, dad, etc. However, I want to take this a step further because I learned another disheartening truth about this culture in their response to love. Are we willing to sacrifice an aspect of our lives for those we say we love? For example, are we willing to sacrifice our desire to go out and party because our children need us at home? Are we willing to sacrifice time at work to come to our kid's play, sport, award ceremony, program, etc.? Are we willing to sacrifice our own happiness to do something that makes our spouse happy? Sacrifice is something that is missing from our culture.

Our culture has been blackened with this ultimate sense of selfishness that no one is concerned about anyone else, only themselves. We as a culture are telling girls and women that if they are not happy in their marriage just leave and divorce their husband. We as a culture are telling our kids that you have to finish college first in order to get married, or you have to have a job before kids, you need to go out and live before you have kids. I am here to tell you that my life has been amazing marrying Hannah while we were still in college, having kids before we graduated from college, and travel with our children. Ultimately, we need to teach our kids what love actually is. It is not a feeling it is action. We made vows at our weddings, "till death do us part, sickness and in health, for better or for worse." These vows mean something, if you need counseling go and get counseling. God can fix any marriage if you are willing to trust in Him and work at it. Love, brothers and sisters, love your families, show that love.
