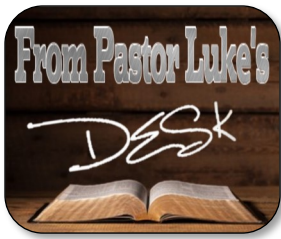

We have had our challenges but hope this new addition to ministry will make a big difference to all those watching online.

On Sunday, August 23 at 10 am, we will have one church service at Central Park in Sibley. Bring your lawn chair as we will locate ourselves where we would normally have the "Movie in the Park" event. This would be the east side of the shelter. We will also be having our first communion together as a church body since this all started. The worship team is excited about this opportunity and you will have plenty of space to social distance from each other.

The Elders will be handing out pre-packaged communion elements. The juice is in a sealed cup with foil and a wafer is on top of the cup also sealed. Someone will come to your car, find out your ages and then get you a packet designed for their particular age. Everything you need for the week should be in that packet. You will be able to watch the Bible lesson on YouTube and also included are questions for discussion time as well as crafts, games and snacks for each day. Dear Friends,

Greetings again from St Paul's University in Limuru, Kenya. A lot has changed since we wrote to you at the beginning of the lockdown here, while some things remain the same. First the good news: we were able to finish the January-April semester by offering classes online and giving open book final exams. We were also able to get our youngest daughter back to Michigan to be reunited with her sister in Holland.

We are grateful to have a safe and comfortable home on campus where we can self-isolate. As we write this, we are sitting outside enjoying our little backyard. The only drawback is that some things on campus continue "as usual" and that includes the construction of a new building for the faculty of Theology right next to our house. They work from early morning until dark six days a week. This gives us a lot of noise which of course we can't get away from

St Paul's was also able to start the May-August semester and two-thirds of the students signed up for those classes. Amazingly 90% of these students are only using their mobile smartphones to do all their classwork since they don't have access to a computer. Both of us are teaching several classes via Google meet (often in the evenings). Jane is teaching Intro to Psychology, Health Psychology, and Developmental Psychology. She enjoys having students from all four campuses, not just from the main campus where she usually teaches.

Rowland is now teaching Homiletics (Preaching) and Pastoral Care, both of which are a bit tricky to do virtually, but he is finding some creative ways to do it. He is also coordinating the senior students who are still doing their internships this semester even though constrained by the lockdown and restrictions on all public gatherings. He has also been writing and got a couple of articles published this semester.

Kenya, like a lot of countries, is opening back up this month. COVID-19 cases are still very low compared to the USA. So far, less than 10,000 people have tested positive and under 200 have died. But the number of confirmed cases has been going up from less than 50 a day to over 300 new cases a day. A big concern is that there are less than 450 ventilators and ICU beds here for a population of over 50 million people. Some local counties have fewer than 10 ventilators and ICU beds available.

Unlike some other countries, Kenya has decided not to re-open primary or secondary schools until January 2021. The latest word is that colleges and universities may re-open in September but only for some students and under strict health guidelines. It will be a challenge to keep staff and students safe then. Churches are re-opening next week, but only for 100 people at a time and no one under 13 or over 58 will be allowed. Like many of you, we have been worshipping virtually via Zoom but we do miss singing on Sunday.

As we continue to pray for each other, here are some things you can be praying for: • Pray for Jane and Rowland and their students as they continue to adapt to teaching and learning virtually. • Pray that as churches and businesses re-open they will do so safely and without a sudden spike in new cases as has been the case elsewhere that re-opened too soon and/or with too little distancing. Masks are required here, but not everybody wears them properly or consistently enough to prevent spread. from Rowland and Jane Van Es in Kenya July 2020 Jane and Rowland Van Es's ministry At St. Paul's University, an ecumenical school that has trained people for ministry since 1903, Rowland teaches Old Testament introduction and interpretation and business ethics, and Jane teaches psychology and sociology to bachelor of divinity students and a master's level course in caring for people with HIV/AIDS. Learn more at www.rca.org/vanes. • Pray that Kenya continues to have a relatively flat curve and will not have a spike in cases that would easily overwhelm the number of intensive care units and ventilators available in the country. Pray that the frontline health workers stay safe. Pray for the families of those that have already died from COVID-19. • Pray that whenever colleges and universities re-open they will also follow all the recommended health guidelines. It is uncertain how students can be housed and fed safely on campus without contaminating each other and the staff that works and live here.

Action Point

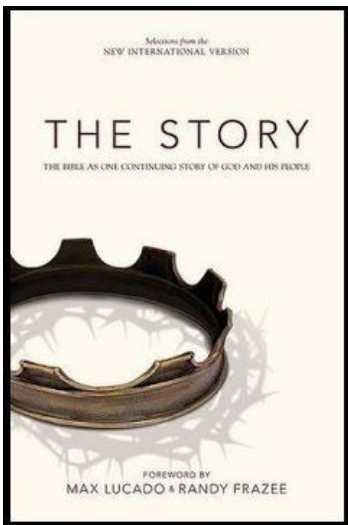

The Story—Resumed!

August brings thoughts of going back to school and we are going back to our learning adventure in “The Story”. We are going to borrow a strategy from our teachers and do what they do at the start of every fall term – they REVIEW!

Do you remember in January when we began our study with Genesis? We read through the story of Creation, Fall, and God’s first announcement of His plan for Redemption. Key to all reformed theology is the idea of reading all of scripture in light of the three key elements: **Creation, Fall and Redemption**. (Genesis 1-11)

God’s plan of redemption included calling a people to serve him, and so we entered into the life of Abraham, his son Isaac, and his son Jacob. Abraham “believed God” and moved his extended family to the land he was promised. The prospered and grew, but with Jacob’s 12 sons there were problems. Joseph’s 11 brothers sold him into slavery in Egypt (Genesis 37—50). What they intended for evil God meant for good and when famine occurred the entire tribe moved to Egypt where it grew into a nation.

Under the leadership of Moses the nation moved back towards the land promised to Abraham...it just took 40 years of wandering in the wilderness because of Israel’s rebellion against the law of God. *Every time the nation was NOT FAITHFUL to God, they suffered for their unrighteousness.* (Exodus, Leviticus and Deuteronomy).

The time from Abraham (2166-1991 b.c.) through the time of Moses (1,526-1406 b.c.) is known as the time of the **Patriarchs** because the nation was led by a father-figure leader.

When Moses died his brother Aaron led the nation into the promised land which was divided into areas assigned to each of the 12 tribes (descendants of the 12 sons of Jacob). This next era in the history of Israel is known as the time of the **Judges** (1406-1050 b.c.). We quickly went through this era and it is one you may want to study further! (Joshua and Judges)

Now we are going to learn as Israel transitions from the time of the Judges into the time of the **Kings and Prophets** (1050-432 b.c.). Our transition study starts with Ruth and Boaz, who is a type of the kinsman-redeemer. Their lives point to our final kinsman-redeemer, Jesus Christ. We are still on the overarching Creation/Fall/Redemption—but we are moving into the establishment of the kingdom. Before we start our sermon series on August 30, read the book of Ruth focusing on 4:1-12.

Can you recite all 66 books of the Bible in order? The Old Testament has 39 books and the new Testament has 27. This is the time to make sure that you can—it will help us as we continue through *The Story*.

One thing to keep in mind is that the books are arranged by type as well as by history. Learn them by groups and you will be able to find any book that you want with ease. Let’s see how much we can do in the next 8 weeks!
