

# **Olesea and The Markers**

God used a shoebox to reassure me of His love.

I was born and raised in a small village in Moldova. Our country was in severe financial instability after the fall of the Soviet Union. Everyone in our family needed to work to make ends meet. Besides his daily job, my dad and the rest of the family also worked long hours gathering and selling walnuts and working on government agricultural fields.

We tended a garden and kept domestic animals in order to have food on the table. Most of our food came from the garden. During the winter, we didn't buy extra food; we ate whatever we had stored. My six siblings and I had to wake up early before school to help feed the animals.

When we weren't working, we played outside with other kids. We made up our own games because we didn't have toys.

One day, when I was 5 years old, I was told that something exciting would happen at church the next day. I remember going to bed extra early, hoping that would make

the day come sooner. When I woke up the next morning, I felt it was the most glorious day ever. I was so excited to receive my shoebox and couldn't wait to open it.

We opened our shoeboxes once we got home. We sat on the living room floor and took turns opening our shoeboxes. I dumped my whole box on the floor so I could see everything at once. The gifts were wonderful—we had items such as coloring books and soap.

The thing that stood out to me the most was a pack of colorful markers. I couldn't take my eyes off them. There were so many in the pack! I didn't know some of the colors existed. I was so excited I jumped up and started running around the room.

The markers my family had at home were dried out. We would dip them in water just to make them last a little longer. I always wished I could color and draw—the markers were exactly what I wanted. I could hardly wait to show my friends at school the new markers.

The day I received my shoebox I went from knowing about Jesus to actually knowing Him. I began a personal relationship with Jesus—one where He is my Best Friend—instead of just a powerful Man I'd heard about during Sunday School.

God used my shoebox to reassure me that He really loved me. It showed me that God does answer prayer. God became real and personal to me.

My family and I moved to the United States in 2003 and I now work as a nurse. I pack shoeboxes so I can bless other children. I want to help bring the same joy and happiness to other children that I experienced. I want children across the world to know Jesus.





Let me tell you something about HER. You know the one. The mom behind you in school drop off. Boss babe goals, mother of three who looks like Christie Brinkley in the flesh. Did she get a new car? I mean, of course she did. A Lexus – no big deal. Anndd... my check engine light just came on. Awesome. Wait, what is that smell? Is that milk??? Why can't I be more like her?

They say comparison is the thief of joy, but what exactly is joy? Because quite frankly I feel as if the lines have become quite blurred. Is it HERS or mine? Does it look

like what SHE has or what I have? Far too often I feel as if joy looks more like her life, her job, her body, her marriage and her health. And yet, we know nothing about HER.

Somewhere along the way, we started treating joy as an ideal state. This place of unmarked perfection. Phrases like I'll be happy when ... (fill in the blank HERE) roll off our tongue.

We chase objects and titles, homes and possessions and call it the quest for joy. Sis, that's not chasing joy, that's chasing comparison. Joy isn't found in a perfectly filtered Instagram square or in what SHE is doing – it's a state of mind.

For years I would walk across the street once a week to the local homeless shelter and serve lunch to the men there. Always sure to engage in friendly small talk I would ask, "How are you today?" flashing a smile.

"I'm blessed. How are you?"

BLESSED.

Sis, these men had nothing to their name other than the clothes on their back, but they had enough joy and perspective to realize they were alive. They were living. They had a warm meal and a place to stay and keep warm. They were thankful. You want to talk about perspective.

But still we look for it don't we? We chase it down and cling to it with everything we have. We accumulate things, quick beauty tips get pinned to our boards, we finance cars and homes and wonder why we are still left feeling empty. We objectify and idolize it. We hang our very worth and legacy on THINGS. Sister hear me.

Joy isn't a trophy you can hang on a shelf or a car parked in your garage. You're not going to find it in designer clothes, the latest fad diets or title you carry – it's how you LIVE. It's what you value and how you feel. It's going through hard times and choosing to keep your chin up. It's the impact you make on others. It's giving love even when it's hard.

That joy you're searching so hard for? You're just looking in all the wrong places. It's not found in HER life. It's right in front of you.

It's the mess you've cleaned for the fiftieth time.

It's the kids laughing in the living room.

It's building a life together no matter how messy and chaotic.

It's fighting for your marriage through the not so great times only to emerge on the other side stronger than ever.

It's getting up through tired eyes knowing that today you get one more day on this earth.

Joy isn't a destination, it's a state of being. A conscious mindset of being grateful every single day. Is it always easy? No. Choose it anyway. Every single day.

# RCA GENERAL SYNOD—FINALLY!

Covid-19 has had a major impact on the ability of people to travel and gather in large groups. This has been true for the RCA and the annual General Synod meeting. The decision to cancel the meeting in June 2020 was disappointing because it was the meeting that would take on the controversial Vision 2020 Final Report. Restrictions surrounding the pandemic put pressure on the denomination again and the traditional June meeting was postponed until October 14-19. So now the meeting is upon us, as is the decisions to be made surrounding the report.

If you have not been raised in the RCA you may be wondering what the General Synod is, and why decisions made by this body affect our congregation.

John Calvin taught that the church is a *body* that both serves and is accountable to one another. He proposed a form of church government that would help individual churches to find strength and guidance from one another.

General Synod
Regional Synods
Classes
Consistories

Like other Calvinistic denominations, the RCA follows the *presbyterian* form of church government. The term comes from the Greek word *presbuterous* or elder. Our government is structured around groups of elders. Each congregation has a *consistory* that answers to the *classis*, and the classis to the *regional synod*, and finally the *general synod*. Our congregation is part of the East Sioux Classis and the Synod of the Heartland. Together the four groups manage doctrinal controversies, mission boards, colleges, seminaries and other ministries.

In 2019 the RCA reported a membership of 194,064 members, 877 congregations, 52 classes, 9 regional synods and one general synod. Sibley FRC is a member of the East Sioux Classis of the Synod of the Heartland.

General Synod membership is made up of minister and elder representatives from each classis and regional synod. In its annual meeting, the General Synod sets the direction and tone for denominational ministry. It has authority in all matters relating to denominational program and policy. It also has general responsibility over all lower assemblies (regional synods, classes, and consistories).

The meeting is after all a meeting with the responsibilities of hearing reports, acting on budgets and considering the challenges of ministry in the denomination. The annual meeting considers reports from ministry areas, councils, agencies, boards and commissions. Any requested actions of the General Synod by these agencies and reports are not acted on in that year, and subsequent reports must be submitted. It takes time to make careful and Biblically based decisions.

Besides the special Vision 2020 report, there will be reports from racial and ethnic councils, denominational ministry work, agencies, commissions, theological education, and colleges — approximately 36 annual reports to consider and evaluate.

# VISION 2020—THE BIG DECISION

**History** Theological divisions are not uncommon in this history of the Christian church, and since 1974 the RCA has struggled with the question of human sexuality, particularly in relationship to homosexuality. For 46 years there have been papers, overtures, study teams and dialogs seeking to find common understanding in God's will for those who identify has lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender or questioning.

While the denomination has continued to uphold the definition of marriage in the confessions—between a man and a woman only—the debate continues. No consensus has been achieved, nor is it likely to. Therefore, in 2018 the General Synod commissioned a team to write the report now known as Vision 2020 to explore three options (staying together, radical reconstituting and reorganizing, separation). The language in the final report did not select one option, but decided that all three had merit and might be considered by individual congregations.

### Recommendation 1—Restructuring

This option suggests that Classes be reorganized as *affinity-based* rather than *geographically-based*. This means that churches would select a Classis to join, one that had like minded churches. Churches who embrace sexual diversity would join together in classis and churches the embrace traditional marriage would join together in another—but all would be members of the RCA.

### Recommendation 2—A New Mission Agency

This option would attempt to preserve our shared history by providing a home for shared work in missions, education, etc. that would allow for churches to be separate from the denomination.

### Recommendation 3—Mutually Generous Separation

Understanding that many churches will be leaving the denomination, the BCO needs to be modified to handle all the questions of separation. These include questions of property, insurance, and denominational dues, etc.

### WHAT ABOUT SIBLEY FRC?

Our Consistory has been considering this issue, both as individual members and as a group. The East and West Sioux Classes have also been actively engaged in this debate. For now, the consensus in our consistory is to wait to see what happens with the General Synod meeting in October. You may have heard of congregations that are already planning on leaving the RCA, but many are taking the same position as our consistory. It is not clear what the RCA will

decide, what they will uphold or cast aside, or what options will be presented to the Classes or congregations.

This is why it is so important to pray for the upcoming General Synod meeting.


With the new outbreak of the coronavirus, we are getting more and more

Medical teams have been visiting villages and we continue to provide pastoral and medical care along the river. We see approximately 200 patients each time we visit the area.

Most of the sicknesses are: diarrhea, headaches, cough, and skin disease, but thank God that we have never seen patients infected with the COVID-19.

Please pray for the safety of the ministry, the safety of our medical brigades, and the safety of our girls as they attend university in Managua, the capital city. We also pray for more financial support to help us face the increasing number of hungry children that is the result of the pandemic and unemployment.



# **Sportsmen's Devotional**

### Bible Study Verse

I Peter 5:8

Be alert and of sober mind. Your enemy the devil prowls around like a roaring lion looking for someone to devour. (NIV)

### **Thoughts**

While I was hunting deer recently, a large black bear approached me. When he was still about 40 yds away, I leaned my muzzleloader against a tree and dug my camera out of my pack.

When about 12 ft. from me, he began to circle, getting inside of 8 ft. At that point, I realized that I had moved several steps away from my gun. If he had wanted to attack, I would have been in trouble. I tried to scare him off, but he wasn't about to leave. Throwing sticks at him, shouting, suddenly raising my arms and trying to look as large and as intimidating as possible seemed to make him more interested.

He studied me for almost five minutes. He had no fear; and I'm sure I could have moved closer--even close enough to touch him. Bear experts say that when a black bear attacks, it will approach very methodically, as if to size you up. In this case, he finally turned and walked slowly away.

### **Action Point**

When Satan approaches a believer, he is more dangerous than a black bear. He is looking for an opportunity to attack. He may circle or hang around for as long as he can. Keep your weapon handy; it's your best defense! The Word of God is more powerful than a two-edged sword. "For the word of God is alive and active. Sharper than any double-edged sword, it penetrates even to dividing soul and spirit, joints and marrow; it judges the thoughts and attitudes of the heart," Hebrews 4:12 (NIV).


Interacting with evil is foolish and risky. Nothing good can come of it. Keep from evil by continually staying in touch with the Lord. Keep Him daily in your mind and heart; and keep His Word on your lips. The prayer that He taught His disciples says, "Deliver us from evil." So ask for His power to help you live in a way that pleases Him. It's your best protection against sin.

### Sportsmen's Tip of the Day

Always assume a black bear is dangerous. In fact, any bear that is habituated to people is an especially dangerous bear. Don't feed a bear. Don't try to touch one. Back away slowly and place an obstacle-perhaps a tree or a vehicle--between you and the bear. If there are children present, stay between them and the bear. Never come between a mother bear and her cubs.


