We are moving forward!!! Like me, I am sure all of you are getting tired of how Covid has affected each of our lives. We are all anxious to get back to what would be our new normal. We want to be able to sit in our restaurants, not have to wear mask to go into stores, and get rid of all the other changes we have made.

Some have also been anxious about church getting back to normal. As I share today, I am excited to inform you that we are now moving to Phase Two which will put us closer to normal, with some minor precautions still in place. We are not completely

back to what we were doing in March, but we are making progress.

As the consistory voted on August 31 to move to Phase Two we also did a little revision. I would like to share with you what church will now look like.

In Phase 2 we will move to moderate safe distancing. We are still encouraging anyone who feels sick to please stay home. Masks will continue to be optional and we will continue to do deep cleaning between services as well as in our education areas. Greeters at the door will not be shaking hands, but instead, will greet you with a smile and hand you a bulletin, if you wish, when you arrive. Offering will still be placed in the plates at the back of church. We will continue to celebrate communion with pre-packaged wafer/juice combinations.

You will notice some of the pews will be sectioned off for those who still want to social distance themselves. However, many of the pews will be open for you to sit in as you choose. We will place the hymnbooks and Bibles back in the pews as well. The nursery will be opened but will not be staffed so parents, if you choose, you will be able to take your child to the nursery. We are going to limit the number of toys available and after they are used, they will be disinfected. After church, coffee and juice will be offered for anyone who would like to stay and socialize. At this point we will not serve food items. If you feel comfortable shaking hands you are welcomed to do so but please make sure you ask someone before doing so and make sure they are comfortable with it. We will also continue to have our online live services you can find on Facebook.

Children and Worship will be available for first service only. If you want your child to attend you need to go to the first service. We are also opening up all our education opportunities. We will social distance in the classrooms and there will be a staggered time dismissal at the end of their meeting time. We are working to keep our classroom size to under 10. We are also offering up some new curriculum for your child to take home and as parents you will be able to have discussions on real life issues they are dealing with. Please take the time to grow your child to know Christ through these conversations. After each class meets there will be a deep cleaning done in the rooms. When weather permitting, many of the classes will meet outside. High school and Jr. High Youth Group activities will move forward as normal. Josh will be getting information out to all the students and parents about their upcoming year.

As we take this next step and move to Phase Two I want to encourage you to be reminded we are all at a different point as we continue to deal with Covid. Your decision is the right decision. If you wish to continue to watch our services live from your home please do so. We understand and are supportive of your decision. We want you to stay safe. Do that as long as you feel you need to. For those coming to church be mindful that there might be those who are attending that are not as comfortable as you are with social distancing or even a handshake. Please respect where they are at. We are grateful that you are attending. Be careful in the words you choose to speak when you to talk to others. None of us should be forcing, intimidating or pressuring someone else to be where you are at.

^3 3 3 Our concern for each other and our call by God is to love and respect each person's choices during this pandemic.

I am grateful for you as a congregation and the way we have moved forward. Your financial giving has been an amazing blessing and I hope that God has been challenging you during this trying time. God works all things for the good. We are one step closer to normal. Be patient but celebrate our moving to Phase Two!

I have two other items I would like to bring to your attention as well. The first is our nomination process for Elders and Deacons this year. By the time you receive this newsletter a nomination ballot will be mailed to you for the office of Elder. Please read the instructions on how many to vote for. It will indicate who is eligible and who is not. You will also receive instructions on returning your ballots. You will need to return your ballot either by September 20 when you come to church or drop it off at church the week prior or send it by mail, so we get it before Sunday the 20th. Once we have the Elder slate established we will then send out another mailing for Deacon nominations with instructions and timelines as well.

Because of Covid and knowing not everyone is yet attending church, we felt this was a way in which we could get the entire congregation to be involved in our process. In the meantime, please pray for God's guidance in who to elect for this upcoming year.

Secondly, on October 4, which is World Wide Communion Sunday, we will be having communion once again. We are also going to take a special offering for the Osceola County Ministerial Association. A plate will be set in the back of church specifically for this offering. Due to canceling the Passion Play this spring, and most of the money received is used for the ministry opportunities we do, funds are low. We could use your help.

The Ministerial Association use their proceeds in the following ways:

- 1. Expenses that we have to make the Passion Play happen. This includes activities for the children involved as well as a financial gift to the school for allowing us to use their facility.
- 2. In cooperation with the Sheriff's Department we help people who are in need. This might be with groceries, a tank of gas or overnight lodging. Everyone we distribute funds to goes through a background check with the sheriff's department before we help.
- 3. Along with the giving of churches and individuals we help finance the beginning of the school year backpack programs This past year we handed out materials, supplies and backpacks to just over 120 students.
- 4. We help fund special speakers coming into the community and the school. Many of these speakers bring encouragement to our students and information to our parents in the many issues they deal with.

Many great things are happening. God is good! As we move into the fall, lift up our church and our community in prayer. May we find God at work in each of our own lives but also God at work in our church!





Prophets, Priests and Kings

As we continue through the history of the Bible we are leaving the time of the Judges and heading into Israel under the leadership of Kings, Priests, and Prophets. During the time of the Judges, Israel slowly gained control over the land of Canaan—the promised land. The Judges governed the people, working with the priests to ensure that God's people could flourish. It was a very difficult and troubled time but the people experienced the hand of God leading them.

However, and we should be surprised, Israel was not satisfied with this arrangement. Other nations had kings, and they wanted one and they wanted one now (I Sam 8:19-20). God gave them the king they wanted, which was Saul. David was God's choice, and until he came to the throne Israel did not experience all that He planned for their good and His glory. God in his Covenant relationship with his people established a system of governance, a balance of responsibilities and roles. And all three offices pointed the people of God to the future, to the perfect Prophet, Priest and King—Jesus Christ.

Prophets were tasked with speaking God's Word to the people. They proclaimed God's truth, occasionally performed miracles, and sometimes revealed God's plans for the future. They most often called the people to 'repent' or be prepared for judgement. Prophets also spent time calling the kings and priests to repentance. Jesus taught the word, he prophesied and performed miracles. **Jesus** not only taught the word of God, he is the WORD of God! (John 1:1)

Priests served as mediators between God and man. The priests offered sacrifices on behalf of the people, offered up prayers to God, and stood between the people and God. **Jesus** is our Mediator and our High Priest: "For there is one God and one mediator between God and mankind, the man Christ Jesus" (1 Timothy 2:5). Hebrews 4-10 tells us that Jesus is our ultimate High Priest and his priesthood was superior to the Levites.

Kings ruled over the people, providing safety and peace so that the people could worship God. The king would 'cover' the people with protection, he would 'save' them from their enemies. David was the ultimate Old Testament king—a man after God's own heart (I Sam 13:14 and Acts 13:22). God also promised that


David's kingdom would last forever (2 Samuel 7:16) and it is in **Jesus** that the promise was fulfilled. He is our king, our redeemer, and he has "all authority in heaven and earth' (Matthew 28:18).

Normally, the three offices of prophet, priest, and king were distinct from each other, with no overlap. That is, a king was not a priest or a prophet. A priest did not function as a prophet or a king. And a prophet simply did a prophet's job without trying to be a either king or a priest. They held each other accountable as sinful human beings. But Jesus Christ perfectly fills all three roles simultaneously: He is the Prophet, Priest, and King, to the great blessing of the world.

As you can see on the next page we are going to move through a great deal of history, and many books of the Bible, in a short timeframe.

OLD TESTAMENT BOOKS AND CHRONOLOGY

The Kingdom of Israel did not remain whole. Saul became king in 1050 BC, David became king in 1010 BC and ruled until Solomon became king in 970 BC. The kingdom split in 930 after the death of Solomon. The northern 10 tribes rebelled under the leadership of Jeroboam I, and none of their kings were righteous. This was the Kingdom of Israel. The southern kingdom (Judah) remained faithful to the covenant under the leadership of Rehoboam. The two tribes that remained faithful were Judah and Benjamin. David was of the house of Judah, and Jesus would also come from the tribe of Judah. The covenants, and God's plans of salvation, cannot fail or be thwarted by the desires of men.

New books have been added to the library. Here are synopsis from four of them:

<u>Secrets of My Heart</u>, Willamette Brides #1 Portland, Oregon, 1879. Nancy Pritchard finds herself a widow with a world of problems when her deceased husband's schemes start to come to light. As she searches through the pieces of her loveless marriage, Nancy realizes there is a lot that she didn't know about this man.

Seth Carpenter is a childhood friend of Nancy's who has recently returned to Portland. He's delighted to see her again, and as a lawyer, he is able to help her sort through the legal aspects of her husband's death. But there's more to him than meets the eye, and his job will take him into a darker side of Nancy's life--a side she didn't even know existed. As they search for the truth behind her husband's death, their attraction to each other creates complications, and the threat to Nancy increases. Can Seth be honest with her about who he really is and why he's come to Portland? And can Nancy bear another betrayal?

The Way of Love, Willamette Brides #2 Faith Kenner is pursuing her dream to become a doctor at Willamette University's medical college so she can use her gift for healing to help those in need, especially the native populations forced onto reservations and then neglected. When she meets Andrew Gratton, a handsome riverboat captain who has been injured on his ship, she uses her skills to tend his wound, and a friendship grows between them. Andrew admires her strength and willingness to stand her ground, and Faith appreciates his intelligence and compassion. But

Faith holds a secret that means their friendship can never become anything more, so she must bury her feelings for Andrew as best she can.

When her fellow students put together lectures to speak out against Oregon's racist laws and policies, Faith is eager to participate. But some powerful men have other plans for their state, and soon Faith is caught in the middle of a plot to push the local Indian tribes to rebel. As she and Andrew fight for the rights of others, their love for each other grows. Can they trust that God has a way toward love for them, or will her secret stand in the way of their one chance for true happiness?

The Green Dress by Liz Tolsma (Fiction based on strange but true history.) Death plagues the Robinson family. When Harriet Peters came to Boston four years ago, the Robinson family took her in like one of their own, and Harriet became closer to Lizzie Robinson than her own siblings. Now Lizzie is deathly sick, failing quickly just like several others in her family have done over the past few years. How can so many in one family die from the same mysterious illness? Harriet doesn't have answers but she is determined to help the family, bringing in a new-to-the-

neighborhood doctor, Michael Wheaton. As Harriet and Michael close in on the answer putting their own lives at risk, can the cause be found before anyone else dies?

One Little Lie, Pelican Harbor #1 by Colleen Coble Jane Hardy is appointed interim sheriff in Pelican Harbor, Alabama, after her father retires, but there's no time for an adjustment period. When her father is arrested for theft and then implicated in a recent murder, Jane quickly realizes she's facing someone out to destroy the only family she has.

After escaping with her father from a cult fifteen years ago, Jane has searched relentlessly for her mother—who refused to leave—ever since. Could someone from that horrible past have found them?


Reid Bechtol is well-known for his documentaries, and his latest project involves covering Jane's career. Jane has little interest in the attention, but the committee who appointed her loves the idea of the publicity. Jane finds herself depending on Reid's calm manner as he follows her around filming, and they begin working together to clear her father. But Reid has his own secrets from the past, and the gulf between them may be impossible to cross—especially once her father's lie catches up with him.







Young Cancer Patient Packs Shoeboxes, Puts Others First



Emma Hemphill, 10, is like a lot of girls her age: her favorite color is blue and she likes to ride her bike, go to the park, and swim. But like only three in a million children her age, she has Ewing's sarcoma—a rare form of bone cancer. Diagnosed on October 3, 2016, Emma was immediately hospitalized and spent all but five days of that first month receiving chemotherapy. When friends from River Oaks Community Church in Clemmons, North Carolina, visited her in the hospital and asked what they could bring her, Emma said she wanted items to put

in Operation Christmas Child shoeboxes. People brought toys, schools supplies, and hygiene items to her room on the ninth floor of Brenner Children's Hospital in Winston-Salem so she could do just that. "It helped to pass the time," Emma said. But that wasn't the only reason why she did it.

"I love packing them. It's just a lot of fun for me. It makes me feel really good inside. I love helping others," she said. She filled 110 shoebox gifts in the six weeks between her diagnosis and National Collection Week, the third week in November. 'I Just Wanted Them All to Know and Love Jesus.' The shoebox items came from friends, donation boxes set up at her sisters' schools, and a couple trips to the store as a family. When Emma was able to be at home, their living room became shoebox-packing central. "We had stuff for every age and both genders," said Emma's mother, Maegan.


Emma's favorite items included stuffed animals as well as soap and toothbrush holders. But she didn't stop when she had filled the boxes. She prayed over every single one of them, asking God to bless the recipient. "I just wanted them all to know and love Jesus," Emma said. She wanted the boxes to "bring them lots of joy." Maegan added through tears, "Wouldn't it be neat, Emma, when we get to heaven to meet some of the kids who got your shoeboxes?" In the next couple of weeks, Emma's family anticipates hearing where some of their boxes are going because for one-third of them, they opted to Follow Your Box and discover the destination of their gifts.

Emma's family has packed shoebox gifts for children in need ever since she was little. But they usually packed one for each of the three children (Emma; Grace, 7; and Mary Salem, 4) and sometimes one for her mom and dad, Lee. It wasn't a shock to Maegan that Emma wanted to do more this year. "She's always been a giver," she said. But Emma is not content just to rest on her accomplishments in 2016. "Let's do 150 next year!" When It All Began On Friday, September 30, Maegan returned home from a trip to Raleigh to find Emma hobbling around and complaining that her leg hurt. The next morning, Emma's American Heritage Girls troop had a service project, but she had to sit it out because she said, "I don't feel like I can walk." By Sunday morning, she couldn't walk at all so they brought her to their pediatrician that afternoon. The doctor recommended an X-ray so Maegan brought Emma to the hospital to see an orthopedist. The films showed clear lines on the edge of her tibia, but the edges of the secondary bone, her fibula, were fuzzy.

By 11:00 pm Sunday, Emma was getting an MRI. What was supposed to be a 20-minute test ended up taking an hour and a half. The radiologist kept requesting different views because he discovered a tumor so large that it had fractured her fibula. This was the only symptom of the cancer. All of her bloodwork was normal. By 2:00 a.m. Monday morning, Emma was admitted to the hematology/oncology floor of the hospital. Now Emma rotates between in-patient and out-patient chemotherapy with the goal of getting four to five days off a month. She hasn't managed that ratio so far, however, because she has gotten sick along the way. Any fever can put her in the emergency room. Emma requests prayer that she would remain healthy enough to stay on her current treatment schedule. If she does, she'll be able to be home for Christmas. To receive more regular updates on how to pray for Emma, see her pub-

lic Facebook group "Prayers for Emma," now nearly 700 members strong. 'What's My Next Project?' With 110 shoebox gifts behind them, Emma and Maegan are now focusing on improving the ninth floor of the hospital where she spends so much time. They're sorting and restocking the DVD library on the floor and looking for other ways to bless the nurses and other patients. "They need a swimming pool in the nurses' station," Emma said in fun. "Or a gumball machine. Or free pizza delivery every Thursday!" These big ideas aside, she is thankful for the time her family spent packing shoeboxes with her this year. With her can-do spirit, she asked, "What's my next project?" Although medical statistics say that Emma's case is among three in a million, Maegan said, "We think she's one in a million!" The children who receive her shoebox gifts will think the same.






