My job list at church is ever evolving from my original job "duties". It wouldn't believe some of the things that I do here that never make it on to job description page. That's okay, it keeps things interesting here. I can say that my job is never the same from day to day and week to week.

I remember working with Pastor Gary and cleaning out refrigerators with him every 3 months. It was something we would do together and after he left it has become my job. I run errands for people, I have taken care of babies both in and out of the office, I even fix cable t.v. problems! I am the one people turn to answer all of their questions, and to remember how things were done in the past. I get all the supplies for the church from the biggest to the smallest of things. Some days my to-do list is long with no end in sight and some days I do not even begin to touch the list because other things will happen that trump whatever plans I may have had that day.

One of the things that I do here is talk to people. I know that may sound strange, but it is a big part of the job. There are so many people hurting, struggling or simply lonely. My heart aches for those people. I know that like many wounded people, they find it hard to trust others, so I take this part of the job very seriously. "Oh Lord, I pray silently, help me say the right things."

We've all been there. Perhaps we find ourselves with a friend, family member, or even a stranger who is hurting. There are some things to remember about those who struggle. **Reach out with unconditional love**. A hurting person may display intense emotions—tears, anger, bitterness, frustration, or sarcasm. We may feel tempted to withdraw from such emotional displays, but we need to draw near to the person who is in pain, just as God helps us when we're in need.

Try to understand rather than fix the hurting person's feelings. We may mean well when we try to persuade a hurting person to "cheer up," but suffering is often an integral ingredient of the spiritual experience. We must acknowledge a person's pain, not try to put a bandage over it.

Find specific ways to be supportive. People in pain are often reticent to ask for help. Someone who is ill or bereaved may need you to bring food or offer to baby-sit. A friend facing a frightening medical test or hospital stay probably would appreciate your offer to go with her. Even little expressions of love—a hug, a note in the mail, an invitation to come over—can mean a great deal to a hurting person.

Share your own times of struggle. I've found hurting people benefit when they can talk with someone who's open about their own struggles. Such honesty breaks down the barriers of separation that suffering often creates. God is glorified when I'm willing to tell others how far he's brought me, as well as my continuing need for his power to guide and deliver me in times of temptation or difficulty.

Finally, **Pray for those with whom you're sharing.** We may tend to focus primarily on what we can say or do to help a hurting person, but don't forget the power of prayer. It's still our greatest tool for helping others.

And the God of all grace, who called you to his eternal glory in Christ, after you have suffered a little while, will himself restore you and make you strong, firm and steadfast. 1 Peter 5:10

SCARS OF LIFE

Some years ago, on a hot summer day in South Florida, a little boy decided to go for a swim in the old swimming hole behind his house. In a hurry to dive into the cool water, he ran out the back door, leaving behind shoes, socks, and shirt as he went. He flew into the water, not realizing that as he swam toward the middle of the lake, an alligator was swimming toward the shore.

His father, working in the yard, saw the two as they got closer and closer together. In utter fear, he ran toward the water, yelling to his son as loudly as he could. Hearing his voice, the little boy became alarmed and made a U-turn to swim to his father. It was too late. Just as he reached his father, the alligator reached him.

From the dock, the father grabbed his little boy by the arms just as the alligator snatched his legs. That began an incredible tug-of-war between the two. The alligator was much stronger than the father, but the father was much too passionate to let go. A farmer happened to drive by, heard his screams, raced from his truck, took aim and shot the alligator.

Remarkably, after weeks and weeks in the hospital, the little boy survived. His legs were extremely scarred by the vicious attack of the animal. And, on his arms, were deep scratches where his father's fingernails dug into his flesh in his effort to hang on to the son he loved.

The newspaper reporter who interviewed the boy after the trauma, asked if he would show him his scars. The boy lifted his pant legs. And then, with obvious pride, he said to the reporter, "But loo k at my arms. I have great scars on my arms, too. I have them because my Dad wouldn't let go."

You and I can identify with that little boy. We have scars, too. No not from an alligator, but the scars of a painful past. Some of those scars are unsightly and have caused us deep regret. But, some wounds, my friend, are because God has refused to let go. In the midst of your struggle, He's been there holding on to you.

The Scripture teaches that God loves you. You are a child of God. He wants to protect you and provide for you in every way. Unfortunately, sometimes we foolishly wade into dangerous situations, not knowing what lies ahead. The swimming hole of life is filled with peril - and we forget that the enemy is waiting to attack. That's when the tug-of-war begins - and if you have the scars of His love on your arms, be very, very grateful. He did not and will not ever let you go. ~Author Unknown

Thoughts

A buddy of mine related this story to me a few weeks ago:

He was driving down the highway when he saw three coyotes crossing the road ahead of him. The first two made it across the highway unscathed; the third was hit and killed by a car.

He said that, as he watched, the first two coyotes that had made it across the road turned in their tracks and headed back to their downed comrade. At this point, I made a big "Aaaaah!", thinking about the two coyotes coming to see how their buddy was. (This is probably the result of too many years watching cartoons and not enough Wild Kingdom.)

However, when they reached the third coyote, they proceeded to drag him from the road-way and devour him.

Action Point

How do we act when others are knocked down in life and struggling? Whether it is a divorce, addiction, poor life choices or a myriad of other problems, do we encourage, uplift, pray and support? Or, do we gossip, speculate and judge? In the fire service, we call the latter, "eating our own" - taking the opportunity to devour another while they are down and struggling. It is no different than what those coyotes did to their own.

Christ makes it clear, "Stop judging." Whether it is our best friend, worst enemy, even a television celebrity or newsmaker, "Stop judging!" Make it a point to pray for someone today whom you know is struggling in life. Better yet, pray for two people - a friend or co-worker and a newsmaker you have never met.


