I still struggle with it, but in hindsight now I cannot imagine life without these kids.

At times the Lord allows kinks in our plans to remind us that we aren't in control. It's easy to look at people and accuse them of messing with our agendas. However, perhaps God is allowing difficulty to get our attention of His master hand at work. We may feel overwhelmed at our circumstances. We may doubt that God is really working on our behalf when life feels unpredictable. Yet that's when God is most at work in our lives. He's building a relationship of trust with us. He wants us to say, "I trust You Lord in spite of everything that is going on around me". When we trust in God with all our hearts even in difficulty, we begin to understand more of the right directions to take in this life.

I know there are many in this Congregation struggling with this very issue right now. Plans that you had made, dreams you had, the future you had envisioned may not be what you thought it was going to be and life looks hopeless. And though each situation may be different, the outcome is the same. In order to move on from the dark places you have to have faith in the plans that God has for you! *2 Cor. 5:7 For we live by faith, not by sight.*

## News From Rowland And Jane Van Es

Mary\* was so badly beaten by her husband that she ended up in the intensive care unit of the hospital. Her case was so severe that the courts determined that Mary and her children, eight year old Geoff, six year old Margaret, and baby Nelson, needed to be placed in protective custody. They were referred to the Philadelphia Women's Crisis Centre in Nakuru, Kenya.

This is one of only a handful of such centers in all of Kenya. With 45% of women between the ages of 15 and 49 in Kenya having experienced either physical or sexual violence there is a great unmet need in caring for and protecting abused women and girls. The Philadelphia Women's Crisis Centre can only accommodate 12 women at a time. Because the women are housed in a one room dormitory, Mary and her baby were placed there. Mary's older children were placed in the boys and girls dormitories of the children's home also run by the Philadelphia Centre. Some of the children there, like Geoff and Margaret, were abused or neglected and needed to be removed from their homes, others are orphans. In addition to providing shelter and physical care for those who have experienced abuse, the center also has counselors and social workers to help them overcome trauma and prepare to return to their communities.

The women are trained in a variety of income generating activities (IGAs) and there is a school for the children. Both the school and the IGA training are open to needy women and children from the nearby slums of Nakuru. Last month about fifty students and staff from St. Paul's University's counseling and social work programs had a chance to visit Philadelphia Center. It was a long day (the bus left campus at 6 a.m. and returned at midnight), but it was worth it. The students were so excited to see how their chosen careers can really make a difference. The need for counselors and social workers in Kenya is overwhelming.

Terrorism, violence, poverty, and illnesses like HIV/AIDS are all huge issues in Kenya. It is difficult enough to deal with the physical aspects of these social ills, let alone the emotional and psychological issues. The number of trained counselors and social workers in Kenya is very limited. St. Paul's University felt it was important to provide training in these areas from a Christian perspective.

Over the last five years Jane and her colleagues in the faculty of social sciences have worked hard to develop these new programs. As the semester comes to a close it is rewarding to see some of our first students graduating with the skills they need to serve their neighbors as counsellors and social workers. from Rowland and Jane Van Es in Kenya April 2016 St. Paul student with children at Philadelphia Center Jane and students at Philadelphia Center

Old patterns of patriarchy make it difficult for couples to have deep meaningful relationships. Parents and children also struggle to relate to one another as Kenyan society rapidly changes. It is Nancy's desire to provide hope to these families in distress by working as a marriage and family counselor. Through your support and partnership with us as RCA mission coworkers, you are helping Nancy and other students like her at St. Paul's University to fulfill their calling in meaningful ways. ### Bible Study Verses: Daniel 10:12-13

Then he continued, "Do not be afraid, Daniel. Since the first day that you set your mind to gain understanding and to humble yourself before your God, your words were heard, and I have come in response to them. But the prince of the Persian kingdom resisted me twenty-one days. Then Michael, one of the chief princes, came to help me, because I was detained there with the king of Persia. (NIV)

### Thoughts

When I first gave my life to Christ, I had many questions. I read the Bible and prayed earnestly to God for revelation; and He was there, answering with speed and clarity.

However, I went through a time where I did not know if God was hearing me at all. Often I would ask, "Are you there, God?" I remember growing anxious, even impatient.

Daniel had a great concern. His people had become complacent and content in their Babylonian captivity and subsequent lifestyle. But, Daniel didn't lose patience. He "set his mind" (focused intently), humbled himself, fasted and prayed for them for three weeks! This scripture reveals an amazing insight into the heavenly realm of spiritual warfare. Although delayed, the angel assured him his prayer was heard while a touch restored Daniel's strength (see verse 18).

At the beginning of this deer season, I saw a beautiful ten-point well before shooting time. I watched him ease away in the bright full-moon twilight. For several weeks and countless hours, I hunted that buck. I grew impatient and started to question my spot, my abilities, my gun, etc. The questioning made me realize that I was placing too much of my time, thoughts, and energy on that one animal. I took some time off, refocused, relaxed and waited - patiently. Shortly thereafter, God rewarded me with a nice eight-point.

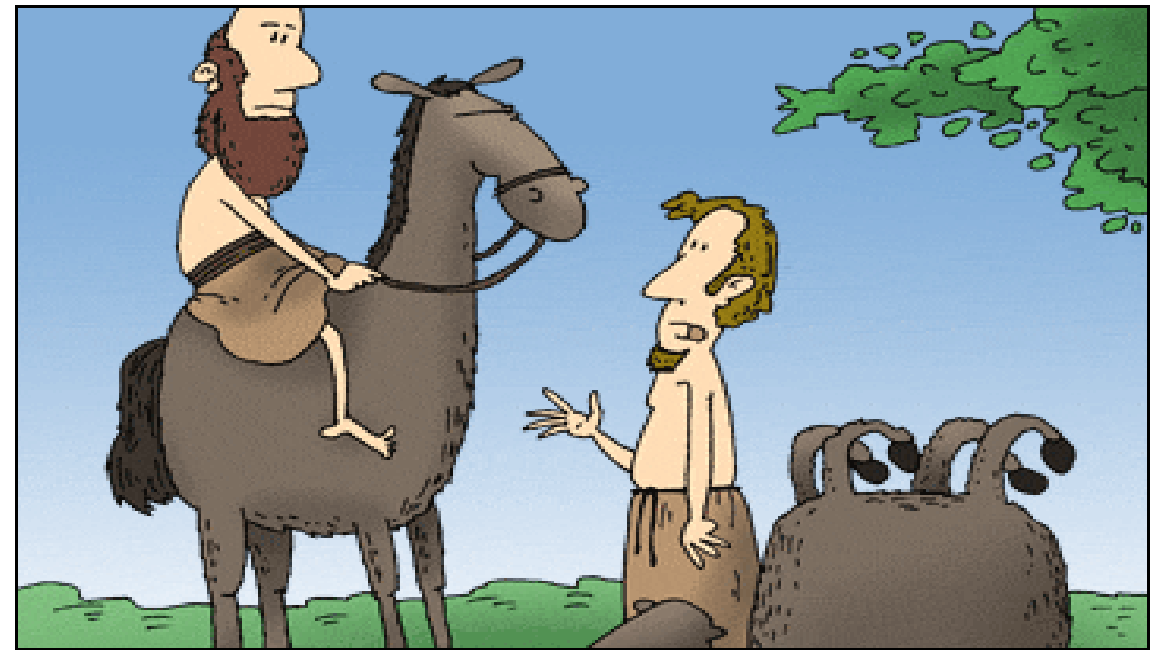
