

## B-Dawg's Buzz by Brenda Post, Secretary

*"Train up a child in the way he should go: and when he is old, he will not depart from it."* Proverbs 22:6.

As you know from last month's article, I am helping raise kids again. This has been an incredible learning experience for me. I have already raised a child, Ethan, who is now in college. I am not finished with Ethan yet. I have discovered that as a parent, you never stop trying to help define the path your child is on. I no longer get to "make decisions" for Ethan as he is an adult, but he still values and looks for my advice as he now figures out what he is doing. I am so honored that he still respects and wants my input on these life decisions, but I also tell him, I will love him no matter what he decides to do.

It's different with the kids that Mark and I are now raising. We "got" them when they were already partly raised; and at ages 9 and 11, it is more difficult than starting out as an infant. The first few weeks we concentrated on getting them settled and starting school in a new town again. We didn't correct behaviors that we noticed because as adults we knew how hard this transition was on the children. But as time has gone on, we started to develop a "plan of action" on how we needed to proceed with the kids. Step number 1? Make sure you and your partner are on the same page so you can work together as a team! Mark and I have had several talks on what we should be doing or how to proceed with different challenges that get thrown into the mix..

Don't get me wrong, these kids are not "bad" kids. They are very loving and smart., wonderful children. I love them so much in such a short time already. Our relationships continue to grow with them and as they do, Mark and I see where certain behaviors need to be changed, or redirected. However, just last week, Mark pointed out to me that he has noticed a shift. I did and do too. When Omar first came, he could be very stubborn and it was hard to get him to change his focus and get on board with everyone else. He would fold his arms across his chest, his bottom lip would snarl, he would sit down and refuse to do what we wanted from him. This behavior has almost completely gone away! He listens better, does the chores without much complaint when asked of him, and most importantly, gets praised from us all the time. (I am a firm believer in always, always praising children. ) To be honest though, I feel like I am on a mission now. I know that my time in these kids life could be limited if/ when they are allowed to go back to their mom. I feel like there is so much more to do, and so much to get done yet.

As young kids, you feel like you have all the time in the world, more so than when you get older in life. No obligations, no schedules, etc, you get the idea. But in fact, it's not true; everyone has 168 hours in each week and 52 weeks in each year, the exact same amount of time as everyone else. The real question is how you use it. As we grow older it seems that time goes faster and faster; but in reality we are simply coming to realize more and more how precious time is. Our time on this earth is limited and goes quickly; and we should always be ready for our deaths, or Christ's return, and plan our priorities accordingly.

God gives each of us a certain amount of time. As the Psalmist tells us, *'All the days ordained for me were written in your book before one of them came to be'*. Have you really embraced the fact that God had your whole life worked out even before the world began? But even more than that, he has prepared ahead of time the things that he wants us to do: *'For we are God's workmanship, created in Christ Jesus to do good works, which God prepared in advance for us to do.'* Do you wake up in the morning and ask the Lord: 'What is it that you have prepared in advance for me to do today?'

I am certain that Jesus felt his limited time on Earth "training up His children" (us) and to equip His disciples. Have you ever stopped to ask yourself what it is you are trying to accomplish as a parent? What exactly is your objective? The supreme objective you should have for your children is the same objective the Apostle Paul had for his spiritual children – that they be changed into the image of Christ. Your objective as a parent has already been laid out for you in the Bible. You don't have to wonder what your child should become. You know what your child is supposed to look like when you're finished training him. He is to look like Christ.

The kids test my patience, my leadership, reveal further selfishness and sins in me. And in so, the blessings grow. And in much smaller ways, God has used coworkers, staffers, colleagues, family members, even those who've hurt me. They are not here by accidents, but are instruments for my good. Why does this matter? It matters because it affects my perspective. We should see other people in our lives not as irritants, but as divine tools sent by God for our own good. So that bad boss...perhaps God put him in your world to chip off parts of your old self that needed chipping off. That troublesome child that tests your patience? Perhaps its God wanting to work on your heart and soul to bear the fruits of the Spirit. Every single relationship for a Christian is an opportunity for growth. So today, I embrace the little things, the small changes, the baby steps. We cannot snap our fingers and have immediate changes. Our life is a constant, shifting, changing path that we navigate through with God's help.

## Letter from JJ and Tim Ten Kley

Dear Friends,

Greetings from Palermo, Italy! Advent has always been one of my favorite times of the year, but this year it has taken on a more significant meaning, particularly as I focus on the contrast of light and dark in our world.

My friends, there is, indeed, a lot of darkness in our world today. We have all experienced it and witnessed it in various ways—and to various degrees—throughout 2015. For those of you who have experienced darkness significantly in the past year (whether it be through death of loved ones or other significant losses, mental or physical health struggles, spiritual disconnection or alienation, difficulties meeting basic needs, abuse, neglect, violence, etc., etc.) I am deeply sorry. This Advent Season I am entering into a time of prayer for those experiencing darkness; if any of you reading this have specific prayer requests you would like to share, please know you are welcome to send me a private message through Facebook at [www.facebook.com/tenclay](http://www.facebook.com/tenclay) and I will pray for you.

We have seen plenty of darkness here in Italy as well. It has been another year filled with trial and tribulations for migrants and refugees trying to make it across the Mediterranean Sea from Africa or the Middle East to Italy or other parts of Europe. The United Nations Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR) reports that as of November 26, 2015 over 144,000 migrants and refugees have arrived in Italy after crossing the Mediterranean Sea, and 3,510 people are dead or missing (The UNHCR has declared the route across the Mediterranean Sea from Africa to Italy to be the deadliest migration route in the world). The majority of refugees arriving in Italy are from Eritrea, Nigeria, Somalia, Sudan and Syria. These are people—men, women and children—who have suffered intense darkness before they even board a boat.

Darkness does not end for those fortunate enough to survive the journey. My work with Pellegrino della Terra in Palermo focuses on providing services to migrant and refugee women (mostly Nigerian) who are victims of sexual exploitation and human trafficking in Italy. I cannot begin to put words to the darkness of sexual exploitation and human trafficking; it is a world that leaves deep physical, psychological and spiritual scars and can cast a shadow over the families of the victims for generations to come.

And yet, as the words of John 1:1-5 (NRSV) tells us, “In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He was in the beginning with God. All things came into being through him, and without him not one thing came into being. What has come into being in him was life, and the life was the light of all people. The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it.” In fact, the official symbol of our mission partners, The Waldensian Church in Italy, is a candle with the words “Lux Lucet in Tenebris” (Light shines in the darkness) written at the top.

New Business:

MMSC to allow Pastor Luke approval for up to \$7,000 in a Furnishing allowance for 2015. None of these monies are in additional salary, they are legal tax breaks for ordained ministers.

- 1. How have our commitments to discipleship, leadership, and mission contributed to our congregational health and vitality? By filling in for our Youth Leader. Move toward higher % of benevolent spending in relation to our total budget. More of our members went on mission trips. Continued emphasis on men’s ministry. Encouraged more participation in services, small groups and youth ministry.

- 2. What other commitments and processes have helped us become more vital this year? Implemented more Outreach ideas with our community. Groups and events increased, see committees.

- 3. What 2 or 3 specific goals might we set this year to help us more intentionally live out the call to discipleship, leadership, and mission? More help for our Pastor and congregation. Educate the congregation as to what the RCA is all about.

- 4. At present time, what are 2 or 3 concerns of our church? Same sex relations. Firearms. Staffing. Future of our RCA membership. Elder/Deacon calls were discussed.

Treasure’s report was given by Derek Heronimus. Derek reported that all of our 2015 Benevolent obligations were met. Derek also reported on the status of the special funds that we administer.

Dean Van Marel shared the Deacon’s business.

Elder’s minutes were read for information.

MMSC to approve the minutes by title only.

MMSC to adjourn following pray by Ron Dykstra.

These are some of the most beautiful things I have ever experienced, and I have experienced them all here in Palermo. There is light in Palermo due to the work of our Waldensian partners through Pellegrino della Terra and The Waldensian Diaconal Center La Noce(our two partner organizations here in Palermo). There is light in three Waldensian churches Tim is pastoring in Palermo, Trapani and Marsala, as each week Africans, Italians (and now Americans) come together to worship God as one body of believers, committed to living out the Gospel in these communities. There is light throughout Italy as the Waldensian Church continues to expand social justice programs, especially to provide for the needs of migrants and refugees.

So, for now, I will spend some time during the Advent season reflecting on the darkness of this world, because I know the Light of the World is coming...a light that no darkness can overcome.



## Sportsmen's Devotional

### Bible Study Verses

#### Matthew 4:18-19

And Jesus, walking by the Sea of Galilee, saw two brothers, Simon called Peter, and Andrew his brother, casting a net into the sea; for they were fishermen. Then He said to them, "Follow Me, and I will make you fishers of men." (NKJV)

#### Thoughts:

With the Silver Salmon running and the pristine afternoon conditions, my friends and I enjoyed treasured, prime Alaskan fishing. We were wading along the river while casting toward the opposite bank as the fish passed through.

The borrowed open faced reel gave one friend a struggle. Another friend and I approached to lend a helping hand. The struggling Samoan explained, "I have never used a rod and reel before."

We were stunned as he had earlier stated he was an accomplished fisherman.

He went on to explain that he had always used a spear to wade fish in coastal lagoons on his island home and he was a good spear fisherman.

After a quick lesson in the operation of an open faced reel he was casting almost as good as the best of us out there! The years of spear fishing seemed to have given him the needed excellent hand-to-eye coordination. He caught fish in no time. (Marshall M)

#### Action Point:

Jesus told Peter and Andrew he would show them how to fish for men. We often have people in our lives that we want to lead to the Lord and are often frustrated that we can't reel them in. We've used all the right baits and techniques and still nothing much ever changes.

What we sometimes forget is that Jesus taught by letting his disciples see Him live a righteous and holy life. It may be that's how we should try fishing for men, by letting them see us living a holy life.

That's one way to teach a new skill, watch someone else practice what they are a teaching. Let your life be the teaching lesson to your friends.

#### Sportsmen's Tip of the Day:

A good way to teach people to fish is in the back yard. Take a washer and tie it to the end of your line and set up targets in the yard. Learning how to cast accurately and deal with obstacles that you might encounter at the lake or river will really improve their casting ability. It will be good practice for you also.
