Years ago, the mention of the name Marilynn De Boer kind of scared me. For those of you who know Marilynn, she has a reputation that may proceed her. She has her opinions on certain things and she is not afraid to tell you how she feels about a situation whether you have asked her her opinion or not. She is bold; and for me, was intimidating. She would call to the church office and tell you what she thought of something that had happened in church. I was afraid of her and those phone calls for a long time. I never knew what to say to her when she called in, and I never reacted in the correct manor. I had made a judgment about Marilynn, and that opinion that I had made about her lasted for years.

I don't want you to think that Marilynn made a habit of calling into church to voice her opinions on thing because that wasn't the case. And I wish I could pin point when my relationship with Marilynn changed, but change it has. Maybe I have grown up. More likely, is that I allowed God into this relationship. I started talking to her, I mean really talking to her, when she would come to Bible Study on Tuesday afternoons. Over time, when Marilynn called in, I no longer "feared" the phone call. We would discuss little things, unimportant things, but communication started between us.

Those infrequent phone calls turned into more frequent phone calls. Those little discussions turned into bigger, more personal discussions. We now talk with one another once a week for sure. The women who once intimidated me became my friend. When good-bye's are spoken, "I love you Marilynn," are my parting words to her. I love her opinions, her outspokenness, her boldness. I love the way I can laugh at her stories and the way she tells them to me. She has become a part of my week and my life.

First impressions are like scars—you can get them quickly, but it takes you quite a while to get rid of them (if you ever do). Many people base their whole opinion of someone on something as flimsy as a first impression. A quick glance at others—the way they dress, the way they talk, how they act and countless other small details—can form our decision about whether we want to get to know them or avoid them. That's a whole lot of power for a mere first impression. First impressions don't tell the circumstances behind what you're seeing. You don't know the hearts of the individuals—only God does. First impressions are only brief impressions that cover up long stories. They are often not accurate and can, in fact, be quite poisonous—to yourself and those you judge. We must go beyond first impressions.

First impressions are usually formed quickly. Within the first 30 seconds of meeting a person, we already have an inner reaction to that person. I am thankful that I didn't let my first impression of Marilynn be my last impression of Marilynn. I would have missed out on an opportunity to get to know and love her. But that also gets me thinking, "How many Marilynn De Boer's have we (you and I) missed out on in our lives?" What opportunities have we missed. There is a reason why throughout the Bible God cautions us and commands us to not judge others. (John 7:24 "Do not judge according to appearance, but judge with righteous judgment.", Matthew 7:1-2 "Do not judge so that you will not be judged. "For in the way you judge, you will be judged; and by your standard of measure, it will be measured to you. ", and Romans 2:1-3 Therefore you have no excuse, everyone of you who passes judgment, for in that which you judge another, you condemn yourself; for you who judge practice the same things. And we know that the judgment of God rightly falls upon those who practice such things. But do you suppose this, O man, when you pass judgment on those who practice such things and do the same yourself, that you will escape the judgment of God?")

In 1 John 3:23 it says, "And this is his command: to believe in the name of his Son, Jesus Christ, and to love one another as he commanded us." We are to love. It seems so simple.

Words from Pastor Luke

As I sit here this morning there are many things going through my mind about what I should write to you this month. What's running through my head are some of the steps we are taking forward, growing disciples, continuing to look for a youth pastor, and the purchasing of property. I see all these as signs of the Holy Spirit at work within this congregation. On the other hand, my thoughts have been on General Synod and the issues that will be discussed. With all that is happing I am reminded of one beautiful and awesome thing. God is in control. When we walk in a relationship with Christ one of the hardest things to do is let go and let God. We want to be in charge, we want to have control, we want to determine our outcome. Often when we try and take control we find ourselves struggling, hurting, and failing. We get disappointed, frustrated and depressed. Often when we seek control we hurt those around us causing damage to friendships, families and others. But, God shows us something different.

Personally, I daily need to remind myself that it is not my will that needs to be done but my Heavenly Fathers. There are times when I maybe want it my way, or I am the one who needs to make the decision. There are times when circumstances I can't control bother me because I want to do something with it. That's why I need to remind myself that I need to trust in God.

Often in my ministry I deal with people who are hurting, struggling and seeking direction. I don't have the answers but I know some who does. That someone is Jesus Christ. One of my favorite passage of scripture is from Proverbs 3:5-6. It says, "Trust in the Lord with all you heart and lean not on your own understanding. In all your ways acknowledge Him and he will make your paths straight." I keep hearing those words, "Trust in the Lord". "Trust in the Lord".

I am always reminded of the story of Moses being called to lead the people out of slavery in Egypt. When God had a conversation with him, Moses had all the excuses in the world as to why he was not qualified. God's response is the same message we all need to hear. That message was, "I don't care what you can or can't do, I simply need you to give me control. When Moses recognized that everything changed. Through Him we see the greatness of what God can do.

The same goes for this church. When I came here as your pastor one of the things I have constantly tried to remind myself is that this is God's church. It is my task as well as all of you to allow Him to take control of how we can most effectively do kingdom work and spread the gospel of Jesus Christ. If we are seeking God's direction and not our own we know in the end there will blessing.

Mary* was so badly beaten by her husband that she ended up in the intensive care unit of the hospital. Her case was so severe that the courts determined that Mary and her children, eight year old Geoff, six year old Margaret, and baby Nelson, needed to be placed in protective custody. They were referred to the Philadelphia Women's Crisis Centre in Nakuru, Kenya. This is one of only a handful of such centers in all of Kenya. With 45% of women between the ages of 15 and 49 in Kenya having experienced either physical or sexual violence there is a great unmet need in caring for and protecting abused women and girls.

The Philadelphia Women's Crisis Centre can only accommodate 12 women at a time. Because the women are housed in a one room dormitory, Mary and her baby were placed there. Mary's older children were placed in the boys and girls dormitories of the children's home also run by the Philadelphia Centre. Some of the children there, like Geoff and Margaret, were abused or neglected and needed to be removed from their homes, others are orphans.

In addition to providing shelter and physical care for those who have experienced abuse, the center also has counselors and social workers to help them overcome trauma and prepare to return to their communities.

The women are trained in a variety of income generating activities (IGAs) and there is a school for the children. Both the school and the IGA training are open to needy women and children from the nearby slums of Nakuru.

Last month about fifty students and staff from St. Paul's University's counseling and social work programs had a chance to visit Philadelphia Center. It was a long day (the bus left campus at 6 a.m. and returned at midnight), but it was worth it. The students were so excited to see how their chosen careers can really make a difference. The need for counselors and social workers in Kenya is overwhelming. Terrorism, violence, poverty, and illnesses like HIV/AIDS are all huge issues in Kenya. It is difficult enough to deal with the physical aspects of these social ills, let alone the emotional and psychological issues. The number of trained counselors and social workers in Kenya is very limited.

St. Paul's University felt it was important to provide training in these areas from a Christian perspective. Over the last five years Jane and her colleagues in the faculty of social sciences have worked hard to develop these new programs. As the semester comes to a close it is rewarding to see some of our first students graduating with the skills they need to serve their neighbors as counsellors and social workers.

Many of our students are older and have come back to school driven by their own experiences with such issues and a desire to help in a more meaningful way. For example, Nancy, who just completed a degree in counseling, has worked with women in her church for many years.

Bible Study Verses:

Matthew 9:28-29

And when He had come into the house, the blind men came to Him. And Jesus said to them, "Do you believe that I am able to do this?" They said to Him, "Yes, Lord." Then He touched their eyes, saying, "According to your faith let it be to you." (NKJV)

Thoughts:

When I am flying my airplane to Europe, I look down from 33,000 feet and see a cold North Atlantic Ocean below me. Here I am, sitting in the cockpit of an airplane that weighs 500,000 plus pounds, and I wonder why it stays in the air.

I know and understand Bernoulli's Principle and Newton's Laws that tell me how it stays aloft; but that does not give me faith that it will fly. I also know that, if the three engines quit, we just became test pilots flying what will soon become a submarine. Again, I understand all the principles that make it fly; but when I look out at the wing, I cannot actually see them at work.

It takes a lot of faith to know that something that I cannot see will keep this monster aloft. I heard a statement, or read it somewhere, and always remembered it: "Faith is believing what you cannot see, and God's reward for that kind of faith is seeing what you believe." (Chris O)

Action Point:


