Ethan is currently in his second year at Dakota State University in Madison, SD. This is actually his 4th year in college, because as a homeschooled student, he was able to go to college as a high school student and graduated with a high school diploma and a two year college degree in Computer Science at age 18. He went to Madison to turn his 2 year degree into a 4 year degree. Technically, he could have graduated this spring. This past week, he decided to stay in school longer. (This sounds like a bragging moment here, and I don't want you to think this is the reason for this article...because that is not my intention!!) Ethan signed on to get his Masters in Computer Science! He will now graduate in the spring of 2018, with many degrees and much education. I am very happy with him for making this decision and this commitment. He had to do some soul searching to come to this point. "Is it worth going to school longer?" "Will I now be too qualified for a position somewhere?" He didn't know which route to go, and I was going to support him no matter what he decided to do. When he called last Wednesday after meeting with his advisor and told me the news, my heart just about burst with pride.

I remember how hard it was letting Ethan "go" when he went to Madison 2 years ago. I cried many days and nights initially. My whole life had revolved around this child, and I couldn't imagine life without him beside me 24/7. To all of the parents who will be living through an adjustment like this soon, I am telling you first hand; you WILL survive and it WILL get better! I will be honest though, that first 1/2 the year was extremely hard on not just me, but Ethan was well. In the spring semester last year, I finally saw Ethan becoming his own person. I could see little changes in him, and I knew then that he was going to be okay. He met people who became friends, good friends. When he moved back to college this past fall, his friends were there immediately and he quickly adjusted to being at school again after summer break.

As parents, all that you want for your child is to grow up and be all that they can be. We want our children to have a better life than we did. We want them to be successful, to not have to struggle like we did. We pray for them to grow up and be responsible loving, compassionate human beings. And we want this because we know how life can be. We know that life can be hard, full of worry, and have missteps along the way. We pray that our children don't have to live through these things. We want to protect them and shield them from the hardships.

Letting go of adult children is a struggle for many parents,. When we consider that for nearly twenty years of our lives we invested time in raising, nurturing, and caring for a child, so it's easy to see why letting go of that role is a difficult task. For most parents, child-rearing consumes our time, energy, love, and concern for two decades. We invest our hearts, minds and spirits into their physical, emotional, social and spiritual well-being, and it can be very difficult when that part of our lives comes to an end.

Biblically, we know that God takes the role of the parent very seriously. Admonitions to good parenting are abound in Scripture. Parents are to raise children in the "training and instruction of the Lord," not frustrating or exasperating them (Ephesians 6:4). We are to "train a child in the way he should go" (Proverbs 22:6), giving him good gifts (Matthew 7:11), loving and disciplining him for his sake (Proverbs 13:24), and providing for his needs (1 Timothy 5:8). Ironically, it's often the parents who take their parenting roles most seriously and who do a great job at it who struggle most to let go.

So what is the parents' role as children become adults? Certainly we never 'let go' of them in the sense of abandoning them. We are still their parents and always will be. But while we no longer nurture and guard them physically, we are still concerned for their welfare. For the Christian family, they are no longer just our children; they are now our brothers and sisters in Christ, and we relate to them as we do our other friends in the Lord. Most importantly, we pray for them. We encourage them in their walk with God, offering advice when it is asked for. We offer help if it is needed and accept their decision to receive it or reject it. Finally, we respect their privacy just as we would any other adult's. When parents finally do let go of adult children, they often find a stronger, deeper, and more fulfilling relationship than they ever could have imagined! This has been very true for Ethan and myself. I am proud, so proud, of the man he is becoming. Letting go and watching him become this person, this man, this adult, assures me that he will be fine even with struggles that he will certainly face later down the road.

Joshua 1:9, "This is my command-be strong and courageous! Do not be afraid or discouraged. For the LORD your God is with you wherever you go." (NLT) and Isaiah 40:11, "He tends his flock like a shepherd: He gathers the lambs in his arms and carries them close to his heart; he gently leads those that have young." (NIV)

The whole goal of parenting is to eventually release your children. From the moment they are born, you are preparing them to go into the world. The point is this: It is God's plan for children to leave and, as parents, we must teach them while we have them, but then let them go to serve God's purposes. Jesus said, "In the same way you gave me a mission in the world, I give them a mission in the world" (John 17:18 MSG).

It's all about love!!! A couple of weeks ago we posed the question "What matters most?" It was during that message we found the answer in the scriptures. That answer was love. We are to "love the Lord our God with all our heart, soul, mind and strength and to love our neighbor as ourselves." The greatest impact we can make on the lives of the people around us in how we are willing to love them. What will make us attractive, as a church is how we are willing to love those within the church and outside our doors. This was what the life of Christ was all about! It was love!

In this month of Lent we are reminded of the great Love story that God gave to us. Because he wanted to be in a relationship with us, he was willing to sacrifice His Son for us. Sometime in this next year they would like to meet with you at your home. Not because they are to be critical and judge what you are doing right or wrong but to simple love on you.

During their visit they might ask you how we as a church can help you grow in your faith journey, as deacons, they will seek out any financial needs you might have and as elders what you might need spiritually. More than anything they have chosen to do this because you are part of First Reformed Church and we love you and care for you. They will give you a phone call to set up a time and we are not forcing anyone to do this. It is simply a way in which we can hear from you and pray for you. When our elders and deacons were installed one of the promises they made was to be there for you, care for you and love you. I personally appreciate this commitment to your welling-being as a church member.

News from Brian and Donna

Dear Friends and Supporters,

Do you have a Bible app on your smartphone, tablet or ipad? If so, there is a good chance the icon is like this image with the words: Holy Bible. You and nearly 200 million people around the world have installed it. With this program we read the Bible in a language that speaks to our heart. Another number that I cannot begin to understand is 150 billion. According to YouVersion statistics, 150 billion minutes have been spent reading Bibles or Bible plans in this application. I cannot fathom the quantity but I pray that it illustrates how the church worldwide hungers to spend time in God's Word.

Most of us depend on technology and having a Bible app on a phone and tablet puts God's Word right there, next to all the other icons that call for our attention. Not only do little red numbers have great power in getting our attention but sound alerts notify us instantly of something we may want to check out. How much more important to start our days reading God's Word, spending time with a text message from our Creator. I encourage you to put those apps in a prominent place on your device and to set up "daily verse" notifications.

In recent months and these past years much of my time has been devoted to helping others get Bibles into this digital Bible library. There are now over 1,000 different Bibles in nearly 800 unique languages. Hundreds, thousands, millions and billions - so many numbers, so what?

Here is one story... two reasons. During my most recent visit to Africa I helped prepare the Sango translation for printing and also for this electronic library. Spoken in an entire county, millions can now read this Bible in their language. The problem is that many cannot afford to buy a print copy. With this Bible app it is available to all for free. The director of the Bible Society was elated when he learned he could have their Bible on his phone. Before I left the country he was reading Sango on his phone and publicizing its availability on their Facebook page.

Another problem is that this country has suffered through wars in recent years. I am sure they yearn for peace in their streets and even more so need peace in their hearts. Worldwide and throughout history we see that in turbulent times people flee violence, becoming refugees. Cutoff from their own people, refugees are isolated and unable to connect. However, with this type of technology it does not matter if they are refugees in Africa, Europe or the US, those who speak Sango now have access to God's Word in the language they love, in the language that embraces them. God embraces them wherever they are. Praise God for using technology to give comfort and hope to refugees.

At the bottom of this letter are some links. Through them you can learn more about the impact of technology as well as opportunities for reaching the world.

Piano Update:

Several people have asked, "Why do we have a piano fund?" Over the past year, you may have seen in our bulletin donations being made to the piano fund as part of our weekly offerings. This is because, unfortunately, we have several cracks in the sound board of our grand piano. According to our piano technician (who tunes our piano) this could have been caused by a variety of issues, i.e., not keeping the humidity up in the piano during the winter, faulty workmanship, or other reasons. He believes that the sound board may have not have been properly cured before being put together. Whatever the reason(s), the board has several cracks which requires us to tune it bi-monthly versus twice a year. The comparison here would be like driving your car with one cylinder not working, and the other cylinders are breaking down as well. The car drives and gets you somewhere, but not very well and not for very long. This is the reason the piano fund has been established. The present piano is a decent piano, but on the low end of prices for a grand piano. Pianos of this size can range from \$15,000-\$75,000. We will be looking at a "Chevy" model, not a "Cadillac" when we do replace the present piano. It should be around the \$25,000 range. I hope this helps explain the piano fund. 
