Can you believe it's almost November? Seriously, this doesn't seem possible. Maybe it's because we had a later fall...wet..farmers couldn't get into the fields...the leaves are still on the trees...etc, but I cannot believe we are mere weeks away from celebrating Thanksgiving! I know that the weather can change quickly in good ole' Northwest Iowa, so today I am thankful that we have had the most wonderful fall weather.

Pastor Luke is gone as I write this letter. He is in Florida celebrating the arrival of his grandson, Silas Luke. I can only imagine how happy, excited and in love he must be!

I am coming off of what has been the most stressful two days! It seems like whenever the big guy leaves me, all kinds of stuff comes crashing down. Now why is that? I can't answer for it myself. Yesterday was close to my breaking point. I had one person after another wanting me to fix problems, get things done for them, try and get things done for both Pastor Luke and for Remnant groups, line up help for events, and trying to even start this newsletter. Please don't read this as me hating this job, because nothing could be further from the truth, but yes, sometimes; well sometimes, it can be overwhelming. And then 3:30 hits, and my phone rings in the office....

"Jim" was on the other line. He was looking for someone else, another pastor, and had dialed this office by mistake. Jim started talking with me and he tells me he is struggling right now. Really struggling. Mentally he is all done, he can't take anymore, he has reached his end. Jim and I talked for over 42 minutes. We told stories, we compared our lives, we prayed over the phone. I have had him on my mind ever since. I pray Jim will find the help he needs and that he doesn't give up. I myself struggle with the demons of depression and I know how it feels to want to give up.

But this isn't about myself or Jim really. It's about compassion, a listening ear, loving your neighbor, being available. I shouldn't be surprised when God does these things, and yet, it seems like I am. I didn't notice it at the time, but when looking back on it, I can see God's hand in it. I thought my day was so bad, and here God places Jim on the phone. All of the sudden, my problems are not so big.

This Thanksgiving, when you remember and reflect on this past year and all of the things that you are thankful for, remember all of those who think they have nothing to be thankful for. Lift them up, pray for your neighbors, near and far, pray that we become more compassionate and LOVING people. (Especially after what we have gone through with this election season!!) Pray for all of the "Jim's" out there. Let your light shine!

2 Corinthians 9:11-12 (NIV) 11 "You will be enriched in every way so that you can be generous on every occasion, and through us your generosity will result in thanksgiving to God. 12 This service that you perform is not only supplying the needs of the Lord's people but is also overflowing in many expressions of thanks to God."

The original thanksgiving celebration was held by the Pilgrim settlers in Massachusetts during their second winter in America in December, 1621. The first winter had killed 44 of the original 102 colonists. At one point their daily food ration was down to five kernels of corn apiece, but then an unexpected trading vessel arrived, swapping them beaver pelts for corn, providing for their severe need. The next summer's crop brought hope, and Governor William Bradford decreed that December 13, 1621, be set aside as a day of feasting and prayer to show the gratitude of the colonists that they were still alive.

These Pilgrims, seeking religious freedom and opportunity in America, gave thanks to God for His provision for them in helping them find 20 acres of cleared land, for the fact that there were no hostile Indians in that area, for their newfound religious freedom, and for God's provision of an interpreter to the Indians in Squanto. Along with the feasting and games involving the colonists and more than 80 friendly Indians (who added to the feast by bringing wild turkeys and venison), prayers, sermons, and songs of praise were important in the celebration. Three days were spent in feasting and prayer.

From that time forward, Thanksgiving has been celebrated as a day to give thanks to God for His gracious and sufficient provision. President Abraham Lincoln officially set aside the last Thursday of November, in 1863, "as a day of thanksgiving and praise to our beneficent Father." In 1941, Congress ruled that after 1941, the fourth Thursday of November be observed as Thanksgiving Day and be a legal holiday.

Scripturally, we find things related to the issue of thanksgiving nearly from cover to cover. Individuals offered up sacrifices out of gratitude in the book of Genesis. The Israelites sang a song of thanksgiving as they were delivered from Pharaoh's army after the crossing of the Red Sea (Exodus 15). Later, the Mosaic Law set aside three times each year when the Israelites were to gather together. All three of these times [Unleavened Bread (also called the Feast of the Passover) (Exodus 12:15-20), Harvest or Pentecost (Leviticus 23:15-21), and the Feast of Ingathering or Tabernacles (Leviticus 23:33-36)] involved remembering God's provision and grace. Harvest and Tabernacles took place specifically in relation to God's provision in the harvest of various fruit trees and crops. The book of Psalms is packed full of songs of thanksgiving, both for God's grace to the Israelite people as a whole through His mighty deeds, as well as for His individual graces to each of us.

In the New Testament, there are repeated admonitions to give thanks to God. Thanksgiving is to always be a part of our prayers. Some of the most remembered passages on the giving of thanks are the following:

- "Rejoice always, pray without ceasing, in everything give thanks; for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you" (1 Thessalonians 5:16-18).
- "Be anxious for nothing, but in everything by prayer and supplication, with thanksgiving, let your requests be made known to God" (Philippians 4:6).
- "Therefore I exhort first of all that supplications, prayers, intercessions, and giving of thanks be made for all men" (1 Timothy 2:1).

We, like the Pilgrims, have a choice. In life there will always be those things that we can complain about (the Pilgrims had lost many loved ones), but there will also be much to be thankful for. As our society becomes increasingly secular, the actual "giving of thanks to God" during our annual Thanksgiving holiday is being overlooked, leaving only the feasting. May God grant that He may find us grateful every day for all of His gifts, spiritual and material. God is good, and every good gift comes from Him (James 1:17). For those who know Christ, God also works everything together for good, even events we would not necessarily consider good (Romans 8:28-30). May He find us to be His grateful children.

News From Rowland and Jane Van Es in Kenya, August 2016

Dear Friends,

What was the most difficult job that you ever had? Rowland and I both have “fond” memories of summer jobs while we were in college. Our daughters are always hearing about Rowland’s Heinz pickle factory days and Jane’s walking beans and detasseling corn. The message we were sending to our daughters was that working hard, both in and out of the classroom, is an expected part of getting a college education.

Wellington, one of our students at St. Paul’s University who is studying to become a pastor, is a good example of this same work ethic. The journey to finish high school was not an easy one for him. Before he finished elementary school, his father “inherited” another wife. Many ethnic groups in Kenya practice something similar to the Levirate marriage of the Old Testament where it is expected that a man will marry the widow of his brother and care for his children. Unfortunately for Wellington, his father ended up leaving his mother for this other woman rather than caring for both families.

Wellington’s mother did her best to care for her five children and provide them with an education but it was difficult to earn very much from the small plot of land where she grew corn and vegetables—probably only about \$50 a month. Despite this, Wellington managed to take his 8th grade exam and do well enough to qualify to go to a good high school. (The process of going into high school in Kenya is quite selective—more like we experience with going to college or university). Because this high school was a boarding school far away, his mother could not afford to send him there. Eventually they managed to find another school closer to home, however, and he graduated with good grades.

During those years Wellington became a believer and was eventually baptized and confirmed in his local Anglican church. As he became more involved in the youth group and other church activities there his gifts were recognized and he became a lay reader and a youth mission coordinator. Through all these experiences Wellington began to sense a call from God to go into full time ministry.

Unfortunately, the local church was not able to support his studies since most of the members were subsistence farmers like his mother. Wellington decided that he needed to find a job and save some money before he applied to St. Paul’s. The only job he could find was in a rock quarry where most of the work was done by hand. Gravel was produced by using a hammer to chip away at large stone boulders.

Wellington spent three years working in the quarry before he felt he had enough to pay for at least the first semester of his University studies. He also had a fundraiser through his church to get some additional money—but this brought in very little. In our 12 years of teaching at St. Paul's University we have meet many students, like Wellington, who have worked hard and struggled to further their education. Despite this hard work and the sacrifice of their families and communities, many students still cannot pay for college. As part of the RCA's ongoing partnership with St. Paul's University (SPU), a scholarship fund for these needy students has already been established and Wellington has been selected as one of the recipients.

Unfortunately, this RCA-SPU scholarship fund is an "if raised" project and currently all that was previously raised for student scholarships has been depleted. We would like you to consider contributing to this fund in order to assist other students like Wellington in their efforts to further their education to live out their calling "in service to God and humanity" (St. Paul's motto). Currently tuition at St. Paul's University is \$765 a semester. Room and board costs another \$400 a term. While these costs may seem very reasonable from a North American perspective, it is a relatively huge amount for our Kenyan students and their families—many of whom earn only about \$2 a day. For Your Information:

For a few years now, the subject of W.O.W (Women of Worship) and their missionary support has been discussed whenever the proposed budget has been set. How much longer should the checking account of a group that no longer meets be kept open? What would happen to the missionary support that W.O.W. funds?

As you may have seen in the Proposed budget for 2016, the W.O.W. ½ missionary support has been taken over by First Reformed Churches Benevolent Fund. FRC wanted to take on more Benevolent issues as part of our desire to increase Benevolences and decrease General Fund spending. It has been decided to close the Women of Worship checking account (as it exists for a non-existent group). We will still host a Soup and Pie Supper in the fall with work groups in charge. All money raised in this soup and pie supper will now go to our local mission trips through FRC.

Due to this change, as the cards run out, we will no longer be selling them. We thank you for your many years of supporting W.O.W.

Sportsmen's Devotional

Bible Study Verse: John 3:36 "Whoever believes in the Son has eternal life, but whoever rejects the Son will not see life, for God's wrath remains on them." (NIV)

Thoughts: There was great anticipation about the upcoming fishing adventure. Everything was carefully planned and they were on the way. On arriving at the border, each person presented his own passport. One passport was presented, but the officials quickly rejected his request to enter their country. He had charges against him on the record from the past. Though these had been dropped many years earlier, his fishing trip ended there with frustration, and a reminder that past actions may incur present consequences. (Jack M)

Action Point: First, what we do now will affect us later and usually at an important time. Take care of things now, don't let unsettled debts, obligations and issues stand. Clear the records. Second, eternal life comes to mind. Many never plan for eternity. The opinion is that they are qualified for eternal life and for Heaven as they are. What would you say if God said to you, "Why should I let you into my Heaven?" What response would you give? What qualifies you for Heaven and eternal life? Some would say "My church takes care of that. I'm OK because I belong to a church." Others would list good works they have done. Another might say, "My parents were believers, and that makes me a believer." A woman may say, "A good God will never send anyone to Hell."

The fact is that our sin counts against us unless it has been forgiven and wiped clean by the work of Jesus Christ on the Cross. He died, was buried, and rose again that we might be forgiven and live forever with God. Eternal life can begin here and continue into the hereafter!!!The only answer that gets one into Heaven is, "I believe in the Son of God, Jesus Christ, and He has forgiven me of all my sin. I am qualified for Heaven because God has declared me without sin based on Jesus' death on the Cross." The Bible says in many places, "Believe on the Lord Jesus Christ and you will be saved."
