My little Omar is a thinker. I love that about him. He always says things like, "when I get older I'm going to invent..." or has a story to tell that he has thought through. This past week I had him for 4 days at my house in Sibley, and trust me, he had lots to tell me during this time. This past Friday was no different. As I was walking out to the garage, Omar followed me out and out of the blue stated, "Brenda, I don't think the world could ever flood," and he went on to explain why he didn't think that this was possible. Without missing a beat, I said to him, "Omar, did you know that the world already flooded once?" He looked at me and I continued, "have you ever heard of a guy named, Noah?"

I proceeded to tell him of God and Noah. I told him how God told Noah to build the Arc and how Noah obeyed. I told him how the other people around Noah made fun of him. I explained how God instructed Noah to gather all the animals, two-by-two and the reasons why God wanted it that way. I told him of the rains that came and how the earth was flooded for 40 days. Omar asked me great questions ("Why did God pick Noah and his family? If Noah and his family were the only people left, are we all related? Why did God do that? and finally, Brenda, if there is a God...")

I forgot to mention anything about the rainbow and the promise from God that He would never destroy the earth by a flood again. Ugh. I will tell him that the next time I get to see a rainbow with him. What struck me most though, was how unprepared I am to share my faith with someone else.

I can make many excuses as to why this could be true. I am scared to say something that might not be true. I doubt what I know. I find it difficult to articulate why I believe as I do. I also believe that I might not be as good as someone else. I can think of several people who "do this better than me". All of these reasons are true. But the truest reason of all? I am plain scared. I know that I am not alone.

Some people worry that witnessing to a stranger might seem distasteful and turn them away from the gospel. Others worry that witnessing to close friends or relatives might change something in the relationship. They don't want to risk the friendship or damage their family ties. Some people fear rejection. Others worry that they don't know enough about Christianity to give good answers. Once you identify the cause of your fear, you can begin to understand why fear should not stand in the way of evangelism. First, we have been commanded to make disciples. Christ does not provide any loopholes in his statement. It is a command for all able Christians. We are not commanded to evangelize only when we overcome our fears (that may never happen); we are to make disciples despite our fear. Secondly, we should realize that we have little reason to fear. When you speak kindly and graciously about the gospel, you will find that most people react kindly and politely, even if they reject your call to repentance.

If lack of knowledge is one of reasons you are afraid to share the gospel, then do some more learning. Be ready to answer and give a defense for your faith. Dive into some books of the Bible and have some resources handy. Whenever you are asked something you do not know the answer to, simply be honest and admit your lack of knowledge. It is okay to say, "I don't know. Let me get back with you." Although sharing our faith may be difficult, telling others about Jesus is the most loving thing we can do for a person who doesn't know Him. Jesus is with you and has equipped you. Love those around you. Share your faith.

News From Brian and Donna Renes

Dear Friends,

Translation work in Nigeria. There are over 2,100 languages spoken by the 1.1 billion people who live on the African continent. I have been traveling to Africa often in recent years and just returned from a trip to Nigeria. In Nigeria alone there are over 500 languages. The Bible Society in Nigeria has worked hard to reach many of these groups but also faces the reality that each translation takes a lot of time, effort and money. Even if finances were not a problem, each project needs gifted translators.

The translators I worked with these past weeks come from different seasons of life. Some of them are young, single and recently out of school. One translator, named Endure, celebrated his 72nd birthday during our training event. Most of them have come from careers in teaching or pastoral ministry.

One of the translators, Abraham, continues to pastor a large church. I asked how he balanced the commitments and why he pushed himself in two very challenging occupations. His response was, "It is hard, but we need the Bible in our language." Abraham is very gifted and a true leader for the Epie translation team.

Gideon is one of the translators for the Ogbia language. He taught agriculture and now has been given a leave of absence for the next four years. With a smile, he shared with me how God has provided since he was a young man. Gideon added that he was thankful for government leaders who see the value of getting the Bible translated into the Ogbia language.

Pray for the work of translation in Nigeria. The country has been hit by low oil prices and many people as well as the Bible Society in Nigeria are struggling financially. Pray for their perseverance.

Thoughts:

I recall a fascinating experience while bow hunting in Minnesota. I was in my deer stand when I heard quite a commotion in the woods. The leaves were rustling, twigs snapping, accompanied by clashing sounds. I came down from my stand and headed toward the commotion. Two big Whitetail bucks, 14 and 10 pointers, had locked horns and were struggling to get apart. I tried to get close enough to get a shot, but they pulled apart and took off in the woods.

Even more fascinating are the Bighorn Sheep rams that have head-to-head combat. They rear back on their hind legs, then drop to all fours and charge each other at speeds greater than 20 mph. Fortunately, they have double-layered skulls shored with struts of bone for battle protection. They also have a massive tendon linking the skull and spine to help the head pivot and recoil from the blows.

These above mentioned displays of aggression are typical in the animal kingdom to prove dominance hierarchy.

Action Point:

God made us in His image and in His likeness. We don't have to fight for a position in a hierarchy of creation. We have Christ as our role model of love.

To be controlling, abusive and dominant in a marriage, or in any other relationship, is not what God had in mind for us. "Clothe yourselves" with Christ-like attributes.



The following is from Jill Leusink. Jill lost her brother Dr. Jeff Knobloch on August 13, 2016. Jill spoke this message at her brother's funeral. We encourage anyone who is struggling with mental illness to please visit: www.mentalhealthamerica.net.

Hi...I am a very emotional person so I would like to have you please refrain from any tears until I am finished. (that was a joke)

Jeff was a promoter of education and loved to learn new things. He liked a challenge and was instrumental in helping so many people. In Jeff's legacy, I am speaking today to try and educate you and give you some understanding of a very real disease called depression.

In my family, I am not the public speaker, Jeff was. I am not the entertainer, Jeff was. I am not the smart one, Jeff was. But I feel it is important to carry on his great attributes and talk to you about mental illness. Jeff had a heart of gold and a love for his God. But his brain was sick. In the same way a heart attack doesn't define a person, the way Jess passed doesn't define him. He was so much more. The Jeff we knew was authentic!

For some of us, when I say the word depression it is a mystery and for others it will resonate very close to our hearts and life. Depression is caused by different things including, physical changes in the brain, changes in the chemicals of the brain that control our emotions and thought processes, genetic tendencies and even hormones. Along with this, events and situations can all add to the outcome of depression. There are varying degrees of depression and some of the symptoms can include ~~the~~ extreme sadness, anxiety, difficulty thinking and concentrating, loneliness, worry, doubt, irrational thoughts, and loss of interest in normal activities. This list is not all-inclusive and these symptoms can present in wide range of severity. And oftentimes, as in the case of Jeff, it can be disguised for a very long time.

There is huge negative social stigma surrounding mental illness, which makes it often seem necessary to keep our burdens hidden. I don't have a slew of statistics to back up this statement but I know it's true because I see it everyday. I've experienced it and I've helped people who suffer from it. Jeff was one of the most compassionate doctors who helped numerous patients battle their depression on a personal level. As Patch Adams says, "you treat a disease, sometimes you win, sometimes you lose, but when you treat a human being you always win." Jeff treated the human being.....

If you asked someone, "how are you doing?" and they responded with "I'm sad," what would you do? Jeff would sit and weep with a patient and then help them find their next step. Most people just don't want to be around depressed people. It's uncomfortable. It's scary. It's no fun. But that is the time when the most love and compassion is needed. This is not a disease you can just snap out of or pray away. It is a vicious disease, it is real and it is everywhere.

I don't want to ramble on today, but I implore you to take notice of your family and friends and look for signs of depression. If you find yourself relating to this message, please reach out, as hard it may be. There is no shame in getting help. You are made in the image of God and you are important!

I also want to talk about Jeff as my one and only brother. He called me Beavis and I referred to him as Butthead. When we were young, we fought as normal siblings did. I sat on his head when he tried to wrestle me. He made fun of me when I said stupid stuff. He had great one-liners that could always

lighten the mood. He puked in my hair on a long road trip across Iowa, and then my Dad bought a bunch of pine tree scented air fresheners to cover up the smell the rest of the way home. UGH! To this day neither of us could stand that smell. We also share a strong dislike of the smell of Lysol as our mom would spray it around our heads when we were sick.

My brother told the grossest stories and was the first to share disgusting bodily function statements. (think about the result of eating too much corn on the cob) This was Jeff. He was my big brother and I love him. I already miss him, but I am going to do my best to carry on his legacy of compassion, empathy, and humor.

Finally - It is important for you to know Jeff loved God, he was a forgiven child of the One True King. On Saturday, the angels were exuberant to see Jeff coming home. They are all rejoicing and praising God as we are also celebrating Jeff's life today. May the despair we feel be replaced with the joy of the angels. To God be the glory!
