Rejoicing in my problems? There was a time in my life where those simple words wouldn't not have been said from my mouth. I assume that for some that may still hold true. How can you say that you *"rejoice in your problems?"* How can anyone really believe that?

Fifteen years ago, I was diagnosed with my disease of MS (Multiple Sclerosis). I can say for certainty I was not rejoicing in this discovery...far from it. I was angry, confused, scared, and certain death was close. For the next year or more, I lived this way. I lived in fear of the disease and the outcome it would have on my life. I was a single mom with a 5 year old son. I had lived through a lot of "stuff" in my life already and none of it had been easy. "Why me?" was my mantra. I reeled in my grief, grief of the disease, grief over the loss of life I knew was never going to be the same as before. And then...the call. I could hear the voice in my head. It was at the lowest and darkest moment in my life, but I heard the voice none the less and responded.

The voice I speak of was that of God. He told me to go to church. I had been absent for years already at the tender age of 24. It took me another year to really accept the outcome of my new reality. I can honestly say that I don't know if I would be here today writing this to you if I hadn't listened to that voice.

So did life become easier? Nope. I have gone blind, had to have my son help dress and feed me, couldn't talk, was falling, and the list goes on and on. I have been dealt a hard hand. But, *"for we know that they [problems] help us develop endurance. And endurance develops strength of character, and character strengthens our confident hope of salvation. Amen.* I am still going through stuff as I speak. I do have days when I want to give up, throw in the towel, but I do rejoice. I rejoice that because of the disease I am a better person, I am more caring, loving, non-judgmental and at peace. I rejoice that the disease has brought me back to God. I rejoice in all the areas God has brought me to and through. I rejoice in the friends I have made. I rejoice in my job at church. I rejoice with my family, who they are and what they will become.

I know first hand that life will continue to be hard, but it's the attitude that one has that makes all the difference in the world. Today I thank God for everything He does and will continue to do in my life, even the hard stuff. I rejoice in the peace that He gives me, in the security that He provides, and in the knowledge that no matter what I endure on this earth, He is with me and is guiding me. *And endurance develops strength of character, and character strengthens our confident hope of salvation.*

Today and I sit and think about what is happening in the next couple of months. First up is Rocky Mountain High. For those of you who are not familiar with this event it is a youth gathering of high school students from the Midwest. Every three years this event is held in Estes Park, Colorado at the YMCA Camp of the Rockies. This year there will be over 3,500 youth attending. I remember going on the first one as a student back in the mid-seventies.

During the week there will be Christian speakers, musical artists and many other activities. We will spend time as a youth group talking about what we have heard as well as how we can be challenged to live out our faith when we return home. We will also have opportunities for hiking, horseback riding, jeep tours, rock climbing and many more activities that each student has chosen to participate in.

The theme this year is "RE". The scripture base is from John 15. We will learn and talk about how to Restart, Rethink, Regroup, Rearrange, Recommit and Remain. In this newsletter you will find the names of the 41 youth and 7 adults who are going. Please pray for our youth, traveling safety and that their lives will be forever changed for Jesus.

At the beginning of August (5-15), we have 10 young adults and myself who will be traveling to Romania to work alongside Jeff and Chelsea Lampen doing missions. During our time there we will spend a majority of it working on the new ropes course they are developing for their student ministries. We will be building platforms and stringing cables. Towards the end of the week we will join them for the camp they are hosting for high school kids on their old ropes course. We are looking forward to helping and playing with those kids for the couple of days we will have with them. Every evening we will get into God's Word and challenge them in growing to love Jesus more and taking that home with them when we return. Chelsea informed me there are over 100 Romania youth who will be attending.

We are continuing to do fundraisers for the trip. Each person's cost is about \$1600. We will be hosting a meal following our congregational meeting on the 9th as well as having a food booth at the County fair where we will be selling pizza. We also have a few envelopes left to fill if you would choose to help in that manner. Your financial support would help them out immensely. What I am most excited about is that several of the young adults going are not from our church and I see this as a great opportunity to help grow their faith. The greater goal is that when we return home we will be able to develop a college ministry that will begin to meet regularly and get in God's Word.

The Discipleship learning Team is continuing to work on evaluating how we can develop people within this church to grow to become stronger disciples as well as begin to disciple others. With the information we have compiled we are now beginning to look at avenues of ministry that will move you forward in growing to know Jesus more. Our prayer is that as we open the door to new opportunities you will be willing to allow yourself to get involved. God wants to grow you, the question is, are you willing to give Him that chance?

Finally, I want to encourage you to prayerfully lift up our youth position. We now have a candidate for consideration and on July 9th we will have a congregational meeting to seek your affirmation of should we extend a call to him or not. I have enjoyed my conversation with Miguel and know he has a heart for God. He is very gifted and would be a great investment in our ministry here at First Reformed Church.

News From The Deacons

My largest complaint about Consistory is that we do a terrible job of communicating with the congregation. We think that because we are all at a meeting, and we put something in the minutes about what passed or failed, that everyone will understand all of the discussion that went along with it. But it isn't there, so how can anyone understand it? I do get questions about things, in person, texts and emails and I am happy to answer them, but it seems like I usually answer the same question several times. So, I am taking at least a small step in the next several months to try to communicate what is going on in everything to do with the FRC general fund and some of the other areas this covers.

Some of you may ask why this matters. Because 2018 is around the corner and we will begin working on the new year budget within a few months. When the deacons (and elders) get together to try to put next year's budget together we need to know from you what to support. I have found that at some budget meetings we have to really dig to remember why we support a given cause and if anyone even really cares about it anymore. So as you look at some of the things we go over in the next several months you need to express your thoughts to Consistory members to know if we should keep support in place for each item. Just a few weeks ago we learned that we supported GCM (in our records as JCM) and we hadn't even updated to the correct name in our records. Remember too that most of the things Consistory hears are the negatives. We don't often hear positives about things like Mother's Together, Words of Hope or Northwestern College until we remove them from the budget. So expressing your support is as or more important than anything. Let us know what you think for us to do a better job.

Several years ago we learned that we had some sloppy accounting systems. At the time we looked into it, there were 11 checking accounts and 9 savings accounts that took care of everything from benevolent to property to general. There were small accounts that were used once a year and one that had no activity for years. Banking was changing at that time and we started getting charged some fees for accounts, especially where there were little or no transactions taking place. When benevolent ran short, the benevolent treasurer would borrow money from one of the other accounts to cover a bill, then replace it later when their accounts had money again. Once in a while we forgot who had borrowed from which account and it took some extra time to go back in the records to straighten that out. That is when the plan was made to consolidate some of the accounting into one account especially being able to use more modern computer accounting systems.

What we have now is still the same as before, all of the different funds or divisions of the church financials, but now just separated under columns on the computer. This works a lot like your household budget. Probably in your house budget you make a rent or house payment, buy groceries, pay for gas and auto expenses, pay utilities and other bills. You would be a rare person to have a separate account for each area of your household budget expense but there are a few that use the Dave Ramsey envelope plan that is along those lines. So now we have better records when one account runs a little behind and needs to "borrow" from another area for a week or month.

Budget Verses Actual Quarterly Assessments

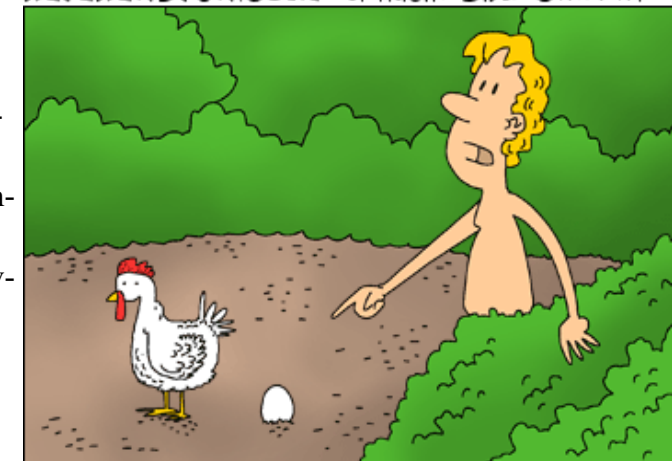

The Consistory will seek the wise counsel of the Congregation in this matter after recommendations from the search committee, administrative and full Consistory.

Each deacon is assigned to a ministry team and each team has their particular fit in the budget system. This year Mark Langstraat oversees Congregational Care, Brian Sayler oversees Youth Ministries, Charlie Kuhl oversees Education, Paul Feldkamp oversees Worship, Clayton Wagenaar and Chris Wynia oversee Benevolent/Outreach, and Kevin Klaassen is on Property. Those deacons look at the budget set for them in January and help to plan their budget with their particular group. They are to help them look ahead at the year and plan for major expenses. If their particular group would start spending too much, their job is to remind them about budget but also to bring any extra spending needs back to the deacons to ask for approval. Each week when the deacons gather after a service Brenda has provided a written list of bills to approve for the upcoming week. They might be salary, utilities, mission payments or RCA dues. We have the policy in place that everyone reviews this information each Sunday and that at least two deacons must sign and return the authorization to Brenda before she is authorized to pay the bill.

I have to say here that Brenda makes my job so much easier because she carefully keeps track of all of that stuff. We worked out quarterly schedules for RCA and other obligations so that the deacons can keep track of those expenses more easily. But without her I would be spending many hours each week trying to keep track of each of those divisions. Thanks Brenda for keeping the records straight and taking some of the burden from us!

I will go into more detail next month about what is involved in each of the deacons areas that they are overseeing. My favorite teachers told me that no question is stupid, maybe someone else might have the same question. Never be afraid to ask Consistory about any of these areas. If we don’t know the answer we will look it up and get back to you with what we find out. We may all learn something along the way. ~Kevin Klaassen, Chairman of the Deacons

Pastor Miguel Cruz' Bio

Some of my best memories from childhood are from my youth group experiences. From the inspiring worship to challenging messages to fun and games to the friendships I made –it was a formative part of my faith journey. In college, I began taking an active role in leading ministries for young people. I started the Silent Praise (sign language set to worship music) group at Hope College; I was a small group Bible study leader and I trained other leaders; I worked for a summer at Spring Hill Camp; and I worked for two summers in urban church parking lot youth outreach programs. I had a natural desire to engage young people with the gospel, just as I had been engaged.

After Brien and I were married, we moved to California, and I taught second grade while beginning seminary. When we moved back to Holland, MI to finish out my seminary training, I grew in preaching, discipling and leading all areas of pastoral ministry through my internships. My first call was in upstate New York. I served as the solo pastor, which included leading the youth group. I was also blessed to be able to go to Camp Fowler for a week every summer to minister to the high schoolers as either the chaplain for the week or as a volunteer counselor. Some of my best moments of ministry and discipleship happened through my work with the youth.

Fast forward to the last few years: God has had us on a sort of wilderness journey, where he has done a deepening work in me through new ministry experiences and through trials. I had the opportunity to work with the homeless as a program manager of a men's sheltered housing program; many of the men I worked with were between 18 and 24, and I loved the opportunity to engage a different sector of the youth population. I also was the worship leader and pastor of spiritual formation at a local church, and I had opportunities to get the youth involved monthly in worship and to go on a mission's trip with the youth. Most recently I have been serving as a candidate advisor at Church Leadership Center (CLC), where we train commissioned pastors. That is how I got to know Heath DeJong. Through some very unexpected changes at CLC, it became clear to me that the Lord was leading me to look for my next (and hopefully long term!) position in ministry. Brien and I have now been married almost eighteen years, and we have three children: a girl (10) and two boys (7 and 3).

We are trusting the Holy Spirit to guide us into our next season of ministry, and I am excited to see how God will use all my gifts, passions and past experiences to bless the people of God and to raise up more disciples who are on fire for our Lord Jesus Christ!

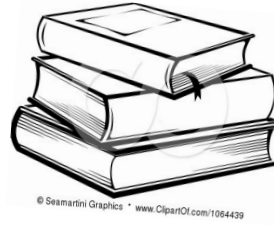

Sportsmen's Devotional

Bible Study Verses: I Corinthians 12:18-23, 27

But now God has set the members, each one of them, in the body just as He pleased. And if they were all one member, where would the body be? But now indeed there are many members, yet one body. And the eye cannot say to the hand, "I have no need of you"; nor again the head to the feet, "I have no need of you." No, much rather, those members of the body which seem to be weaker are necessary. And those members of the body which we think to be less honorable, on these we bestow greater honor; and our unrepresentable parts have greater modesty. Now you are the body of Christ, and members individually. (NKJV)

Thoughts: Paul portrays believers within the Body of Christ, by using appendages and organs of the human body--the eye, the head, the foot, and the hand. In all of chapter 12, he reminds us of the interaction and interdependence of each part within the Body. Almost in the same words that Jesus used to teach His disciples that the "humble will be exalted,"

Paul refers to, "No, much rather, those members of the body which seem to be weaker are necessary. And those members of the body which we think to be less honorable, on these we bestow greater honor; and our unrepresentable parts have greater modesty, but our presentable parts have no need. But God composed the body, having given greater honor to that part which lacks it," I Corinthians 12:22-24 (NKJV). ~(Fred B)

Action Point: It is imperative upon us to treat others, as Christ treats them. How many times have we looked at some in our church, as if they were more important than others, just to find:

Their accomplishments or prominence, was due to someone behind the scenes?

Those who were more behind-the-scenes in their service of others, were actually quietly serving Christ, and not men.

My pastor-mentor from my teen years, the man under whose ministry I surrendered to preach the Gospel, is now 97. Once I told him that after God called me at age 16, the two greatest influences on my life were Billy Graham, and him.

He replied, "That puts me in good company." To which I replied, "No, Pastor Scribner, that puts Billy in good company." This humble, Godly, mostly unknown man, is definitely one who is "worthy of greater honor."

Sportsmen's Tip of the Day: When teaching others to fish, don't take anyone who won't help dig the worms. My granddaughter (above) and grandson know that it's all a part of the fishing trip, including cleaning and eating the catch. Exception? If you're practicing "catch and release."

When teaching others to hunt, don't take anyone who won't dress their game, and eat it. In this way, you teach them to respect the quarry, do their part on the trip, and appreciate the seriousness of taking an animal's life.
