"You are the only Bible some unbelievers will ever read." –John MacArthur . I look for Christian Quotes or Spiritual words to put in the Newsletters each month. Just a little "food for thought" that can be carried with you. I was going to put the quote I started out this article with in this newsletter somewhere, but the more I read it, the more I realized that this is perfect for what I was going to write about. I was going to talk about how easy it is to stumble, to sin, to not live up to what God expects of us as Christians.

You see, I have noticed that I can change on a dime, and that bothers me. Let me explain... I used to work out at (Coveris) Exopack before this became my job. I don't know how many of you have ever worked in a factory, but if you have you will understand. I worked the 12 am—8 am shift and while I was employed there my mouth became a "potty". It is so easy to swear out there. Why? Because it seems like everyone does along with the dirty jokes and conversations that you can be a part of. I found myself joining in without putting much effort in. It's very easy to do what everyone else is doing. I am not saying this doesn't happen in other jobs or places for that matter, but I remember those years of working there and I remember my mouth.

What bothers me *is for the most part*, I stopped swearing after I quit there. (And yes... I still swear at times...I am not perfect!) But, I find myself easily switching back to being a potty mouth when I am around a certain group of people or in certain places....and I hate it. Why is it that it is so easy to be part of the group? Why am I like this? Why?? I have a feeling I am not alone.

You see, you don't have to put much effort into being part of the crowd. What takes some effort and work is to NOT part of it. Being in the world implies more than simply inhabiting it. We need to actually be involved in our societies. Jesus told His disciples to "go therefore and make disciples of all nations" (Matthew 28:19). They were not to set themselves up apart from the world and expect others to come to them to hear truth. As believers, we should be set apart from the world. This is the meaning of being holy and living a holy, righteous life—to be set apart. We are not to engage in the sinful activities the world promotes, nor are we to retain the insipid, corrupt mind that the world creates. Rather, we are to conform ourselves, and our minds, to that of Jesus Christ (Romans 12:1-2). *This is a daily activity and commitment.*

We must also understand that being in the world, but not of it, is necessary if we are to be a light to those who are in spiritual darkness. This month we begin summer. Many of us look forward to summer. We are excited for weekend activities, getting outside, trips that are planned and people we will hang out with. This is a great time of year. It is the time of year when we are reminded that God is with us and it is God who brings the rains, grows the crops, blossoms the flowers and warms us with the sunshine. Summers are a change of pace and an opportunity for getting those outdoor projects done.

As Deacons and Elders there are several projects we will be doing the second half of this year. Your financial giving has allowed us to stay in the black and meet all of our financial obligations. We thank you and praise you for your generosity. But, we also want to give you a "heads up" on some of the bigger projects that will be coming in the approaching months and are asking for your help in allowing us to accomplish these projects. Ideally, we would like to create a surplus financially to pay for what we need to do and not have to take out a loan. This means healthier giving to pay for the things needed when they are completed.

We will be repairing and pouring concrete around the church to repair sidewalks. About a month ago we had an insurance representative look at our church property and he highly suggest the sidewalk repair we will be doing.

We will also be replacing all the lighting in our church sanctuary. If you look in the balcony you can see many of the lights are becoming deformed. These lights are original to the church and the sockets that the bulbs screw into are bigger than normal and it is getting harder and harder to find replacement bulbs.

Finally we are looking to upgrade our speakers, video and pulpit lighting as well. All these are out of date and many of the pulpit lights are not working properly. We are also finding options to provide better clarity to our video projection. Many of you recognize that when all the lights are on it is hard to see the screen and some of the images projected on it.

We need your help in these upgrades. We are estimating our cost will be close to \$30,000 for the needed equipment. This gives you an idea of what we would like to build into a fund to cover those costs. We did budget money for these items last year and again this year. As a consistory, the time is now to get them accomplished. If you have any questions talk to one of the deacons and they can give you better details to the upcoming projects. Thanks for your incredible support of this church with your financial giving. We are continuing to grow God's kingdom together.

From JJ and Tim TenClay in Italy

Dear Friends,

Blessings to you all from Italy. Our ministry here in Palermo continues to be in full swing, and we have several exciting announcements to share with you in this letter.

Tim continues to serve as minister for three Waldensian/Methodist churches in three separate communities—Palermo, Trapani and Marsala. Two of these churches are "Essere Chiesa Insieme" (Being Church Together) churches, meaning we are a body of believers from Italy, Africa (mostly from Ghana and Nigeria), and America, who intentionally strive to be the body of Christ together. It is a beautiful thing, and work that we truly enjoy. Tim also serves on a special advisory council for "Essere Chiesa Insieme (ECI)" for the Waldensian/Methodist Church in Italy.

Another part of our ministry is working with the association Pellegrino della Terra (PdT), where we are focused on providing services to women (mostly Nigerian) who are victims or ex-victims of human trafficking and sexual exploitation. In our last Dear Friends letter we announced that Tim had been elected president of PdT and he continues to serve in this role.

The RCA Global Mission office, in agreement with the Waldensian Church, decided to appoint Tim as a part-time RCA missionary due to the extra work he is doing outside of his role as minister for the three congregations mentioned above. (Besides his additional roles as president of PdT and member of the advisory council for ECI, Tim works in an advisory role with the Waldensian Diaconal Center "La Noce" and helps organize and host individuals and groups who visit here in Italy). This agreement came about at the request of the Moderator of the Waldensian Church, who has expressed concern that Tim will not be able to collect a pension from Italy and can no longer contribute to his American pension plan. Therefore, we are currently looking for financial support of one additional PIM share, to reinstate contributions to Tim's RCA pension plan. Please let us know if your church, classis or regional synod is interested in supporting our work, and our family, in this way.

I (JJ) continue to work with Pellegrino della Terra, but have become more involved this year in interviewing women who come to PdT for help, and assisting the local police interview women either when the women decide they would like to file a police report or when the police request to interview the women for ongoing criminal cases.

In November 2016 I was also appointed as one of the two coordinators of the Humanitarian Corridors-Project Palermo. (For more information on Humanitarian Corridors, please read our past Dear Friends letters). In December 2016 we welcomed the first two Syrian families to Palermo through this project, and in February 2017 we added a third family. All 13 of our guests fled the war in Syria and were living in refugee camps in Lebanon, before being chosen as guests of the Humanitarian Corridors Project. Some of the costs of this project are paid for by funds raised by Mediterranean Hope (the program that runs the Humanitarian Corridors Project), but not all. Because this is a new project in Palermo, the Waldensian Diaconal Center has renovated one apartment to house one of the families, and has turned one floor of the foresteria (a small hotel that is run by the Diaconal Center) into housing for the additional two families. Also, the five children who are of the ages to attend preschool or elementary school are attending the private school here at the Diaconal Center free

Father's Day is a day set apart to celebrate fatherhood, recognize the influence of fathers in our homes and society, and foster paternal bonds. It is also celebrated to honor and commemorate our fathers and forefathers. While it is celebrated in the U.S. on the third Sunday of June, in many other countries the officially recognized date of Father's Day varies. It is believed that Father's Day was first observed on June 19, 1910, in Spokane, Washington, through the efforts of Sonora Smart Dodd, a Christian woman and the daughter of American Civil War veteran William Jackson Smart. Sonora's mother died when she was age 16, and she wanted a day that would commemorate and honor fathers like her own, who had raised her and five other children. Once she began soliciting the idea of an official Father's Day, she met some opposition and even derision, but she persevered. A bill was introduced in Congress in 1913, and in 1916, President Woodrow Wilson spoke at a Father's Day celebration in Spokane, Washington, wanting to make it an official holiday, but Congress still resisted. In 1924, Calvin Coolidge became involved, and in 1930 a national committee was formed by various trade groups in an effort to legitimize the holiday. The battle continued, and in 1966 President Lyndon Johnson made a proclamation for the third Sunday of June to be Father's Day. Finally, it was made an official national holiday when President Nixon signed a similar proclamation in 1972.

The Bible does recognize a special place of honor for men who were leaders or examples of excellence in certain skills, such as Jabal, who was "the father of those who live in tents and raise livestock" and his brother Jubal, who was "the father of all who play the harp and flute" (Genesis 4:20-21). Also, when Abram's name was changed to Abraham, God told him, "I have made you a father of many nations" (Genesis 17:5), clearly indicating fatherhood as a place of honor in His eyes. Thus, even though the Bible does not mention a Father's Day, we can clearly see that God does recognize the importance of fathers and even gave them special honor throughout history.

Furthermore, we can follow this theme of fatherhood in the very person of God Himself through countless scriptures (Matthew 5:45; 6:9,32; Romans 1:7; 15:6; 1 Corinthians 8:6). There are many instances that speak of Jesus Christ, the Son, honoring His Father and honoring the will of His Father (e.g., John 17:1 and John 17:5). The apostle Paul taught that to honor one's earthly father is not only a commandment but the first commandment that, when obeyed, has a promise of things going well and living long on the earth. "Honor your father and mother—which is the first commandment with a promise—that it may go well with you and that you may enjoy long life on the earth" (Ephesians 6:2-3).

of charge. This is beneficial because it allows the children to attend a small, private, multicultural school where they already have friends and a built-in support system. However, both the renovation of housing and the scholarships for the children to attend school here create economic challenges for the Diaconal Center. Therefore, the RCA Global Mission office has approved a new fundraising project to support the work we are doing here in Palermo to support Syrian refugees. If you, your family, your church or your community would like to support this project, you may do so by sending checks to the RCA Global Mission office (make sure to write on the check that the money is designated for the project "Humanitarian Corridors Syrian Refugees", or by giving a donation online at https://www.rca.org/jj-tim-tenclay (on the right hand side of the page you will see an orange button to click entitled "Give to Humanitarian Corridors Syrian Refugees). One of the pictures in this letter shows one of our Syrian guests meeting his classmates and teacher for the first time at the school La Noce; the other photo shows me enjoying a meal of Syrian food in the salon of the foresteria that we have turned into social housing for our Syrian guests.

Our last big announcement is that we will be returning to the United States in June for our first home assignment as RCA mission co-workers! We will arrive in time to attend the RCA General Synod in June, and will return to Italy the beginning of September so the girls can start school. The RCA Global Mission staff will be arranging our speaking engagements with churches during our home assignment, but unfortunately, we will not be able to see you all. However, if you have members or pastors of your church attending General Synod, we would also love to connect with you then. Also, to our wonderful supporters who send us mail via post, we respectfully ask that you temporarily refrain from correspondence with us from May to September, as we do not want risk your correspondence being lost or overwhelming our neighbors with mail while we are in the United States.


