Albania, Malawi, Armenia, Croatia, Ukraine, Hungary. Many of us would probably have a hard time locating these countries on a map. MISSIONARIES We might not have even known they were countries! But recently individuals from each of these countries, along with others from Spain, Canada, Finland, England, the Netherlands, Russia, and Portugal spent two weeks in Athens, Greece. The purpose of this gathering was to receive training in Paratext, the software Brian has been instrumental in

the development, deployment, and training in for the past several years.

Very seldom do I, Donna, get the opportunity to travel with Brian as he literally circles the globe, working with hundreds of Bible translation projects every year. But I had the privilege of going to Greece with him in June and meeting several incredible people that dedicate their lives to ensuring God's Word is translated into as many languages as possible. I did not sit in on the training sessions since the nitty gritty of Paratext is completely over my head.

While in Greece I was able to visit with many of these individuals at mealtimes and hear their stories. I got to know Irina from Russia who shared about carrying on the translation work of her husband after he had a debilitating stroke. From George I learned so much about Greek history and the differences between the Orthodox and Protestant Churches. One after another the stories humbled and touched me as I saw how committed these people are to serving others in their countries and around the world.

I also had the chance to do a good amount of sight-seeing. The museums and archaeological areas showing thousands of years of history were incredibly fascinating. Of course visiting the Acropolis and walking around the Parthenon was a once-in-a-lifetime experience. But equally humbling was climbing Mars Hill where the Apostle Paul spoke to the Athenians after seeing their altar to the unknown god (Acts 17)

I'm so grateful that I was able to spend those two weeks with Brian, not just because we spend so much of the year separated (he was gone almost 100 days the first six months of 2017). But also to get a glimpse of the amazing people he has the privilege of working with and giving support to. As always, we deeply appreciate your prayers for safety in Brian's travels. Even more so we ask you to pray for all of the people involved in translation work around the world. You will probably never get to meet them or share a meal with them. But be assured that they covet your prayers and support.

Brian and Donna Renes have been involved in the work of Bible translation since 1989. Their first years of ministry were spent among the Tojolabal people in Chiapas, Mexico. Since 1996 Brian has worked with the United Bible Societies, giving support to national translators and consultants. He teaches them how to effectively use the computer in their work of translating the Bible into languages such as Quechua, which is spoken in Peru, and the Kuna language of Panama. Donna ministers to Hispanic children in the Sioux Center, Iowa, area through the teaching of English as a Second Language.

Willing Hands Group

Willing Hands Group #3 will be responsible for services during the month of <u>September</u>. Co-chairpersons are Jamie and Scott Hulstein, Pauline and Jim Van Engen, and Sandy and Dave Lamfers The last part of that budget is labeled "Benevolent Regional Synod". This has a budget of \$15,377. This covers Inspiration Hills and our portion of Classis dues that can be attributed to "benevolent" or missional use. When the dues are calculated for the coming year they give us a breakdown of what is used to run Classis versus what Classis spends on their benevolent portion. In our budget we separate the two. For a short time a few budgets ago we lumped this together as our Classis dues, but it was separated out again in subsequent budgets. The thought was so that we have a better idea of what our total use of funds is for benevolent even if we are not in complete control over it.

Another large part is the Classis dues themselves. Our part of the Classis dues that is not attributed to the Benevolent area is \$20,256.

Now there are other expenses not mentioned yet. These are the salaries to the Pastor, office staff, worship and technical coordinators and janitor and the payroll taxes we have to pay with them. These total approximately \$136,000 per year including all payroll tax expenses.

I was surprised to have the question asked about how we set salaries. I explained that for Pastoral staff we had minimum guidelines to meet each year published by Classis. The person asking thought we just "winged it". Nope, wouldn't even know how to start on that one. We do, as Consistory, set the other salaries for the other positions. We discuss them each year and look back at our annual job reviews with each of them (yep, we get to do that too) to try to determine those salaries. The salary we set sets the payroll tax rates that we have to pay along with them. We are a patriotic group and pay taxes so not entirely tax free.

We know as the Consistory members of FRC that we could not even attempt to support all of the things in this budget without your continuing and tireless support. On behalf of the entire Consistory, thank you one and all. Not only for your financial giving, but the time and effort that you put in to keep all of the activities and programs working and growing and blossoming. We also thank you for your continued prayerful support for us. We sometimes groan about another Consistory meeting but we also know that your continued prayer and support for us results in Holy Spirit guidance to the group. Thank you.

Like I said in the first month when I started, the Consistory needs to hear from you about any and all of these areas so that we can do the best job possible. Be bold in presenting any ideas of change, but please be just as bold in presenting your praise or support of areas as well. If we have your thoughts (and prayers) with us as we prepare next year's budget we will do the best job possible. And don't forget to ask questions whenever they come up.

No stones thrown at me yet, that's good. So now, the General Fund itself. This may be a bit longer due to everything we support so I won't get detailed. Each deacon oversees their area, monitors the spending and helps their team plan, but all funds go through the general fund. Here we go.

Under Congregational Care we have a budget of \$4,550. Expenses under this column include church events, kitchen supplies, subscriptions, leadership training, library, premarital and marital counseling.

Under Education with a budget of \$17,600 is small groups, Sunday School, Wednesday night Bible class curriculum, literature, books, Bibles, Camp Registrations, Bible School and family night suppers.

Under Youth with a budget of \$750 we include the MS & HS Remnant curriculum.

Worship has a budget of \$9,200 and includes repairs for audio/video equipment, offering envelopes, organists, choir music, pulpit supply and mileage, praise team music and media resources.

Property has a budget of \$54,500 and includes church & parsonage utility bills, property and workman's comp insurance, property repairs, lawn care, snow removal, janitor supplies, flowers, nursery & youth room repairs.

Benevolent is broken down into several areas because there are many. They are:

- Outreach has a budget of \$11,200. This includes advertising, church events, Remnant, Rocky Savings account put away each year, quilters and new church families.
 Outreach also has \$8,550 for Mother's Together, Osceola County Love Bank, Mission trips, Christian Aid fund, Christmas Shoeboxes and Adoptive Families.
- Benevolet RCA, our shares of mission support. This has a budget of \$54,900 and includes Partners in Mission (P.I.M.), Northwestern College and Words of Hope.
- Other benevolent is our "monthly envelopes" or the monthly challenge giving. We budget \$6,000 here with the understanding that whatever comes in gets sent to those groups, but Consistory sets a minimum of \$500 for each. So anything over means that our budget does not pay, anything under \$500 and the benevolent budget makes the difference to the \$500. There are two exceptions to that rule. One is for our ¹/₂ share of mission support where budget guarantees \$3,200 minimum and Christmas Shoeboxes where budget guarantees \$1,000 minimum. Included in that line is MS/ HS Remant, ¹/₂ share mission support, Bible League, Village Northwest, Center of Hope, The Banquet, Osceola Love Bank, Cherish Center, Christmas Shoeboxes, Bethany Christian Services and Talking Bibles.



Words from Josh Lucas, Director of Youth Ministries

Hello First Reformed Church,

My name is Josh Lucas I am the church's new Youth Director. Here are a few fun facts about me! First off as I mentioned in church on Sunday I am from California.
