I would like to take some time to help you understand both the budget and what our nomination process entails. In our October Consistory meeting we **Pastor Luke** will give final approval of the buget based on your recommends or questions. For the most part the budget remains the same as previous years. Most expenses

stayed the same but a few changed and I would like to point those out.

In the Education Ministries we drop our Small groups/ Sunday School/Wednesday night Budget from \$7,000 to \$4000, this is due to the fact that we have material purchased for the next couple of years and is already on hand. When the time comes to purchase materials our budget will increase.

In the area of Payroll we based raises off of a 2% increase recommended by the Classis. We also added \$6500 for our new communications assistant position. Jamie Hulstein is now handling the bulletin each week as well as the monthly newsletter. She will also be working on Fridays so we will have an office presence Monday through Friday.

The other big increase is our Administrative Assistant salary. For many years we have been limited in being able to give Brenda a raise due to her being on disability. This restricted the amount of income she could receive. Brenda has put in more hours that asked and often has not recorded many of her work hours to stay under the disability minimum. As of last month, she is no longer receiving disability which now allows us to pay her what she truly has earned. You will notice that her salary has hardly changed since 2014. As an Administrative Team as well as consistory we feel blessed we can finally compensate her for the work she does.

Finally, the other increase is in insurance for the Director of Youth Ministries. We are covering both Josh and his wife under a policy. In the past, our Youth Director was single and thus single coverage.

Our assessments are almost \$5000 higher. This is due to our increased membership in this last year. We can celebrate almost 50 new members this past year. Our Partners in Mission shares also went up \$300 per share which results in a \$2100 increase.

We also added more money for local missions. You will notice a \$2000 increase in our giving to Atlas and \$2500 in support to The Lantern which is now a non-profit ministry run by Mike and Melissa Anderson. The Osceola County Love Bank is now under the Lantern ministries. We will still have an offering for the love bank.

There are little changes here and there and the Ministry teams have worked hard to be faithful in our financial management from the offerings you have given. We are always striving to be good stewards for the monies God has entrusted this church with.

If you have any questions or suggestions please contact one of the elders or deacons that is currently on consistory or you can make a request to be put on the agenda at our next consistory meeting October 16th. Our church by laws state in Article 3, Section 3: "Only such business as has previously been presented to and discussed by the Consistory shall be placed on the agenda of the Congregational Meeting (matters of business from the membership, for the Congregational meeting, must be in the hands of the Consistory for their meetings prior to the Congregational meeting in order to be included on the agenda.)

I recall a fascinating experience while bow hunting in Minnesota. I was in my deer stand when I heard quite a commotion in the woods. The leaves were rustling, twigs snapping, accompanied by clashing sounds. I came down from my stand and headed toward the commotion. Two big Whitetail bucks, 14 and 10 pointers, had locked horns and were struggling to get apart. I tried to get close enough to get a shot, but they pulled apart and took off in the woods.

Even more fascinating are the Bighorn Sheep rams that have head-to-head combat. They rear back on their hind legs, then drop to all fours and charge each other at speeds greater than 20 mph. Fortunately, they have double-layered skulls shored with struts of bone for battle protection. They also have a massive tendon linking the skull and spine to help the head pivot and recoil from the blows.

These above mentioned displays of aggression are typical in the animal kingdom to prove dominance hierarchy.

Action Point

God made us in His image and in His likeness. We don't have to fight for a position in a hierarchy of creation. We have Christ as our role model of love.

To be controlling, abusive and dominant in a marriage, or in any other relationship, is not what God had in mind for us. "Clothe yourselves" with Christ-like attributes.

MEET OUR MISSIONARIES

Rowland and Jane Van Es

Dear Friends and Supporters, It is exciting to see the good work that God is doing in Kenya through the faithful service of our students. As newly appointed Head of Department for practical and pastoral studies, Rowland has had more opportunities to see the work that our students, and by extension, the church in Kenya is doing. Every student does a three month supervised field assignment in a church, school, hospital or a pris-

on. Recently we visited five students who are busy with their field assignments and we wanted to share their stories with you. John was working in a tin office in Voi where the Anglicans are building a new cathedral; he also attends city council meetings and visits inmates in the prison next door. Three students were working in schools: Mark is in a primary school where he does Christian Religious Education (CRE) using songs & plays. When we visited it was Gen 3: Satan is a liar! Constance is the first female priest in her parish which also includes a local high school that she visits twice a week while Doris works in an Anglican run high school where she counsels teenage boys and girls about faith and life. The day we visited, the lesson was on having self-esteem and self-confidence to do your best at all times. But Hilton is the one I really want to tell you about... His church is south of Voi at the foot of a mountain that has a church and a school on top started by missionaries in 1893. Despite this long history of mission and evangelism there are still many who have not heard the gospel. Hilton first took me to a primary school at the bottom of the mountain where he is starting a new church. The members are donating the materials and doing the work themselves. So far they just have some walls. Then he took me to a church with walls and a roof called the "Church of the Cactus" because they started by worshipping in the shade of a large cactus tree. Finally he took me to the church where he lives, a humble mud and wood affair where the members are mostly women and children. He has no electricity except what he gets from a small solar panel, just enough to read one of his 6 books. He doesn't go outside at night because he is afraid of the hyenas and lions and elephants that live there. Instead of being discouraged as most of us would, Hilton is happy and excited about all the potential. He says he is the luckiest evangelist in the diocese because he has the biggest territory to work with. Instead of worrying about how many are not coming to church, he is enthusiastic about the one dozen who do and those come for extra prayer services. His bishop is so happy with his work and how he rose to the challenge that Hilton will keep working there even after his three month field assignment is over. Aside from teaching hundreds of BD students like Hilton and the others we visited, St Paul's also teaches more than a from Rowland and Jane Van Es in Kenya August 2017 John in his tin office Doris with high school students Hilton by his mud church Jane and Rowland Van Es's ministry At St. Paul's University, an ecumenical school that has trained people for ministry since 1903, Rowland teaches Old Testament introduction and interpretation and business ethics, and Jane teaches psychology and sociology to bachelor of divinity students and a master's level course in caring for people with HIV/AIDS. Learn more at www.rca.org/vanes. thousand Business Students, giving them required courses like Christian World view and Christian Business Ethics. There are also many students studying Communications, Education and Development. All of them are encouraged to see their chosen work as God's work for them to do as they seek to live out St. Paul's motto: "Servants of God and Humanity." Jane, who teaches students studying counselling and social work, has also seen many of her students transformed by their experience at St. Paul. One of her recent graduates, Alex, gave a nice testimony in chapel about how much St Paul's helped him personally and spiritually and how all that he learned will help him serve others who need counselling for various addictions and other real life issues. As we begin a new academic year in September there are many students whostruggle to find the necessary funds to come to St. Paul's. Most receive a work-study grant that covers half of their tuition, room and board at St Paul's University (about \$1,000 per semester). Flexing Your Gratitude Muscles

By: Ruth Boven Scripture Reading — Luke 17:11-19 He threw himself at Jesus' feet and thanked him and he was a Samaritan. — <u>Luke 17:16</u>

I'm a bit of a health nut. I exercise regularly. As I age, I'm noticing how quickly my muscles weaken when I don't use them for a while. It's often said that if you don't use them, you lose them. It's helpful to think of gratitude in that way too.

Gratitude is not an inborn trait that some have and -others don't. Rather, it's more like a muscle that can be strengthened over time. And being intentional about exercising it can be critical to becoming a more grateful person.

We don't know much about the ten lepers that Jesus healed. We know that the one who returned and gave thanks was a Samaritan. Luke may have included that detail because the Samaritans were looked down on by the Jews of Jesus' day. But this Samaritan demonstrated a level of gratitude that the other lepers didn't show.

At a time when things like entitlement, accusation, venting -anger, and violence seem to have taken hold of our culture, what kind of impact might gratitude have? Saying "I'm grateful" or "Thank you" does not simply express our thanksgiving but actually gives voice to a countercultural witness that has the power to push back the tide of resentment among us. Then there is room for a fresh appreciation of God's renewing, saving grace.

Are you keeping your gratitude muscles in shape?
