This week I cannot help but think about my message last Sunday. I talked about bringing in the harvest. As I preached on Sunday I knew that this week many of the farmers would began to get into the field to start combining and collecting their crop. That was all good until we began to get the rain.

I was reminded there is an urgency to collecting the crop at the right time in order to obtain the greatest yield. The time is now. So here the

farmers are, nervous, wondering and praying that they will be able to get out into those fields very soon. If not, the crop will be hurt or even lost. All the time, energy, careful watching, and preparation for this time could be gone. It is scary and yet there is even more of an urgency when the time comes.

Why don't we feel that same way when it comes to Jesus? We think we can live how we want, do the things we do and feel like we will have a day down the road to make the changes necessary before Christ's return. The problem is we don't know when that will be and so we too need to live with an urgency. This is not only for ourselves but also for those who do not know Jesus.

Just this past week I had conversation with someone who lost two of their children in their twenty's. I'm sure the expectation was they would live to be 70, 80 or even longer. But it didn't happen. It crossed my mind in wonder, did anyone see an urgency to share Christ with them or was their thinking there will also be another day to do so tomorrow.

People of God, we can't wait! The harvest is ready, and we are few. We need to live with urgency and intentionality. We need to live with focus and purpose. I can guarantee that as soon as they can, our farmers will be out in their fields. They will even be pushing the limits knowing they might get stuck along the way. They will not say to themselves, "I will wait till tomorrow because it might be a better day" they will take action today!

We need to do the same. As individuals and as a church we need to take action today. What are you doing to share Christ with those around you? And the question doesn't refer to what you will do tomorrow, it is what are you doing today? As a church what are we doing today? We can spend hours upon hours strategizing and planning how to do ministry but that will get us nowhere. We need to start taking and doing ministry today, right now. There are thousands of people within our community that God is preparing for the harvest. He is calling us to go out into the field. Can God do it on His own? Sure. But the beauty of God is he wants to use us, he has chosen us to do his work. This is not a burden but a blessing.

The farmer finds joy knowing his crop is finally out of the field. God has chosen the farmer to bring in the crop. For us, there is joy in being used by God for kingdom growth. The rains remind me of the urgency for the harvest. It is my prayer that you will be reminded in these rains the urgency God has given us to live our lives completely and fully for him and that we need to take today's moment to talk about Jesus!!

Finally, this month you will be presented with the budget. Major changes have been made and proposed. Prayerfully look over it. If you have any concerns or thoughts, please take the time to talk to any of the elders or deacons currently serving on consistory. Your voice will be taken seriously as we make final changes and then final approval by the consistory for 2019. God is Good All the Time! All the Time, God is Good!



Why Pack a Shoebox? Tania and

The School Supplies

I grew up during the communist regime in Romania. There was a cloud of gloom and sadness in the country. The atmosphere was very cold and unwelcoming. People focused all their energy on their jobs and sometimes overlooked their children. Sometimes my dad worked two jobs. He worked hard, and our basic needs were met, but we didn't have anything extra. My sister and I didn't usually receive gifts, even at birthdays or Christmas.

Even though it was forbidden to talk about God, I grew up in a family that loved Jesus and went to church. But I was looked down upon for my faith. At school I was often ridiculed and bullied—it wasn't easy for me. When I was 10 years old I participated in a Christmas Eve program at church. After the program, the children were surprised with shoebox gifts. We were thrilled to receive the boxes. I saw so much joy and excitement in the room. I was deeply appreciative of the gift. We had to wait and open the shoeboxes when we got home. Our house was a 30minute walk from the church, and we had to walk in the snow.

When I opened my shoebox, I saw an explosion of color—plastic jewelry, a new hat, and scarves. My favorite items were school supplies. I received colorful pens, a notebook, and colored pencils.

As a child, I really loved going to school. I loved reading and writing. But school supplies were not readily available at that time. We only received a few pencils and they needed to last a long time. So, anything extra, or anything colorful, really meant a lot to me.

We were told that the shoeboxes were packed by other Christians. I learned that there are people who love Jesus Christ enough to give special gifts to children they haven't even met. I felt valued and loved, and this helped me to have a deeper walk with the Lord. As a child, I really loved going to school. I loved reading and writing. But school supplies were not readily available at that time. We only received a few pencils and they needed to last a long time. So, anything extra, or anything colorful, really meant a lot to me.

I moved to the United States in 2003, and I'm now a special education teacher at a high school. Every year I pack shoeboxes with my husband and children. Packing shoeboxes has become a treasured family tradition. I want my children to understand that many children around the world do not have as much as they do. I want to teach my children to be cheerful givers. We must give abundantly in order to bless others in the way we have been blessed.

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Sportsmen's Devotional

Bible Study Verse

Luke 5:15 But the ones that fell on the good ground are those who, having heard the word with a noble and good heart, keep it and bear fruit with patience. (NKJV)

Luke 5:18 Therefore take heed how you hear.



For whoever has, to him more will be given; and whoever does not have, even what he seems to have will be taken from him." (NKJV)

Thoughts

Have you ever noticed how important positioning is? For example: If you are going to set up a portable tree stand, it is important to be downwind from the trail over which you are hunting. You have to find the right tree that will give you stability as well as the right location. Mount the stand to the tree at just the right angle for you to shoot over your left or right shoulders.

There are certainly no guarantees in hunting, so even with a good set-up, you have to be prepared to reposition yourself in the stand to get a good shot off. You don't want the "big one" standing in front of you and then discover that you didn't have the right angle. Too much movement to get into the right position to shoot will potentially ruin the hunt.

Action Point

The Christian life is not always an easy one. I know it seems as though I have to keep on repositioning myself daily for God's service. It's not that I purposely try to put myself in the wrong position. It's just that I live in an imperfect world that bumps into me every day; and if I'm not careful to keep a short account with God, I will soon find myself totally out of position for His service.

We need go to God, to seek Him, every day; and not count on what we've done the previous day or week. God can use us daily; but we need to make sure our hearts are with Him today.

Sportsmen's Tip of the Day

In order to keep quiet on the stand, use fleece to keep you warm if you are in a colder environment. Fleece allows you to move freely without worrying about the clothing making a noise that might potentially scare animals away.

Rowland and Jane Van Es in Kenya

Dear Friends and Supporters,

We just returned from a meeting in South Africa and saw snow on the mountain tops there. It was the NetACT (Network of African Congregational Theology) annual general meeting and this year it was held in Wellington, South Africa. Being so far south of the equator in July meant it was really their winter and it was cold (in 40s) with no heat in the rooms. Jane and I were there representing both the RCA and St. Paul's at the meeting attended by 50+ people from 40+ institution from all over Sub-Saharan Africa.

We met several old friends including a former South African missionary to Malawi who was our pastor in the 1990s and his wife who

ALL CONTRACTOR Feet of was also one of the mid-wives present for the birth of our two daughters there. We also met Bishop Moses Deng of South Sudan, one of our former students here. We made final plans for the book on Theology and Community Development, adding a few more chapters.

When we got back to Kenya, there was a Winter School being hosted on the campus of St. Paul's that brought together people from US, Netherlands, Zambia, and Kenya on the topic "Gender, Power and Difference." There was good theological and cross-cultural debate and stimulating lectures and table conversations. One highlight was the closing day with dramas presented by the students and a cultural evening with dancing and "nyama choma" (or roast meat)—this time it was goat, a local favorite.

The Winter School was organized by the Faculty of Theology's Center for Translation and Contextual Bible Study. It was attended by several current students and many St. Paul's alumni. It was good to get caught up and hear what they are doing in various churches here. Rev. Peter Joel is working in a church in Mathare slum and another, Rev. David is an assistant chaplain at the Methodist University in Nairobi.

Speaking of doing things in various churches, we will be back in the USA this fall for our home service. If you would like to have us come and speak in your church, please contact Megan Razenberg, mrazenberg@rca.org, assistant to RCA mission in Africa supervisor to coordinate this possibility via RCA Speakers Bureau. With 25+ churches we will not have time to visit all of you but would love to catch up with as many as possible. It will also be nice to be in Holland, MI near Jane's mother and our girls. We look forward to time with Rowland's family as well.

We thank God for the work of NetACT and for all the theological training happening in over 40 church schools in Sub-Saharan Africa. Pray that more students would choose to study for the ministry. Pray that the books and materials produced by NetACT will meet the needs of students throughout Africa.

Pray for all our St. Paul's alumni who are now ordained and working in many different denominations in Kenya (like Rev. Peter Joel and Rev. David in Kenya) and elsewhere (like Bishop Deng in South Sudan). We praise God that the church is growing here and that our students are ready to serve these churches.

Pray for Rev. Philister Tuwei Keter who was just ordained as the first woman minister in the Reformed Church of East Africa. Pray also for Rev. Dinah who will be the second woman to be ordained in August and for the four other RCEA women who will be ordained this year. It will not be easy for these first six women to be accepted by the male ministers in all their churches. Pray that hearts and minds will be opened to this.

Pray for us as we travel all over the Midwest this fall. Pray that we will make good connections and have opportunities to share our work and to raise support for the RCA-St. Paul's scholarship program as well. We look forward to sharing about our students and our work and what God is doing in Kenya and Africa!




Wondering what to include in your Operation Christmas Child Shoeboxes?? Here a few awesome ideas from one of our members!!
